### **Budget Hearing**

- I. Presentation of 2020-2021 Budget Dennis Birr presented a power point of the proposed District budget.
- II. Discussion and Questions Concerning the Budget: Derek Johnsrud inquired about enrollment numbers, voucher students, kindergarten screening, and meal sign-up numbers. Steve Rubert expressed his appreciation for tightening up the budget. He had some questions regarding reduction in numbers and regarding transfers from fund to fund.

A motion to close the public hearing was made by Steven Rubert and seconded by Derek Johnsrud. Motion carried by majority voice vote.

### **Annual Meeting**

- I. Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance by School Board President Keith Miller at 7:25 p.m.
  - Board Member Attendance: Keith Miller, Paul Osterhaus, Ember Schultz, Ashley Morton, Nathan Fietz, Dennis Birr, Brian Zacho, Ryan Verrier and Andrea Stier. 9 members of the public/staff were present.
- II. Election of Chairperson: The floor was opened for nominations to elect a chairperson for the 2020 annual meeting. Steve Rubert nominated Derek Johnsrud. A motion to close nominations was made by Irene Pawlisch and seconded by Steve Rubert. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- III. Approval of Annual Meeting Agenda 2020: A motion was made by Colleen Waterworth and seconded by Kari Osterhaus to approve the 2020 Annual Meeting Agenda with the following additional items; at risk students and class pictures in the hallways. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- IV. Approval of minutes from 2019 Annual Meeting: A motion was made by Kari Osterhaus and seconded by Sue Johnsrud to approve the 2019 Annual Meeting Minutes. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- V. Old Business: There was no unaddressed business from the 2019 meeting.



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### VI. New Business:

### i. Approval of Budget

A motion was made by Steven Rubert and seconded by David Brozek to approve the 2020-2021 Tax Levy of \$2,426,090 as presented during the Budget Hearing. Motion carried by a majority voice vote

- ii. Review of 2019-2020 Data and Accomplishments: Brian Zacho and Ryan Verrier highlighted data and accomplishments from the 2019-2020 school year. Derek Johnsrud mentioned how far the Athletic Field has come and feels it is a huge accomplishment of the District. The Athletic Field has been a recruiting tool for new students and will be competition ready by spring. Keith Miller wanted to voice his appreciation for staff and how well they have adapted to Covid. The effort by both teachers and administration has been amazing.
- iii. Salaries for School Board members and loss of pay: A motion was made by Steve Rubert and seconded by Sue Johnsrud to authorize the salaries in the amount of \$1,500 a year for Board President, \$1,100 a year for all other School Board members and loss of pay in the amount of \$100 per day to School Board members absent from work on school business. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- iv. **Reimbursement for School Board member expenses:** A motion was made by Steve Rubert and seconded by Colleen Waterworth to authorize a flat fee of \$25 (not to exceed a calendar year maximum of \$500.00) be paid to each School Board member for each special board meeting or board appointed committee meeting that was called by either the Board President or School Superintendent. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- v. **Hiring Legal Counsel** (State statute 120.10(14): A motion was made by Colleen Waterworth and seconded by Kari Osterhaus to direct and provide for the prosecution or defense of any action or proceedings in which the District is interested. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- vi. **Providing students with textbooks** (State statute 120.10(15): A motion was made by Steve Rubert and seconded by David Brozek to authorize the School Board to furnish textbooks under conditions prescribed by the annual meeting or by the School Board. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- vii. **School lunch:** A motion was made by Colleen Waterworth and seconded by Robert Mickelson to approve lunch prices as is. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
- viii. **Authorization to borrow money for operations:** A motion was made Brad Johnsrud and seconded by Robert Mickelson to authorize the School Board to borrow as needed for short term operations. Motion carried by majority voice vote.
  - ix. **Date for 2021 Annual Meeting:** A motion was made by David Brozek and seconded by Steven Rubert to conduct the Annual Meeting on September 13, 2021 at 7 p.m. Motion carried by majority voice vote.



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x. **Other new business:** Discussions were held regarding the following topics: students who are at risk of not graduating; past graduation pictures being displayed in the hallways; state waivers application; facility use by other groups; standards-based grading; support for teachers with virtual learning.

- **120.10** Powers of annual meeting. The annual meeting of a common or union high school district may:
  - (1) Chairperson and clerk. Elect a chairperson and, in the absence of the school district clerk, elect a person to act as the clerk of the meeting.
  - (2) ADJOURNMENT. Adjourn from time to time.
  - (3) SALARIES OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS. Vote annual salaries for school board members or an amount for each school board meeting the member actually attends.
  - (4) REIMBURSEMENT OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS. Authorize the payment of actual and necessary expenses of a school board member when traveling in the performance of duties and the reimbursement of a school board member for actual loss of earnings when duties require the school board member to be absent from regular employment.
  - (5) BUILDING SITES. Designate sites for school district buildings and provide for the erection of suitable buildings or for the lease of suitable buildings for a period not exceeding 20 years with annual rentals fixed by the lease.
  - (5m) REAL ESTATE. Authorize the school board to acquire, by purchase or condemnation under ch. 32, real estate and structures and facilities appurtenant to such real estate necessary for school district purposes.
  - (6) Tax for sites, Buildings and Maintenance. Vote a tax to purchase or lease suitable sites for school buildings, to build, rent, lease or purchase and furnish, equip and maintain school district buildings. The tax may be spread over as many years as are required to pay any obligations approved or authorized at the annual meeting including rental payments due in future years under an authorized lease.
  - (7) TAX FOR TRANSPORTATION VEHICLES. Vote a tax to purchase, operate and maintain transportation vehicles and to purchase liability insurance for such vehicles, and to finance contracts for the use and services of such vehicles.
  - (8) Tax for operation. Vote a tax for the operation of the schools of the school district.
  - (9) Tax for Debts. Vote a tax necessary to discharge any debts or liabilities of the school district.
  - (10) SCHOOL DEBT SERVICE FUND. Vote a tax to create a fund for the purpose of paying all current bonded indebtedness for capital expenditures. All money raised through taxation or otherwise collected pursuant to this subsection shall be deposited by the school district treasurer in a segregated fund. Such money shall not be used for any other purpose, except as provided by s. 67.11 (1), or be transferred to any other fund except by authorization by a two-thirds majority vote of the total number of electors of the school district.
  - (10m) SCHOOL CAPITAL EXPANSION FUND. Vote a tax to create a fund for the purpose of financing all current and future capital expenditures related to buildings and sites. All money raised through taxation or otherwise collected pursuant to this subsection shall be deposited by the school district treasurer in a segregated fund. Such money shall not be used for any other purpose or be transferred to any other fund except by authorization by a majority vote of the electors present at a subsequent annual meeting and only if notice that the issue would be on the agenda was included in the notice of the subsequent annual meeting under s. 120.08 (1) (c).
  - (11) TAX FOR RECREATION AUTHORITY. Vote a tax for the purposes specified in s. 66.0123.
  - (14) LEGAL PROCEEDINGS. Direct and provide for the prosecution or defense of any action or proceedings in which the school district is interested.
  - (15) Textbooks. Authorize the school board to furnish textbooks under conditions prescribed by the annual meeting or by the school board. The authorization shall continue in effect until revoked by a subsequent annual meeting.
  - (16) SCHOOL LUNCHES. Direct the school board to furnish school lunches to the pupils of the school district and appropriate funds for that purpose.

### **Fund Accounting Guidelines**

The following are funds reported in the school District's Annual and Budget reports to the DPI categorized by the activities that occur within the funds. The reported funds in each category have similar function-object expenditure coding. This guide has been condensed (using information from the DPI) to show those classifications typically used in the Fall River School District.

### Fund 10 General Fund

The general fund is used to account for all financial transactions relating to the District's current operations, except for those required to be accounted for in other funds.

### Fund 21 Special Revenue Trust Fund

This fund is used to account for trust funds that can be used for District operations. The source of such funds is gifts and donations from private parties. Cash and investments in this fund are expended pursuant to donor specifications. There may be a fund balance in this fund.

### Fund 27 Special Education Fund

The fund is used to account for the excess cost of providing special education and related services for students with disabilities during the regular school year or extended school year. Also included are charges for services provided to other Districts as a result of being a host District for a special education package or cooperative program. School Age Parent costs are also charged to this Fund. No fund balance or deficit can exist in this fund.

### Fund 39 Referendum Approved Debt Service Funds

This fund is used to account for transactions for the repayment of debt issues that were either: authorized by school board resolution before August 12, 1993, or approved by referendum. The District may account for in such referendum approved debt service transactions in Funds 31, 32, 33, 34, 36, 37 (which are not presently assigned by DPI for reporting purposes) and/or Fund 39. If the District uses funds other than Fund 39, the District must combine and report these funds as Fund 39. A fund balance may exist in this fund.

### Fund 50 Food Service Fund

All revenues and expenditures related to pupil and elderly food service activities are recorded in this fund. A fund balance in the Food Service Fund is permitted. There may be no deficit in the District's Food Service Fund. Any food service fund deficit, resulting from **student** food services, must be eliminated by an operating transfer from the General Fund. Any food service fund deficit, resulting from **elderly** food services, must be eliminated by a transfer from the District's Community Service Fund. The maximum that may be transferred if the District does not have a deficit in the Food Service Fund is limited to an amount necessary to cover a current year deficit in a particular food service program (National School Lunch, Breakfast, Ala Carte, etc.)

### Fund 80 Community Service Fund

This fund is used to account for activities such as adult education, community recreation programs such as evening swimming pool operation and softball leagues, elderly food service programs, non-special education preschool, day care services, and other programs which are not elementary and secondary educational programs but have the primary function of serving the community. Actual, additional expenditures for these activities, includes salaries, benefits, travel, purchased services, etc. are to be included in this Fund to the extent feasible. The District may adopt a separate tax levy for this Fund.

### 2021-2022 Budget Summary

This budget represents the financial plan to achieve the educational objectives of the School District. Development of this budget began with the review of the current year programs, services, analysis of student enrollment, state and federal assistance and the consideration of community expectations. The budget development is a year round process of assessment of the current budget and projections of the many variables that impact the next budget. The 2021-2022 budget uses the Department of Public Instruction data on previous year spending, base revenue per student, an average of three years of pupil count, applies state law on revenue limits, equalization aid, other state aids and private school voucher costs are used to calculate allowable revenue for the district. The budget reflects all debt payments due and funds to operate the school district.

The District's general Fund 10 expenditures, which represent the bulk of District costs, are projected to be \$6,238,645, which is a decrease of \$79,098 from last year's expenditures. State aid is expected to increase by \$6169. With the 4K class rebounding to a normal size and a small senior class leaving, we expect to have an increase in FTE this year. The expected tax levy for all funds, including debt service, after revenue from state, federal and other sources is \$2,315,013, down 4.6% or a decrease of \$111,077 from last year. With the equalized value of district property expected to go up at least 3% over last year, these factors combine for a mill rate to go down from \$7.90 to \$7.32. This would be a decrease of \$58 on a \$100,000 property. This is the lowest mill rate in quite some time. Five years ago the mill rate was \$10.07

The Community Service, Fund 80, will be used to fund the youth summer recreation program and the use of the school fitness center by the public. The fulfill the purpose of the Community Service Fund as spelled out by the DPI: "This fund is used to account for activities such as adult education, community recreation programs such as evening swimming pool operation and softball leagues, elderly food service programs, non-special education preschool, day care services, and other programs which are not elementary and secondary educational programs but have the primary function of serving the community. Expenditures for these activities, including cost allocations for salaries, benefits, travel, purchased services, etc. are to be included in this Fund to the extent feasible. The district may adopt a separate tax levy for this Fund."

The budget adoption summary shows the past four years and for this coming school year. There are two major factors affecting the changes you see.

A decrease in FTE count last year affects our revenue limit this year. You will see that decrease carries through all the tax levies.

We also now have a \$43,000 Fund 38 debt payment that reduces our fund 10 levy out of our revenue limit.

We do anticipate our enrollment rebounding with a small senior class graduating and a normal 4K class size this year.




