This day in history...

For the week of Aug. 30-Sept. 4

This week, instead of Tips & Tricks, we, at the Blue Ink, thought we would share some historic events that happened over the interchange from August to September.

August 30: President John F. Kennedy is the first president to have a hotline from the White House directly to the Soviet Kremlin. This came as a solution for often delayed and encrypted communications during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Although the crisis ended peacefully in mid-1963, concerns of future misunderstandings led to an improved system.

August 31: The first solar-powered automobile, called the Sunmobile, is demonstrated by William G. Cobb at the GM Powerama auto show in Chicago in 1955. Still, over a half-century late, a solar car hasn't met the market anywhere.

September 1: The RMS Titanic is found 13,000 feet below sea level. The wreck was found by a joint U.S.-French expedition led by Robert D. Ballard in 1985. The Titanic was found roughly 400 miles east of Newfoundland with the help of an unmanned submersible named Argo. No they didn't find Jack.

September 2: Japan Surrenders to the U.S.A. ending WWII. This unconditional surrender came into effect after the United States bombed Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and when the

Soviets declared war on Japan. The ceremony took place on the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay. Over 250 Allied warships were also in Tokyo Bay while the ceremony was held. Eight other signatures were made from eight different countries, be-

September 3: The Treaty of Paris was signed in 1783 marking the end of the American Revolution. This allowed the American Colonies to become formally known as the United States of America. The terms allowed expansion west to the Mississippi River, and north to south from the Great Lakes to Florida, nearly doubling the new nation's size. Lastly, the treaty was ratified by Congress on the January 14, 1784.

September 4: The president, Harry S. Truman, makes the first television program broadcast to the nation. The broadcast was mainly about Truman's acceptance of a treaty that ended the U.S.'s involvement in postwar Japan. Truman's speech was spread throughout the country by a state-of-the-art microwave television technology, which hardly exists in today's television technology.
