



dedicate this edition of "The Cavalier" to Charles J. Thurmond, teacher of English, and sponsor of "The Quadrangle" and "The Cavalier."

Senior Class History



JENKINS 7—PAINTSVILLE 18



The Preamble to the Constitution of the United Mine Workers of America reads as follows:

There is no truth more obvious than that without call there could not have been such marvelous social and industrial progress as marks present day civilization.

Believing that those whose lot it is to toil within the earth's recesses surrounded by peculiar dangers and deprived of sunlight and pure air, producing the commodity which makes possible the world's progress are entitled to pretection and an qualitable share of the future of their labor, we have formed the "United Mine Workers of America" for the purpose of establishing, by lawful means the principles embraced in the body of the Constitution.

Therefore, we represent not tomage in coal production, not wealth, riches or financial interests, but we do represent human beings and their God-given rights. We believe that human rights should eternally be placed and reckoned above property rights.

Our primary objectives in collective bargaining are not only to shorten the hours of labor, improve working and living conditions for our membership, effect a better industrial relationship between our organization and our employers, but also to enjoy the fraternal relationship of the brotherhood of those who work in the industry.

We have the greatest labor organization in the world today by far, having a membership of approximately 600,000 in the United Steas and Canada, it is not the intent and purposes of the United Mine Workers of America to arouse industrial strife and to engage in unlawful activities as some would have you to believe, but rather to settle our grievances and differences with our employers anicably and peacefully, as evidenced by the prolonged wage joint conferences held in he Nation's Capital in the year 1935.

We have the greatest labor leaders of the country in our International Organization today, it is now an established and accepted fact that labor has the right to, and can intellig
