Upon his retirement June 1, Rorabaugh will have served as EHS superintendent for 18 years.

Rorabaugh mentioned that he enjoyed the freedom that came with being a superintendent as compared to being confined to a classroom everyday.

When asked what stands out most in his mind in his 18 years at EHS, he replied with a smile, "My
hair is much more gray, along with several more wrinkles."

He went on to say that construction of the new high school and the 1976 cross-country team that he coached to the state championship would always be vivid memories to him.
As to the question of what he will miss most after leaving, he laughed, "The check every month. No, seriously, I will miss the association with the kids and the comradery with the employees and school district."

Rorabaugh believes everyone should retire eventually, if they can afford it.

that are disliked also. One of the things that Rorabaugh did not enjoy as much about being superintendent was the responsibility of being on call 24 hours that goes with the job. He commented that it is sometimes worse than being a doctor.
"But most of all," Rorabaugh said, "I disliked the inability of some school district patrons to realize that school administrators really do know more about the operation of a school district than those who have never known the responsibility."

The staff at EHS, including the cooks, janitors, librarians, and bus drivers, supports the school in many ways that students and faculty may not be aware of.

Caroline Schumm, head cook, arrives at the school at 6:00 every school morning, with Barbara King arriving at 7:00 and Ellen Desaire arriving at 10:00. The women prepare the menu for 115-130 students daily, usually making everything from scratch.

The required servings are two to three ounces of protein, threefourths cup of fruit or vegetable, a serving of bread, and a serving of milk. Our school has the Offer vs. Serve program in which students have the option of turning down an item.
"We all enjoy our job very much," commented Schumm.

The librarians have many responsibilities such as selecting material, providing space for material, and classifying and cataloging material. Visiting with the students and teachers to find what the library needs before it is needed and "selling" library, reading, etc. to students and teachers are also important.
'We also must assist finding quick answers for a variety of very
interesting questions. Instructing how to use this and all libraries is the most valuable part!
"Of course, I'm here only about four hours a day, so some of these items are wishful thinking. It is, however, an interesting job!" said Sheri Faulkender, librarian.

The janitors start their workday at $7: 00$. The day is filled with such jobs as disinfecting the showers and bathrooms, cleaning lunch tables, and vacuuming the halls and rooms.

During the summer, the janitors spend much time mowing, thoroughly cleaning all the rooms, and shampooing the carpet.
"There is always plenty of work to do," said Charlie Waldschmidt, custodian.

Before the buses leave for their morning route, the lights, horns, lug nuts, etc. on the buses are checked. Joe Locker, transportation supervisor, will then repair any broken parts. The drivers are responsible for getting students to and from school and taking students to school events.
"We've got a good bunch of drivers and a real good bunch of students riding our buses," said Locker.
