## Hays native taken hostage in Iran

The end of 1986 and the beginning of 1987 brought to our attention various new developements, new problems and new fads.

After eighteen years of service to U.S.D. 388, Rocky Rorabaugh retired. Mr. Clair Beecher took over as the new superintendent of the Ellis school system.

Two Ellis High School students, Brad Deutscher and Marty Helget, took over The Depot on Oct. 1, 1986. The boys closed the establishment on Feb. 1, 1987, due to lack of time.

The city started a PRIDE organization to help local organizations coordinate group activities. Some of these included a fire hydrant painting contest and yard improvement projects.

Students from Ellis High School established a S.A.D.D. (Students Against Driving Drunk) chapter. Its purpose was to encourage students to not drink and drive.

On Sept. 12, the Ellis Public Library moved its books from one location to another with the help of the people of Ellis. The library was moved from the basement of City Hall to the old post office building, which is located next door to City

Hall. Approximately 60 people stood in line for the book pass. In all, each person handled about 12,000 books.

The bridge over Big Creek on Washington Street is going to be reconstructed this summer. This work will cause a detour to be used in order to cross the water.

Two very strong blizzards hit the area in March immediately after spring break. Power and telephone lines were knocked out and roads were impassable for several days. Students got out of six days of classes because of blizzards.

On the medical front, AIDS became the most feared disease in the United States. This really hit close to home when a Smith Center High School student contracted the disease from a contaminated blood transfusion used in an operation.
In the sports scene, The New York Giants beat the Denver Broncos to win the Super Bowl. The New York Mets beat the Boston Red Sox to win the World Series.
Also in 1987, terrorism hit closer to home. Gerald Seib, a Hays native and Wall Street Journal reporter was taken hostage in Iran. Seib, along with other reporters, had been in-
vited to Iran by the Iranian government. While doing routine reporting, Seib was detained and accused of being a spy. He was finally released after five days.

In the biggest scandal since Watergate, President Ronald Reagan was involved in the Iranian arms controversy. Reagan arranged to sell defensive weapons to Iran for, what many perceived, exchange of American hostages. The scandal escalated when it was disclosed that Reagan's aides had secretly channeled the profits from the weapons to the Contras in Nicaragua. This controversy caused Reagan some public relations problems with the American public.

In a landmark case, surrogate mother, Mary Beth Whitehead, lost the fight to keep Baby M. The baby, now known as Melissa Stern, was given to her natural father, William Stern, after a controversial court battle.

Finally, the fashion fads included bleached jeans, bows in the hair, and the ever-popular jams.

## Colophon

The 87th volume of the Ellis High School Railroader was printed by Taylor Publishing Company, Dallas, Texas. The press ran 150 books with 150 pages. Our company representative was Mike Danner.

The cover is a thermo-screened and silk-screened design by Danny Fabrizius. Inside photographs were taken by the staff photographers with the exception of mug shots by National School Studios and senior mugs by Pioneer Photography and Cathy's Country Photography.
Headlines are 48 -point brush and 30 -point impact. Body copy is 10 -point news gothic and cutlines are 8 point news gothic. All copy was composed by the Railroader staff.

The total cost of printing exceeded $\$ 7,000$. Advertising brought in $\$ 5,125$ and book sales brought in $\$ 2,082$. Individual copies were sold for $\$ 16.50$ with name, and $\$ 15.00$ without.

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
