



That was the moment that you knew that the year was going to be different. At that moment the entire school changed. A new outlook. A new attitude. A new year. It was our year.
















junior class faces many challenges during year





teachers often find it hard to spend a lot of time with their kids every day.


"Sometimes my evenings are very busy, and I'm not able to give my kids as much attention as I should," Mick said


their kids.

laptops change ways of learning

"May I go get a laptop?" is a sentence that teachers and students had not heard before. But it became more common when the school district purchased 145 laptops for students and teachers to use.

The introduction of laptops led to improvements for the school day. One improvement was that the students were more motivated to do their work since they were able to work at their own desk. Another improvement was that students were apt to work harder.

Mr. Butch Hayes, math teacher, said that the laptops made a difference in the way lessons were taught.

"You're able to do other homework when your work for the class you are in was


finished." Hook said.





on the runners attending state," Dinkel said. "It got them pumped up and ready to run and represent Ellis."


The boys also had much support from the members of the girls' cross country team who did not attend state.

Despite those holes, Coach Art Schoenthaler's outlook was optimistic. He expected to coach a competitive team to many victories.


"Hopefully we'll have some young people that'll step up to fill the open positions," Schoenthaler said.







"The team didn't give up," Chase


King¹⁰⁹ said. "Thinking that we couldn't practice for two weeks made us work harder."







Throughout the season, the Railers fought even though they knew they were not on the winning end.



Even though Crist enjoyed coaching, he knew he wouldn't be returning to Ellis, having accepted a teaching job in Maine.


"He was a really good coach because he was younger, so he understood us more," said Waldschmidt. "It stinks that he's leaving next year."



Weekly newspaper headlines and record breaking performances are typical of any standout athlete. Accomplishments like those coming from a freshman make Whitney Taylor of an extraordinary athlete.

Junior Meggie Patrick¹⁰⁷ was also an extraordinary athlete her freshman year, as she broke the Ellis High School girls' high jump record with a jump of 5'6". She also felt the pressure at her first state appearance her freshman year, but the pressure didn't get to her as she took second in high jump at the state meet.

"My advice for Miss Whitney is to just be confident and have fun! There's nothing better than knowing that if you push yourself just right, you're going to be awesome," Patrick said.

While the numbers of boy trackers were small, the Ellis High School boys' track team overcame that problem and made something great out of it.

"The numbers were down four from the 2005 season. I had high expectations for the 2006 season because all of the returning lettermen," Coach Jack Wolf said.

Wolf was not disappointed.

Powerhouse Cole Erbert ⁰⁷ took four events to the regional competition, which was held in Hill City. He competed in the 4x1, shot put, discus, and the javelin. He broke

two meet records, and two school records throughout the year, reaching his personal records with throws of 166' in discus, 51'6'' in shot put, and 158' in javelin.

However, Erbert was not the only one who traveled to Hill City. Twelve out of 18 boys got to experience what the regional competition was all about.

"I'm excited about regionals, I expect to take at least seven out of the twelve to state," Wolf said.

Wolf's expectations fell short by only one boy.

Andrew Casey '07 qualified for the State competition in the long jump, 100m, 200m and the 4x1; Daren Haas '06 in the 4x1; Slade Hackney '06 in the 4x1; Logan Bittel '07 as

an alternate in the 4x1; and Cole Erbert¹⁰⁷ in the 4x1, shot put, discus, and the javelin.

The boys' 4x1 not only traveled to the state competition, but broke the school record with a time of 44.20 seconds, which put them third place at regionals.

"I am very proud and excited for those who are going to state. They have worked hard and are all competitors," Wolf Said.

At state, Erbert placed first in discus, sixth in javelin, and fifth in shot put; Casey placed seventh in the 100m and third in the 200 m; and the team of Hackney, Casey, Erbert, and Haas placed third in the 4x1.







They also had to adjust to having two new cheer sponsors instead of just


one. Bombach specialized in dancing, and Augustine helped them with cheering.

"Our adrenaline was pumping, and we were just more excited than we were nervous," Patrick said. "It was a full room during the final round, mostly just filled with our team supporting us."


The reaction to the announcement of their winning state champs will be something that neither one of them will ever forget.



Although practicing the


same piece repetitively can get old, Connelly planned to audition for State KMEA Band again her senior year.

"I've never had a class work like this," Riedel said. "The script fit the class, and when you get a script that fits the class well, they give 110%."



"It was surprising how we could do it cheaply and have it turn out pretty," Emily Cox^{'07} said.


Because the organization didn't have much money, more fund raisers were discussed to prevent a future shortage of money.

"We've got around \$1,400 to start next year. We're setting pretty good," Laura Augustine'07 said.





"Mr. Pfeifer built a great program. Now it's up to the future to continue it," said Jennifer Jacques, FFA member.



Cindy Hertel, Prom sponsor, said the seniors realized this was one of their last opportunities to be together, so they made the best of Prom by staying later.








"The best part [of Th' Gathering]isseeingeveryone gather to remember their family and clan," Bill Hankins' said. "They walk through the fire to burn off the old."


Despite Ellis' small size, it helped students overlook the outside world for a little while. Many outlets were found within and beyond its city limits.
