"May I go get a laptop?" is a sentence that teachers and students had not heard before. But it became more common when the school district purchased 145 laptops for students and teachers to use.
The introduction of laptops led to improvements for the school day. One improvement was that the students were more motivated to do their work since they were able to work at their own desk. Another improvement was that students were aptło work harder.

Mr. Butch Hayes, math teacher, said that the laptops made a difference in the way lessons were taught.
"I think it allows a different avenue in teaching and tearning," Hayes said.

Alihough most teachers and students said that the laptops were helpful and handy to use, they caused some complications.
One major compilation was that there were not enough laptopsin the schoolfor each student to use. Since there weren't enough laptops for each student, scheduling
conflicts sometimes arose.
The laptops were used in various classes. Students in math classes used Green Globs to learn how to graph equations, and students in calculus used Derive 5 to integrate equations. The laptops were also used for research in Mr.. Kohl's classes.
Sammy Hook ${ }^{07}$ thought the laptops were a great addition and were convenient to use in the classrooms.
"You're able to do other homework when your work for the class you are in was
finished," Hook said.
Students and teachers alike fell that it would be a loteasier iffeachers had their own cart of laptops in the room to eliminate the conflicting schedules between teachers.
The laptops were not tem. porary. Over time, the district planned to replace most of the deskłop computers with laptops.
Teachers will, no doubt, get used to the saying "May I go get a laptop?"

Team was the key word when it came fime for state. It was the first time the boys' team went to state as a whole
since 1986
"It was a lot more motivating training as a team for state than one person by myself," said Gugler, the only Ellis High School runner to attend state the previous season.

The student body also helped in molivating the boys for state. Before the runners left for state, the student body and staff held a state send-off.
"We strive to do whatever we can to get teams pumped up and ready to compete later that evening," Kelsi Schoenthaler ${ }^{06}$, cross country runner and cheerleading captain, said. "The cross country state send-off was a new experience for us, but we helped the team members out as much as possible."
Coach Casey Dinkel also realized that the state send-off helped the runners out on their performance later that day.
"The state send-off had a big effect
on the runners attending state," Dinkel said. "It got them pumpedup andready to run and represent Ellis."
The boys also had much supportfrom the members of the girls' cross country team who did not attend state.
"it was fun to go to state and support the boys," Schoenthaler said. "We were with them all the way!"
The boys were glad that the girls were at state to support them.
"It feels better to attend state when you know that your other team members are there to support you," Gugler said. "There were not very many team members at state to supportme in 2004. I feel that I ran better as an
individual just because others were there to support me."
