







job this season, and I can't wait to see what else is to come!" Dreyer said.


The Railers had two returning assistant coaches, Shelly Hensley and Terra Upham. The drills Dreyer brought kept everyone on their toes and excited for practice.


"Her new ideas and drills will develop a very fundamentally-based program with a lot of future success," Upham said.






# One Council


The play, "Aunt Maggity's Dark and Stormy Night," was staged for November 13. There was a matinee performance during school and then again that evening.














# Senlors Set High Expectations



"Kaleigh really took a strong role on the team. She stepped up and became our leading rebounder, I was really thankful for that," Waldschmidt said.


Many of the other underclassmen played on the JV and C-Team. The JV team ended the season with a record of 13-3, and the C-Team with a record of 1-4.

Being the only senior on the team, Jacob Kinderknecht<sup>12</sup> had to step up and be a leader.



After battling it out with many other teams, the Railers did not show all of the hard work that was put into their season. They ended their season with a record of 8-13.
























"Teaching all the band and vocal, classes is stressful at times, especially when planning for concerts and contests," Sauer said.

The high school music program finished the year by performing at the Regional Music Festival in Hays. They brought small ensembles which included woodwinds. brass, and percussion.









New Year Brings New Experiences



No matter why students take electives, there are many to choose from to add a little something different to everyone's day.


