"During the year we do several community activities from Up 'Till Dawn to Teacher Appreciation Day," Scott Pfeifer¹⁴ said.


FCCLA also does events like bag sales to help out with fundraising for Big Brothers Big Sisters and also volunteering at the VFW.






"It's awesome because we get






maintaining good grades.










Teachers have slightly different techniques to make learning easier.





STUDENTS USE ADVANCED SOFTWARE

When it comes to working with computers, most teenagers know the basics. However, the members of Journalism, Webpage, and Multimedia must learn more complex computer programs to deliver school and community news on a regular basis.

Twenty-three new faces joined our school this year for the first time. Nerves were on edge as they entered the school on the first day.






Over the years, they lost a few students and gained new ones, leading to the class of 25 students they are today.

last year, the Ellis volleyball team had much to overcome. They had new starters, new players moving up to varsity, and a new style of play.











"I would get motivated when Thatcher would sing before the meets while we were all stretching," Allen Augustine¹⁴ said.



















"At the beginning of the season we seemed a little divided because it was a whole new team, but as we went on we started bonding and playing together more," Mikayla Gottschalk¹² said.


For the first half of the season the ladies won four out of their first eleven, but as the season progressed, so did their skill level and they ended the second half winning five out of ten games.





"I wasn't looking forward to getting new coaches my senior year because it is hard to adjust to new coaches sometimes," Mikayla Gottschalk¹² said.


The Lady Railers went into the Sylvan Grove regional with a 14-9 regular season record. They defeated Lincoln and Natoma, sending the girls on their way to state.







the crowd involved," senior captain Breanna Kroeger said.


To acheive this goal they added theme nights to games, made more posters for the school, lockers, and yard signs, and longer pep rallies to get more students to participate.





After seeing this on Facebook, the juniors saw this prank as the start of a "war". For the rest of the week, the upperclassmen began to fight for first place.





"I was so proud of the Juniors for taking on this classic comedy, and I was impressed with their work ethic," Dawson said.



the kids to memorize their lines so they wouldn't have to pay.


"I believe paying for the missed lines helped us learn them better," Hensley said.

"The biggest challenge I had during the play was acting like I was drunk," Lexi Feik¹³ said.






While some people went out to eat, others decided to stay in.



"Before the dance, we ate and went to the Good Sam to parade around and show the residents how attractive we looked," Cody Grubb¹³ said.













While some seniors are thinking about the future, some recall their first days at EHS.


