

Invitational. They also earned third at both the **Kiowa County tournament** and MCL.


"My favorite tournament was Sub-State," Autum Hellerud¹⁵ said. "The last game was when we came together the most out of any game and there was so much heart on the











After a hard fought game against Washington County, the Railers fell short 64-44. Even though they lost, it was a memorable season.







"It's weird not having seniors because they usually make the plans," Buchholz¹⁵ commented. "We really have to step up and make executive decisions like what we are going to wear on game days."


The team isn't just lacking seniors, it's lacking members as a whole. They started the season with a

masquerade, and casinothemed proms are all common themes that the junior classes have selected over the years. This year the juniors picked a theme that has never been seen before - western.


"The theme we picked this year is really original," junior Autum Hellerud said. "I love it because it's so different from the usual glitz and glam."









Kori Clark¹⁵ said.


Student Council
