






The Railers lost yet another player shortly after that. Autum Hellerud¹⁵ was injured in a car accident and was out for the rest of the season.



"State was pretty rad and gnarly. Never quit and remember that the worst practices are the ones that matter the most," Groff⁵ said.



This is exactly what the girls knew they needed to do. Even though they lost a player, they were determined to win as many games as possible.







Not only were the boys placed in a tough regional, they only had one senior to rely on for leadership.





The 4x100m relay was state champion in 2012 and placed 4th in state last season. Members of the team this year include Jared Pfeifer¹⁵, Sean Lee¹⁵, Joseph Eck¹⁸, and Eli Lohrmeyer¹⁵.

"I was just glad I did break the record because I had a lot of people expecting me to," Lee said.




