During the month, 423 students came to the library independently before or after school, during their lunch periods or from classes. In addition, 36 classes were brought to the library by teachers. Many students come to return, renew, and check out new books. Although I am seeing fewer students who need to use a computer, students are still coming to print out pictures for art class, scripts that they wrote and will perform, or work they need to do when they will not have access to wifi. During lunches and after school, students are coming to the library to read, do homework, collaborate on projects, or to use the wifi and their chromebooks.

Even though November was a short month and the library was closed several days while I had jury duty and attended the New Jersey Association of School Librarians (NJASL) Conference, 1191 books were checked out! According to the AR widget on my web page, 496 books and 26,223,146 words were read this month. As of November 30, 1083 books and 59,641,960 words have been read so far this school year.

This month, I have catalogued, labeled, and covered many new books that I purchased through our Scholastic Book Fair. Our new book display has overflowed to the tables. Students have been enjoying the fresh, new books.

I was fortunate to be able to attend the (NJASL) conference where I participated in many workshops, talked to vendors and authors, and heard leaders in my profession and authors speak. NJASL is always full of new information, but it also energizing to be among so many motivated school librarians sharing ideas, successes and learning experiences. SALEM COUNTY VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL ACADEMY

The Board supports providing collaborative efforts in education. The Board has agreed to host an Academy for the Salem County Vocational-Technical School (SCVTS). Academies are highly focused programs for students with specific interest in a given specialization.

Academy programs are offered on a full time basis to students from various school districts in Salem County who qualify. Students who attend the Academy hosted by Pennsville Memorial High School (PMHS) are SCVTS students and receive dual diplomas from PMHS and SCVTS.

Transportation to and from the host district to the resident district is the resident district's responsibility.

In order to provide for a well-rounded program, GMT/Music Academy students are permitted to participate in co-curricular activities at PMHS rather than at their resident school. Co-curricular activities include but are not limited to club meetings, field trips, senior trip, music trip, dances, Hop and Prom. The Board will permit such participation as long as the student is enrolled full time in the GMT/Music Academy currently housed at PMHS. Students attending off-campus SCVTS Academies will have opportunities to participate in these types of co-curricular activities at their Academy full time host school. SCVTS students who attend programs off-campus will not be permitted to participate in co-curricular activities at Pennsville. Full-time SCVTS and off-campus academy students may only attend PMHS dances (Prom, Hop, Etc) as guests of PMHS students provided that the out of district guest protocols have been met.

The Academy program also can provide an opportunity for its students to participate in interscholastic athletic programs in their resident high school. Yet, there are times when this may not be feasible, such as making practice schedules and meeting the team bus for away games. Under such circumstances, the NJSIAA does allow for an application for a hardship waiver in order to permit the student to participate at the host district. The Board will require any student that wishes this waiver to receive both the written approval from both his/her resident high school principal and the Pennsville Memorial High school Building Principal prior to beginning the program. Off-campus full-time SCVTS students may only participate in Pennsville athletic programs,marching band and musical productions when a similar program is not available through SCVTS.
