Describe how ARP ESSER III funds will be used by the district to implement prevention and mitigation strategies.*:

Cleaning and sanitizing protocol will be followed to mitigate the spread of viruses as outlined in the APS Health and Safety Plan. Mitigation supplies will be purchased per the general fund such as cleaning supplies, gloves and masks.

APS provides clear water bottles for all students daily and bottle refill water fountains are throughout the building.

APS will use Bianax testing for those who choose to test if they are a close contact. APS will also allow for virtual learning for both teachers and students when quarantined to prevent the spread.

Learning Loss

Describe how the district will use the mandatory 20% set-aside to address the academic impact of learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions.*:

Alexander Public School will use the 20% set aside to hire an Interventionist. The duties of the interventionist are evidence based to address the learning loss. The duties are as follows: *track data on all students to include assessments, grades, attendance, behavioral logs in PS, etc. *coordinate the formal RTI process *coordinate Friday Intervention Time to work with students one to one or in small group *provide evidence based intervention services to all students *lead and participate in professional development to guide classroom teachers to provide evidence based interventions embedded into the classroom instruction *participate in coordinating the student portfolios to track achievements, goals and data

APS will use the ESSER funds for mental health for students through our counselor who works one on one or in small group sessions with students which directly addresses the learning loss. The ARP ESSER funds will be utilized for the continuity of services successfully started in the 2020-2021 school year as well as a new positions. The plan will focus on addressing the learning loss resulting from COVID-19 and the interruption to the regular school years. The funds will be used to pay for salaries of new and existing instructors such as an interventionist and paras to work in small group and one on one with

students. The funds will be used for professional development for all staff and mental health needs of students and staff per the counselors salary as well as an Employee Assistance Program. Collectively the funds will address learning loss and continuity of services and simultaneously work as prevention and mitigation strategies.

Needs of Students Disproportionately Impacted

Describe how the district will respond to the needs of students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Address each stakeholder group.*:

Alexander Public School will respond to the needs of students disproportionately impacted by the pandemic in the following manners.

Low-income families and students experiencing homelessness: APS has applied for the Emergency Connectivity Funds to supplement the monthly cost of internet for families who need help to be ready for any possible quarantines or illnesses in the upcoming year as well as provide connectivity in off school hours to work on homework, one to one virtual tutoring, credit recovery or any educational programs available.

APS has a Homeless Liaison who works closely with students and families experiencing homelessness to provide resources to address all needs including: *hygiene such as showers before or after school, *food needs such as the after school back pack program/foodbank, *work time on Fridays to work on school with transportation provided, *provide clothing, school supplies, and/or anything needed to participate in extra curricular activities.

English learners: APS collaborates with Great Northwest Regional Educational Association to provide EL assessments and learning strategies for EL students.

Children with disabilities: APS is a member of the Wilmac Special Education Unit to provide all student needs for any disabilities.

Children and youth in foster care: The APS Foster Care Liaison works with the McKenzie County Social Services Department to provide all student needs for any students in foster care.

Migratory Students: APS has policies and student portfolios in place to provide support for the success of migratory students. We communicate with former and new schools of the students to lessen the learning curve of attending different schools.

Students of color: APS prohibits discrimination based on a student's race, color, religion, sex, gender identity, national origin, ancestry, disability, age, or other status protected by law. The different cultures in the school are acknowledged in the environment including the celebration of different heritage in cafeteria with culture days chosen by the students.

For all students: APS has a four day school week, and offers Friday Intervention Time and High Five League on Fridays when school is not in session to help with one to one or small group tutoring as well as education enhancement STEM activities. Transportation and meals are provided.

Barriers that may prevent students to receive the beneficiaries from participating in our funded project and activities are * transportation to regular school, Friday Intervention or tutoring time;

Barriers that may prevent students and staff are *quarantined time or illness; *devices or connectivity issues; *mental health

What steps are being taken to address or overcome these barriers?*:

Alexander School provides transportation needs for all students to attend calendar scheduled school days, Friday Intervention and High Five League as well as Family Fun Nights, Parent/Teacher Conferences or other time community/school activities.

APS provides devices for all students and staff to be used to connect with courses if quarantined and our Friday Intervention Time for students to catch up with work if ill. All classrooms and courses are set up to be able to virtually connect with students or staff who are in quarantine. Staff do not use a sick day if they are able to connect virtually and participate with students.

APS is working with Reservation Telephone Cooperative, our local internet company and applying for funds from the FCC Emergency Connectivity Grant to assure connectivity for all students who cannot afford it or are out of reach from the network.

APS is working with the Village Business Institute to provide free on line mental health sessions to all employees and working with Wilmac Special Education Unit and Upper Missouri Health District to provide mental health services to our students.

APS has a nondiscrimination and anti harassment policy which allow all students, teachers and all staff access regardless of race, sex, gender or disability. APS also has an anti bullying policy.

APS administration are trained in Title IX Students and staff receive information on Title IX throughout the school year.

All information on programs and policies are disseminated during school registration. Our policies are all available on our website and phone app as well as in hard copy form at the front office. Alexander School sends out a weekly newsletter and a monthly newspaper informing our stakeholders of school information and activities. All information is available on-line and in hard copy.
