


9/11 Remembrance





Skyrim: The Elder Scrolls V: A Great Game by Jayden Almon

Skyrim is a single-player fantasy first-person RPG developed by Bethesda Softworks in 2011. I was first introduced to the game after finding it on the shelf which contained all of the video games that my father had, who likely got it when it was first released.


The game takes place within the fictional world of Nirn, on the massive continent of Tamriel during the 4th major era. Along with magic and many perils, Tamriel is a large and diverse continent with 10 different civilized races. There is nothing modern in the game...well, except for the many dwarven ruins dotted around Tamriel, but the dwarves have long since disappeared without a trace. Skyrim, the northernmost province of Tamriel, and the fifth entry in the series take place about 200 years into the fourth era. However, the game begins rather suddenly. You rate it a 7.5 out of 10. I have also heard news that a 10thwake up on a shoddy wooden horse-drawn wagon, seeing others clothed in rags and their hands bound, (yours are bound as well). One speaks up "Hey, you! You're finally awake," he says, as you realize you are on a prisoner cart. As you ponder your destination, the rest of the prisoners bicker at each other, until the guard riding the wagon tells everyone to shut up. Everyone goes quiet as you all arrive at your destination, the chopping block at the town of Helen.

The wagon stops and everyone is loaded off. Names are called on a list, and then, you are called. As you walk up, the man reading the list notices that you aren't on the list, however, the general calls for you to be punished anyway. So the man asks for your name and the character creator pops up. Now, I won't say anything past that, for you to find out yourself if you wish to play the game. Although this game may not be up your alley, that is fine.

The remainder of the game is spent exploring the continent of Skyrim and surviving the many perils therein.



I would recommend this game to anyone who enjoys fantasy-style RPGs. The game has some complex but good customization although it is a bit flawed. The game's graphics have aged poorly over time and it also has a limited number of voice actors-many of the voices you hear, mostly just the men, are the same, though this is one of the game's many charms. There is also a decent number of weapon archetypes, that number being 11, but there are 13 different metals the weapons can be made of, you know iron, steel, silver, glass, and ebony, just to name a few. There is also alchemy and enchanting as well, and boy it can get wild here. Even then, Skyrim is a great game with a pretty good story, an immense amount of sidequests, but there are some flaws here and there. The game does have its charms, and I would anniversary edition is coming out soon this year, for the newer consoles that came out.



The Sunburst Wildcats football team are 0-3. The 3 losses have come from Centerville, Power-Dutton-Brady, and Big Sandy. The Centerville game's score was 6-25 and the first drive of the season was a touchdown by fullback Ethan Samsal. In the Power-Dutton-Brady game, the Wildcats lost 0-26, but all of the points came in the 1st half. The only injuries for the year were in the first 3 plays of the Power-Dutton-Brady game when tailback Wyatt Rogers injured his foot when he was tackled by a PDB player whose name is Jenner. A quote from the injured player himself: "Stupid Jenner!"

On September 18, the Wildcats played the Big Sandy Pioneers, to no avail. The final score for that game was 13-38. The two touchdowns came from tailback/quarterback Devon Hutton. The next time you will see the Wildcats play will be against the North Star Knights in Sunburst on September 21st. The Wildcats will also play the Knights again the next week in North Star on October 2nd, and the Valier Panthers on October 9th (Homecoming Week).

The Wildcats volleyball have, as of 9/18, a 3-2 record. In the first game, the Wildcats lost to Simms 0-2, on September 9th, with the scores being 12-25 and 17-25. On September 11, the Wildcats beat the Valier Panthers 2-1. The scores were 25-23 Sunburst, 23-25 Valier, and 15-10 Sunburst. They have also beat the Heart Butte Warriors in 3 games. The first game was 25-19 Sunburst, then 25-19 Heart Butte, and then Sunburst came and won it all in the third match 15-5. On September 18, the Wildcats played the Cascade Badgers, beating them in 2 matches. The scores were 25-18 and 25-19. They then lost to the Belt Huskies in 2 matches, with scores of 25-7 and 25-9

The upcoming schedule is for the Wildcats to take on the Power Pirates on Sept. 23 in Power and then the day after face the Dutton-Brady Diamondbacks on Sept. 24. On October 1, They then play the GFCC Mustangs in Great Falls. The Wildcats play in the North Star Invite on October 2 in North Star. For the Homecoming game, they play the Augusta Knights on October 8. Later that day, they compete in the JH District tournament @ Belt on October 8-9. For the last few games, they play Valier on October 15 in Sunburst, and Simms on October 16 in Sunburst.






