From the Desk of the Superintendent

Happy Fall! We are excited to be back in school and ready for all that lies ahead. With classes in full swing and fall activities underway it makes it a very busy time of year. Thanks to the support of our wonderful staff, students, families, and communities, we are off to a great start. Normal: the word of the year coming off a year that was anything but. Throughout the summer and beginning of the school year, one phrase we heard over and over was "normal year." As we all discuss how and when we will get back to normal, it might be time to acknowledge that we are truly living in extraordinary times. And maybe, instead of hoping for "normal", we should hope the upcoming year will be amazing. As life settles into what is commonly referred to as "our new normal," we need to remember and appreciate the growth we have experienced and all we have to be thankful for. Riverside is doing just that! RPS starts the year with five new staff members- Deb Brownfield as our Cedar site principal, Dan Wolken as our 9-12 Social Science teacher and 9-12 athletic director, Kalie Bloom as our assistant women's basketball coach and Spalding site paraprofessional, Jaiden Switzer as a Cedar site paraprofessional, and Mary Auten as a Cedar site cook and custodian. We welcome them and their families to our community and are excited about the energy and enthusiasm they bring to Riverside Public School. Along with new staff members, we also welcome 10 new K-12 students to the district. We also welcomed 21 of our youngest Chargers to school on August 24th as they started their educational journey as preschoolers. This rounds out our student enrollment for the 2021/22 school year at 242 students.

At the September Riverside Board of Education meeting, the 2021-2022 budget was approved. The district saw a .25% decrease in district valuations. The board of education approved a 57.12 cent levy. This is a .001 cent or .247% increase over the past year. Even with this .247% levy increase, the board did vote to keep the tax asking the same as the previous school year at \$4,491,490. With our previous year's levy of 56.98 cents, we were in the bottom 10% of the lowest levy's in the state. We predict our new levy of 57.12 cents, will have Riverside in the bottom 8% of the lowest levies in the state of Nebraska. Assessment and data are important pieces to school systems in today's world. Technology is another essential part. As we continue to grow in these areas and receive data regarding our growth as a district, we will keep you well informed. Due to the pandemic, only certain portions of school data will be released this year due to no state data collected in the 2019-2020 school year. We anticipate district trends and demographic data to be released later this month from the Department of Education as well. We will share all this data with the public at that time. As we reflect back on the past year, we have learned how important the little things are to us. We gained a new appreciation for the many things we used to take for granted. We came together as schools and communities and developed plans and ideas in order to reach the common goal of doing what is best for our students. We sacrificed but we succeeded. Change is hard. Change is good. Change is inevitable. Even in years of "normal", change happens, and in extraordinary years that change brings with it positivity and opportunities. We are looking forward to this 2021-2022 school year and all that it brings. There will be many great accomplishments that our staff and students will achieve this year and we are thrilled you are a part of the journey with us!



COUNSELOR CORNER Ms. Chayeski Hand Model of the Brain

ELEMENTARY LESSONS

CEREBRAL CORTEX

This year we are kicking of elementary social emotional lessons with discussions about our brains, via D.r Siegel's hand model of the brain. Dr. Daniel Siegel's hand model of the brain allows us to picture our brain structure and understand why it's difficult to control our reactions when we're overwhelmed with strong emotions, especially stress and anger. The hand model of the brain helps them imagine what's happening inside their brain when they get upset so that they can identify and deal with negative emotions more effectively.

As its name suggests, you need to use your hand for understanding how the brain regulates our emotions. The palm controls our basic body functions. The thumb represents big feelings like anger or stress and lives with the palm in the downstairs brain. The other fingers are the thinking brain (the upstairs brain). When we lift our fingers ("flip our lid"), our thinking brain is no longer connected to our feelings. That's when our children throw a tantrum or cry uncontrollably. Which is nothing unusual or to be ashamed of, but what if there was another way?

After learning about our brains and our need to self regulate our emotions, we have started discussing coping skills to get our brain to calm down. I encourage you to ask your students to teach you the hand model of the brain and share their favorite calm down strategy.



As a requirement for Riverside Public School to begin the 2021-2022 school year and be eligible for ESSERS funds, the district's Covid19 Plan has been reviewed and revised. In doing so, the plan has been modified to reflect the current and anticipated conditions. The guidelines on the plan reflect nearly "normal" attendance conditions for the 2021-22 school year.
