



Students are ranked at the end of 1st semester of Senior year for scholarships and college applications. Final ranking is computed at the end of the school year.



Honor Grad. Status




Students need a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher (no rounding)



Valedictorian & Salutatorian



Will be determined by class rank once all grades are final after the 2nd semester of Senior year.





- It's the responsibility of the parents and/or students to register through the <u>NCAA eligibility center</u> to ensure they meet all requirements.
- Please let your counselor know if you plan to participate in athletics at the college level so they can help advise course selection and graduation track.
- For DI and DII schools:
 - 16 core courses by the end of their senior year. Student will typically take 14 core
 courses to meet graduation requirements. Most students will make up the 2
 remaining by taking 2 years of foreign language or taking more science or social
 studies credits.
 - Students will need to have a <u>CORE</u> GPA of 2.3 or higher with a qualifying ACT or SAT score.
 - Student will need to be registered through the NCAA portal.


- Ensure job and know what direction you want to go with the company.
- Ask about advancement opportunities or continuing education.

- Take ASVAB: Oct.27 & March 8
- Meet/reach out to recruiters.
- Decide which branch is a good fit for you.
- Compare benefit and incentive packages.

- Apply to narrowed list of colleges
- Request official transcript from registrar
 - Request shot records and test scores included
- Complete FAFSA
- Retake ACT if needed
- Complete YOUniversal application for AR scholarships and grants
- Check the <u>counseling website</u> routinely for updated scholarship information

- Research, visit, and compare programs
 - Make calls
 - Compare timelines
 - Employment?
 - Financial Aid?
- Some programs may be offered at local community colleges
- Complete YOUniversal app to see if the program is covered by AR grant or scholarship








Creating a college list on Naviance







Arkansas Workforce Challenge

<u>AWC</u> Scholarship

The Workforce Challenge Scholarship was created in the 2017 legislative session and is funded by lottery revenue for the purpose of workforce training in high demand areas of healthcare, information technology, and industry.

- Non-credit, workforce training classes also count.
- Minimum Eligibility Requirements
 - Must be an Arkansas resident and US Citizen/Lawful permanent resident
 - Must be high school graduate or received high school equivalency
 - Must **not** be a current recipient of the AR Challenge Scholarship
 - If student is offered both, system will default to ACS.
 - Must attend an eligible Arkansas institution
 - Must be in satisfactory academic standing
 - Must maintain eligibility requirements



Governor's Distinguished Scholarship

- Eligibility:
 - 32 ACT or 1410 SAT; AND
 - 3.5 Academic GPA; OR
 - National Merit Finalist or National Achievement Scholar
- Up to 375 awards per year
- Up to \$10,000 per year
 - Recipients must:
 - Attend college full time- 15 semester hours
 - 12 hours during Freshman Fall semester
 - Complete 27 hours the first year
 - 30 hours each year thereafter
 - Maintain a 3.25 GPA
 - Be enrolled in a program leading to a Bachelor's Degree
 - Can now enroll part-time as Seniors and receive a prorated award amount. (ACT 834)

Governor's Distinguished

ACT 755 Challenge & Governor's Distinguished Stacking

- Students can now receive ACS AND GDS
- Challenge will supplement GDS awards
 - EX: Freshman will receive \$9000 from GDS and \$1000 from ACS.

Arkansas Academic Challenge

FOR TRADITIONAL STUDENTS

- Basic Eligibility Criteria
 - Accepted for admission at an approved institution of higher education as a full-time student in a program of study that leads to a Bachelor's degree, Associate's Degree, Qualified certificate, or Nursing School diploma
 - Applicant must complete the YOUniversal Scholarship Application and the FAFSA
 - Must apply during Senior year of high school
 - Must enroll at an institution of higher education as a full-time, first-time Freshman
 - Complete at least 27 hours as a full-time, first-time Freshman
 - Achieve at least a 2.5 GPA

AR Academic Challenge Scholarship



Arkansas Academic Challenge

FOR TRADITIONAL STUDENTS

Academic Eligibility

- Graduate from an Arkansas public school, private school, or homeschool
- Earn a 19 on the ACT

Test Scores

- Students can now qualify using ACT SUPERSCORES (ACT 549)
- May substitute a comparable score from:
 - SAT 990
 - ASSET 40
 - o Compass 64
 - Classic Accuplacer 79
 - Next Generation Accuplacer 246

Continuing Eligibility

- 12 Semester hours Fall Semester
- 15 Semester hours per semester thereafter
- Successfully complete 27 semester hours the first year
- Successfully complete 30 hours each semester thereafter
- Complete all required remedial courses within the first 30 semester hours after receiving the scholarship.

Arkansas Academic Challenge Award Amounts

FOR TRADITIONAL STUDENTS

4 year Institutions

- \$1,000 = Freshman
- \$4,000 = Sophomore
- \$4,000 = Junior
- \$5,000 = Senior

Maximum of 120 hours

2 year Institutions

- \$1,000 = First year
- \$3,000 = Second year

Maximum of five (5) semesters

- Earned credit hours transcript and request must be submitted by June 1st
- Previous recipients of the scholarship will continue to receive the amounts stipulated in their original award.
- If student has remaining eligibility, they can use the scholarship towards a graduate level or professional degree.

Private Scholarships

- Local scholarships
 - Local schools (ex: MHS PTSO)
 - Local, state, or national civic groups (JCL or Elks Lodge)
 - Local and national businesses
 - Parent or student work, church affiliation, civic group
- Heritage based scholarship
- Scholarship Search engines
- Need-based, merit-based some will be both
- FAFSA is usually NOT required
- Visit <u>MHS Scholarship List</u> Check weekly for updates.

*** Never, Ever pay for scholarship searches!!!
