III. College Timetable

- Start by asking yourself some questions. Does my academic plan meet my interest & abilities? Why do I want to go to college? What are my goals for the future? What are my academic and personal strengths and weaknesses? How you answer these questions will give you a great start toward your college choice.

- Visit colleges whenever possible. Actually seeing the campus, touring the facilities, visiting a class, will help you decide if the school is right for you.
- By the start of next school year, your selection process should be narrowed down to two or three schools.

- Required for graduation
- March 5th ACT Plus Writing
- A multiple choice test that measures <u>English</u>, <u>Math</u>, <u>Reading</u>, <u>Science</u> & <u>Writing</u>, reasoning abilities used to help predict college preparedness.
- March 6th WorkKeys Applied Math, Reading for Information, and Locating Information.
- March 7th Michigan Math, Science, and Social Studies
- **VI. Dual Enrollment** Attend local colleges during Jr./Sr. year. Limit of <u>TEN</u> classes per student during high school.
 - Eligibility is based on PLAN /ACT scores.
