Universal and correct wearing of masks	Y (Y/N)	GUSD may require face coverings such as masks/face shields depending upon local health data including the rate of infection and spread. Students and staff over the age of four may be asked to wear face coverings inside GUSD facilities and while using GUSD-provided transportation. A face covering may be a cloth face mask, disposable face mask, and/or face shield. Face coverings should be worn by staff and students as feasible and are most essential in times when physical distancing is difficult. If GUSD requires face masks based upon local/statewide recommendation, then face coverings will be provided for those that cannot provide their own. Exceptions to this requirement include: 1. Individuals with a health condition, a communication or impairment, or a disability that prevents them from wearing a face covering. 2. When under the supervision of a school staff official who directs the covering to be removed; and 3. while individuals are eating, drinking, or exercising.

- (a) An LEA must describe in its plan under section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services—

- (H) Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies.
- (I) Coordination with State and local health officials.
- (ii) how it will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address students' academic needs and students' and staff social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services.

(b)(i) During the period of the ARP ESSER award established in section Start Printed Page 212022001(a) of the ARP Act, an LEA must regularly, but no less frequently than every six months (taking into consideration the timing of significant changes to CDC guidance on reopening schools), review and, as appropriate, revise its plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services.

- (ii) In determining whether revisions are necessary, and in making any revisions, the LEA must seek public input and take such input into account
