## Academics

## Benchmarks

Our ELA timed writing benchmark results showed some improvement, but as our teacher analysis indicated, there was some persistent issues that have not improved with any significance the last three quarters. The rubric scores between Q2 and Q3 did not show great improvement overall other than a significant doubling of the number of 12 th grade students scoring a 4 . However, worth noting is the general improvement of struggling students in 12th grade. The Q1 benchmark results showed that $27 \%$ of all CP 12th graders scoring a 0 or 1 score, but only $3 \%$ scoring in this range on the Q3. Also, 12th graders scoring a 3 score increased $27 \%$ from Q1 to Q3. A positive decreasing trend was our10th graders scoring in the 1 to 2 range which decreased by $12 \%$ while those scoring in the 3 to 4 range increased by $7 \%$ ( $8 \%$ increase in the 4 range).

Students across all grade levels have improved their analysis of what a particular prompt is asking and therefore creating thesis statements that address the prompt and generally respond appropriately to what the prompt is asking in the essay as a whole. The 12th grade prompt, as indicated in the teacher analysis, created some unforeseen difficulties because of the difficulty of the prompt and also because students received little to no instruction on the prompt itself compounded the issue. By 12th grade this scaffolding should be pulled away particularly by Q3.

The majority of our teachers still feel the need to work on body paragraphs and there were also comments, which we have seen in every benchmark, about the challenges struggling readers encounter when they are asked to write analytically while struggling to comprehend what a prompt is even asking.

Finally, our ELA team has been using the online testing platform in Illuminate to test students on additional CCSS claims, targets and standards using assessments they have built. We will soon be providing data from these assessments.

The math benchmarks are now created and reside in Illuminate as are the accompanying reports and analysis. These benchmarks are the same benchmarks that were in OARS and used in previous years but teachers spent PLC time this year reviewing and updating some of those assessments. Our math teachers have selected a report format that give feedback on standards performance by course and ranks the standard performance of our students from the highest performance on a standard to the lowest while continuing to assign point values to each standard. The commentary and analysis in this report echos reports in the past in that challenges that the CCSS standards present are consistent from benchmark to benchmark and year to year - questions with multiple answers, performance tasks and multistep problems. Our math team has been the most consistent with implementing EDI and recognize the value and impact of their implementation.

Our social studies 3Q reports are the first using Illuminate and are providing subgroup performance data which is a welcome addition to the report and as expected "illuminates" the achievement gaps between whites and other ethnic groups, but also between English Only "EO" speakers and others.

Our science benchmarks for Q3 have substantially changed incorporating much more CCSS and NGSS tasks and have progressively evolved to focus more on writing and close reading analysis. The goal of this new
format, as noted by biology teacher Don Rowan, is aimed at "providing a more standardized measure of academic reading and writing progress across multiple subjects and years."

## Signing Day

BUHS staff represented their or their kids' colleges by wearing college $t$-shirts or sweatshirts on College Signing Day. The Bronco Roundup conducted individual interviews of students who had committed to college and these interviews will be aired on the Bronco Stampede program in the Roundup and also run on the school digital media displays.
