

Brushy Public School ARP ESSER III Use of Funds Updated 10/21/21

Brushy Public School will utilize funds from the American Rescue Plan to continuously and safely operate, address academic impact of lost instructional time and provide interventions that will respond to the academic, social, emotional and health needs of all students.

To continuously and safely operate, Brushy Public School will pay salaries to continue to employ staff, use funds to pay property insurance and utilities in order to operate, purchase cleaning supplies to provide a safe environment and repair and seal the main school building roof as well as update or replace existing HVAC units throughout the campus, including additions to the gymnasium, to address declining air quality and support student respiratory health. Brushy School will also hire additional Paraprofessionals to aide in the social distancing of "high risk"

students.

To address the academic impact of lost instructional time Brushy Public School will implement summer learning and extended day opportunities for students. The district will offer summer learning opportunities for our students throughout the summer months to address learning gaps created by the pandemic. The program will run through May, June and possibly July, four hours per day, five days a week. The program will also provide for a librarian through the summer to allow resources to be checked out, such as books, hotspots and other materials as needed. Funds will be used to hire additional enrichment teachers that specialize in math and reading. The district implemented a before and after school program to assist students and parents that is available five days a week. The program began one hour before school started and extended two and a half hours after school. The program offered tutoring and daycare for families to eliminate some of the cost associated with child care services and addresses learning gaps created by the pandemic.

Brushy Public School will address the social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students through the employment of a counselor. The counselor will provide guidance and SEL interventions to assist students, especially those at higher risk to be disproportionately impacted by Covid-19.

Brushy Public School will ensure that the interventions it implements, including but not limited to the interventions implemented under section 2001(e)(1) of the ARP Act to address the academic impact of lost instructional time, will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students by:
