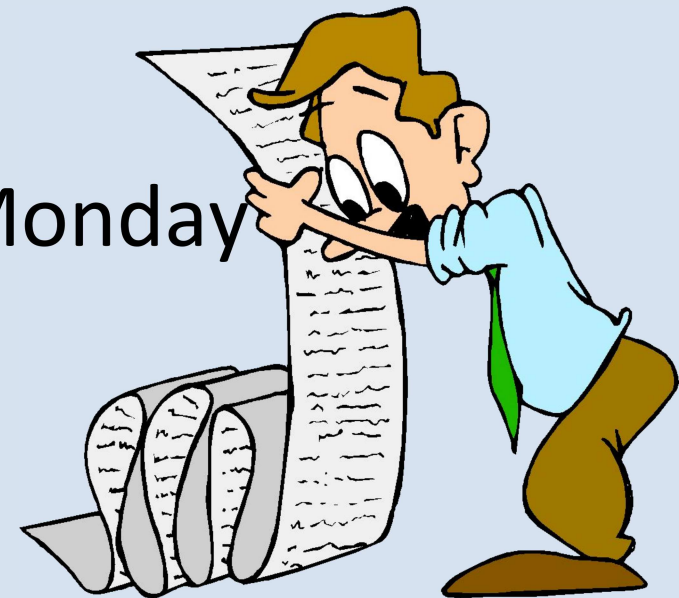

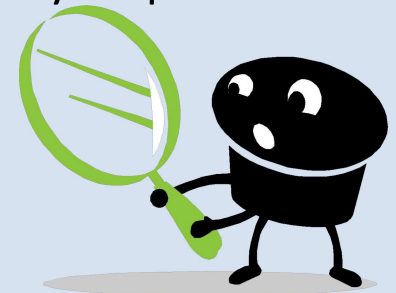

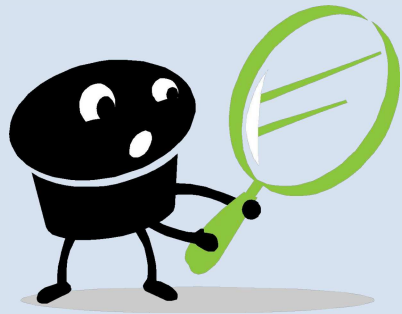


# Logistics of the *Search*

Your goal: a results list with a small number of articles, but with as many helpful articles as possible. The less articles you can't use = less wasted time!



- **Think about words:** Search engines and databases search for articles and websites that contain the keywords you choose. Think about the words or phrases you want to find in an article and use those as keywords in your search.
- **Mine for words:** like a miner uses a pick ax to gather diamonds, use information you find in your articles to make better searches in the future. You will find names of people, events, organizations, dates, etc that are new to you and can lead you to a better search.
- **Subject headings help:** most databases will give you subject headings of each article. This is a list of the subjects in the article. They are clickable links to other articles with the same subject. Subject headings make great keywords too!
- **And is your friend:** It is a way to use two keywords or key phrases in a search to get better results.

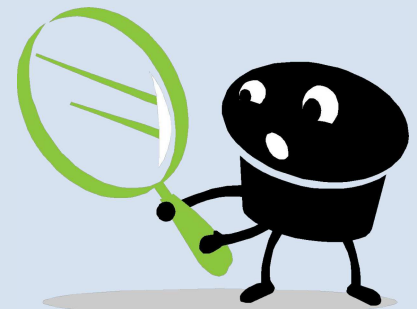


# Logistics of the *Search*, continued

- **Quotation Marks are good friends too:** use quotes to keep phrases in order. The search “Princess Diana” will yield only results in which the articles talk about the person “Princess Diana”, and avoid articles with the word princess or Diana, and are about other princesses or other Dianas.
- **Exploit your killer docs!** A killer doc is one that is fantastic, that gives you goosebumps and makes you excited because it’s exactly what you’ve been looking for for hours or even days. Find out what other articles the author of this document wrote on the subject. Is there a works cited at the end of the article? If so see if you can find the articles and websites the author used to find more information. And mine it for more words and phrases important to your topic.
- **Use Advanced Search screens:** this will allow you to use multiple keywords and phrases to hone in on exactly what you are looking for!

# Logistics of the *Search*, continued

- **Think bigger than Google and Wikipedia!** So far most of your research has been through a search engine like Google or on Wikipedia. They have served you well. But now you are looking for scholarly research. You are kicking it up a notch. It's what your future teachers and employers expect you to be able to do. So use the databases. The difference is databases contain articles from newspapers and magazines. These articles are written by professional researchers and writers. They make a living doing this. They have editors and fact checkers who make a living double checking the information in the articles. The publishers spend a lot of money to pay writers, researchers, editors and fact checkers and to publish the material and make it available to those who want solid information. That is why you pay for a subscription to the Kokomo Tribune or Sports Illustrated, etc. Yes they have websites, but not everything they publish is free through the website. Google and Wikipedia just can't give you the the reliability of solid sources every time.

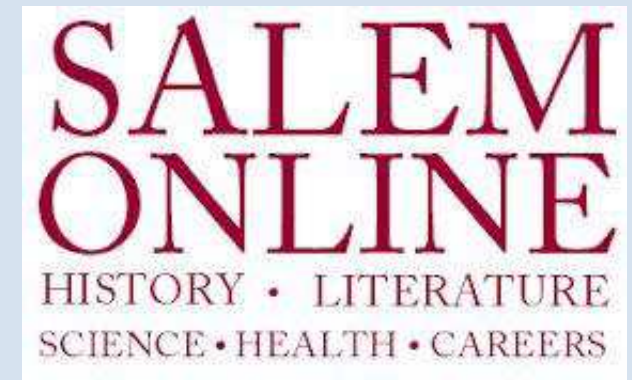

# Sorting your results



- When you perform a search, you can sort the results you get back in multiple ways:
- Most recent – search results will return in date order (or reverse date order if you choose oldest to newest)
- Relevance (or Best) – search results will be in order the database believes are most relevant to your topic based on the keyword(s)/phrase you used. Not getting the desired results, change your keyword(s)/phrase!

- **Select the second page “Electronic Databases”**
- **The databases are listed in alphabetical order.**

- **Notice the list of databases inside of Infobase Learning.** Choose the one that seems the most likely to provide you with information on your subject.

### NEWSMAKER PROFILE

**Princess Diana**

**Diana, Princess of Wales** (born Diana Frances Spencer) (1961-97), former wife of Charles, Prince of Wales, the heir to the British throne. Diana had wed Charles in a glittering 1981 ceremony that drew a worldwide television audience of 700 million people. Although the couple produced two sons over the next three years (the so-called heir and spare), their marriage soon turned sour. They separated in 1992 and divorced in 1996. Diana died in 1997 in an automobile accident in Paris.

Diana was born on July 1, 1961 in Sandringham, England to a wealthy and titled family. When she was six, however, her parents separated and subsequently went through an acrimonious divorce. Diana attended several private schools in England and Switzerland. After working briefly as a part-time cook and as a nanny, she became a teacher at a fashionable private kindergarten in London. Upon the death of her grandfather in 1975, her father, previously Lord Althorp, became the 8th Earl Spencer, and Diana became Lady Diana Spencer.

Diana had just turned 20 when she wed the then 32-year-old Prince Charles in 1981. The wedding immediately thrust her into the public spotlight, and the attractive and glamorous Diana soon became the most popular member of Britain's royal family, often eclipsing her husband. [See 1981 Prince Charles of Britain Weds Lady Diana Spencer; Ceremony Performed at St. Paul's]

Diana gave birth to the couple's first son, William, in 1982, and to their second son, Henry (known as Harry), in 1984. [See 1984 Great Britain: Princess Diana Gives Birth; 1982 Great Britain: Royal Heir Born]

In 1992, the royal family was rocked by publication of a book titled "Diana: Her True Story," by British journalist Andrew Morton. Among other things, the book revealed that Diana had been wounded by her husband's continued close relationship with his former girlfriend, Camilla Parker Bowles, and that depression over the state

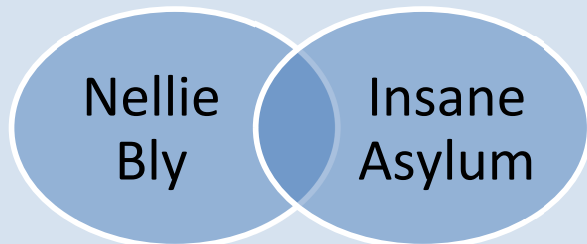

# Keyword Search Hints

- **Use quotes around names and phrases:** to “glue” words in order. Otherwise your key phrase or name may be separated by lines or paragraphs, and your results may not be about your topic.
- **Use an asterisk (\*) at end of search term for different endings:** laugh\*=laughing>laughs>laughter>laughed.  
Don't truncate too soon. Hum\*=human>humbug>hummus>humorous...
- **Use advanced search to string 2 or more keywords together :** using multiple keywords or phrases yields results based on your needs
- **~ (tilde) placed directly in front of a keyword will give you synonyms.** Helpful if your search is close but you can't quite find the exact word you need to get the results you desire. Or use a thesaurus.

# Boolean Search: to combine multiple keywords and phrases

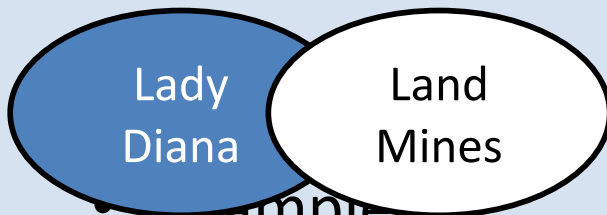
- AND



Example: **Nellie Bly AND Insane Asylum**

*Narrows by retrieving only documents containing both terms (fewer results)*

- NOT

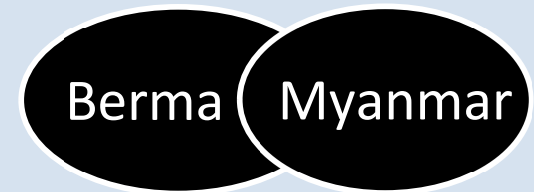


Example:

- “**Lady Diana**” **NOT** “**Land Mines**”
- *Limits by retrieving content containing only the first term. Use when you need to eliminate a keyword or phrase*

**Allows you to combine two or more keywords to get more relevant results!**

- OR



Example: **Berma OR Myanmar**

- *Expands your search by retrieving documents containing either term. More results. Use when something is called by two different names. Flu = influenza*



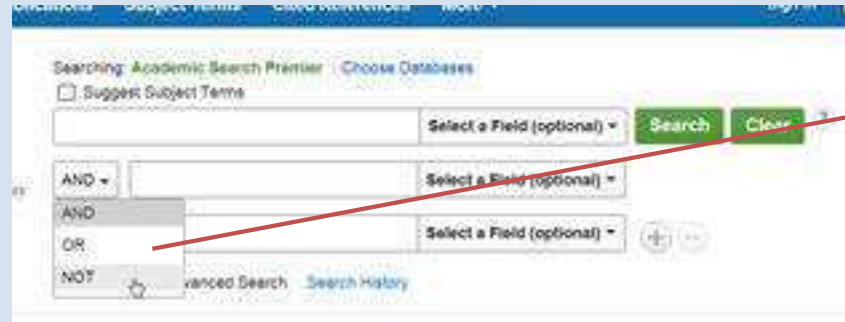

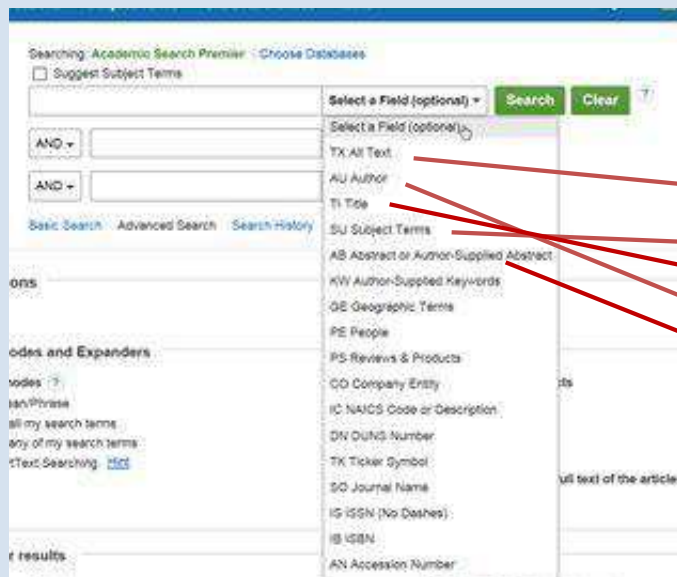

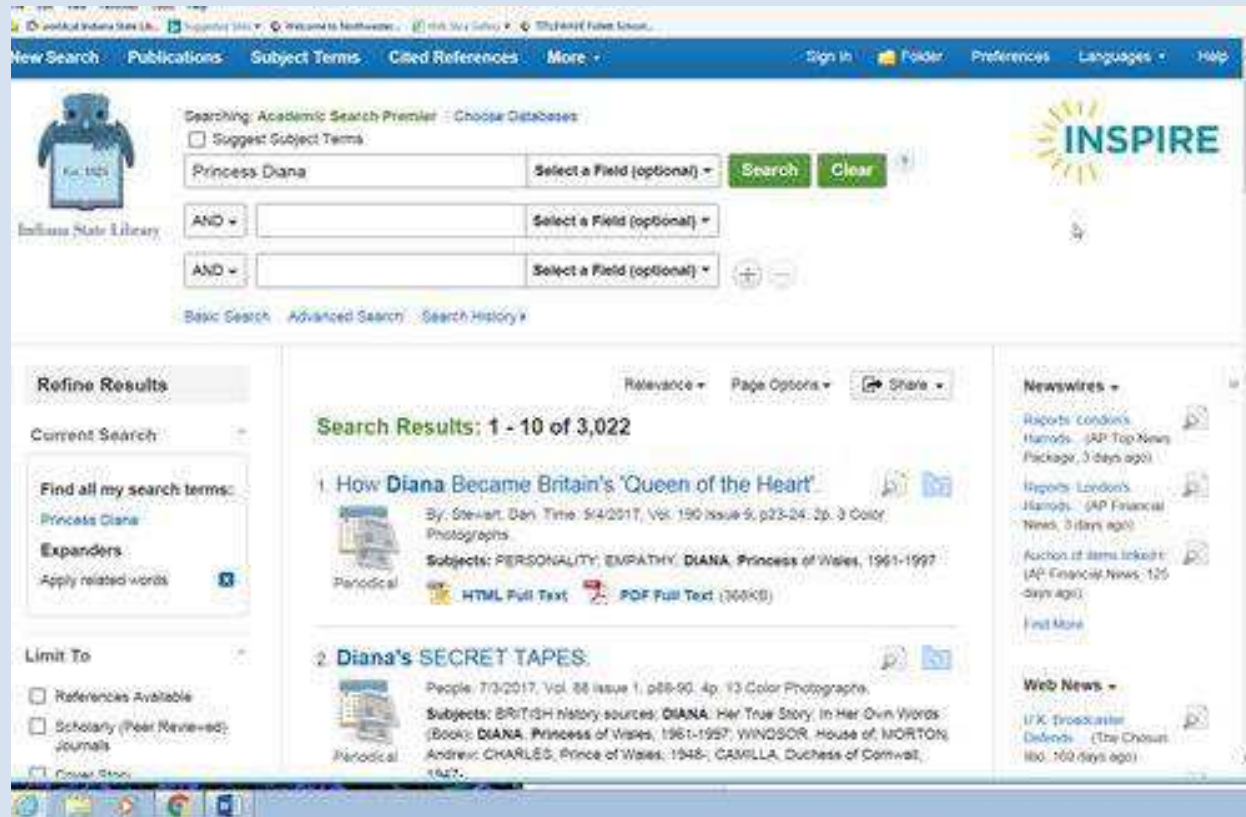

# Why Use an Advanced Search?



To narrow down your sources! This search for Princess Diana gave 3,022 articles! That is too many to search through. It also gives me articles about other princesses and other Diana's that are not relevant to my topic.

# Make the Results More Relevant!
