Course Title: Horse Management

Teacher - Mindy Puller

Essential Question: What are horses and how do you care for one?

<u>Description:</u> Students will be exposed to equine science and technology principles which include genetics, anatomy, physiology/nutrition, diseases, pests, and management practices. Learning activities are varied, with classroom, laboratory and field experience emphasized. Students may be off site at times, working with real horses. Final learning project includes Precision Equine Exams.

Course Title: How to be a Film Critic...and actually know what you're talking about.

Teacher – Matt Raikes

Essential Question: What are the aspects of high quality film production?

<u>Description:</u> Watch academy award winning videos like Inception, Hugo, Gravity, Black Panther, INterstellar and more. During this class you will watch films and study what the different aspects of film are. From the screenplay to editing and production design. MPAA Rated Movies of PG-13 or less.

Course Title: Big League Manager

Teacher – Scott Reardon

Essential Question: How are various baseball statistics calculated? How does a sportswriter prepare an article on a game or series?

Description: Manage a major league baseball team and play a shortened season against your classmates using the APBA table top baseball game. Learn how to keep score in a baseball scorebook. Track batting and pitching statistics in an electronic spreadsheet, and perform a variety of statistics functions such as winning percentage, ERA, batting average, total bases, slugging percentages, etc. Calculate probability on a variety of outcomes for a specific batter in certain situations.

Course Title: Competitive Construction

Teacher – Paul Jessup & Devon Bouvier Essential Question: How do I create a tiny home? Or "How do I create a DIY bathtub and surround?

<u>Description:</u> By the end of the second week of this J Term course, students will construct a stand-alone bathtub surround from ground up. Students will demonstrate their knowledge of basic construction skills like, but not limited to, Geometric measurements common in construction, building codes, tactile skill-sets such as framing, tiling, plumbing, and adhesive work. Description: During the WWII era, it was very common for short films, posters, and radio broadcasts to promote "American Ideals."
