 and decisions must be made based on the collective benefits to the students of this District. As


an elected official, each Trustee has an obligation to bring their unique perspective to each issue, advocate for that position and then respectfully support the majority vote of the board.

Administrative Reports

September 2022

2021-2022 School Year

Updated: 9/14/22

High School Commons

9/14/22 – Concrete polish was completed with varied degrees of success. There were a lot of details such as transitions and wall damage that were addressed by FTSD. Paint was used to address wall damage due to machines and cove base removal. The commons stair rails were painted and epoxied and a new Bronc art piece and dedication plaque was installed.

High School Flood

9/14/22 - All remediation and repair is complete except for the carpet replacement that will take place later in the year.

Restroom Partitions

North Campus

9/14/22 – New restroom partitions were installed in the HS locker rooms and lower level HS old wing restrooms. Installation was complete prior to start of class. FTSD crew completed wall and floor repairs, paint, and reinstallation of dispensers.

High School Classroom Window

9/14/22 – Administration has requested the installation of a window in one of the lower old wing high school classrooms. A sketch was issued to a structural engineer for review, but file drawings for the old HS wing have some contradictory information that stalled the engineer review. We are waiting for the engineer to visit the building to assess the as built condition in order to continue with plans and drawings for approval.

High School Chem, Lab

9/14/22 –We are still on a waiting list to have the contents of the chemistry neutralizer tank tested as the first step to being able to empty it and refill with clean limestone. We were "tagged" while doing research on where to acquire new limestone for the neutralizer, and must go through the testing and proper removal of the old stone. The environmental groups that do the testing and removal are very few and there is a long wait list. The lab is okay to use water for rinsing, but has been asked to avoid using the dishwasher.

North Campus Power

9/14/22 — The South side power supply line for the stadium lights was replaced (in conduit) and field light use was restored prior to start of season. There are currently 7 bulbs not working. We have issued an order for those to be replaced, but have been waiting for ballast to arrive prior to the bulb replacement.

We have not experienced any serious power issues since the replacement of the MEC transformer. There is still planning going into installing a cut off that will protect the school from single phase events, but the process is moving slowly given the age of our main power frame.

Doors / Access

North Campus

9/14/22 — The new HS doors were installed – later than planned, but are functioning well. A plan for upgrading our door access control and placing more intercom/card readers is being developed. We are hoping to remove any need to have doors unlocked during the day.

District Boilers / Heat

South Campus

9/14/22 Boilers passed inspection in August. Will plan to engage boilers soon.

North Campus

9/14/22 Boilers passed inspection in August.

District Ventilation / Air

South Campus

9/14/22 - Filter changes are up to date.

North Campus

9/14/22 - Filter changes are up to date.

Roof Systems

North Campus

9/14/22 - Tremco completed all contracted roof repairs for the first phase of the roof maintenance plan.

September 2022

South Campus

9/14/22 - Tremco stabilized the Intermediate roof. No recent leaks reported.

We need to discuss the next phase of roofing repair / maintenance for next year and keep this cycle moving to avoid any other roof system failures.

Updated: 9/14/22

South Campus Building Exterior Projects

9/14/22— Some crack repair and initial prep was completed on the building, but after doing pull tests on the existing paint it has been determined that preparation to do paint correctly will be much larger than anticipated in the worst areas. We have ordered some paint for sections that can be painted, but will be suggesting metal covering on much of the building rather than paint. This has been frustrating.

Playgrounds / Equipment / Substrate

North Campus.

9/14/22 – Additional asphalt was added to the West end of the MS playground area. Road improvements near the asphalt were made and the mud issue is much improved.

South Campus

9/14/22 — The upper playground area has new barriers installed and additional substrate added. Two climbing features were removed from the play set and replaced with safety rail and a slide. Lower playground still needs a lot of work and will be addressed time and budget permitting.

Campus Water

South Campus

9/14/22 — The underground communication wire for the South campus water is still working, but the plan to go to a radio controlled device is in place. We have a proposal for the communication control, but are waiting for correct parts to be located.

North Campus

9/14/22 — All systems are operating without issue at this time. We are still waiting for a proposal for a redundant VFD controller for our geothermal well, which has proven to be a little difficult to design, but we feel is important to avoid another fire system outage by having the secondary system in place.

Lead Testing – We have begun the process of submitting new lead testing for all campuses. To date, we have had resting requirements due to us having our own water district, but now, we will need to do additional testing to satisfy new federal regulations through the DEQ. These testing criteria are much more stringent than previous requirements and are designed to make it very hard to pass if the service lines were installed in the days where lead was present in solder. Our water is safe, we ensure that every year, but this testing may put us into a difficult remediation process for our older buildings. Hopefully we will be fine, but given the age of our systems, will likely have to make decisions about water system upgrades in the near future.

Asphalt / Parking

<u>South Campus</u>: Chip seal was completed in late August. We will have the loose gravel swept soon and new lines painted. New lines were addressed at the West parent loop.

North Campus: Will be submitting a plan for chip seal / repair at the MS parking, bus loop and entries for next Summer. Chip seal appears to be a much better method of repairing and protecting the deep cracks that have developed in our parking areas.

Middle School Sign

9/14/22 – The Junior High sign was taken down and attachment method was determined for new letters that will be cut and painted by FSD.

Kitchen / Food Services

South Campus

9/14/22 - The air gap work required by MCCHD was completed to avoid a kitchen closure.

Rodent / Pest Control

9/14/22 - Perimeter control is being conducted for mice. Interior treatment for ants.

Gym Floors

9/14/22 – All gym floors were cleaned, sanded, and recoated over the Summer. Regular maintenance will continue per our custodial plan through the school year.

Grounds

9/14/22 – Our irrigation issues have been overwhelming this Summer. We have completed a lot of repair work, contracted some major repairs and additions, and are looking at a plan for a sprinkler maintenance program with a local irrigation contractor.

Grounds Equipment Garage at the South Campus:

9/14/22 - Went on hold when it was determined that we would needed to furnish an engineered foundation plan prior to being able to secure a DIY metal building. If we are to continue with installing this building project, we have been advised to hire an engineer to design a foundation for the attachment of the metal building to the parking lot — either a poured traditional slab, or drilled in posts with a foundation curb.

Classroom/Office /Exterior Lighting to LED's

9/14/22 - Some South campus restroom lighting was converted to LED over the Summer to provide better lighting conditions and meet codes.

Septic System

9/14/22 – Systems are operating as designed. We had two major septic clogs since the last report, both related to feminine products being flushed and blocking outflow resulting in standing water in buildings.

High School Commons:

9/14/22 – A purchase order was issued to Interstate / Shamrock for the commons floor polishing work. Work will likely take place during off hours as the contractor secured a full schedule during our long review and approval process.

Staffing

9/14/22 – We currently have enough staff to perform primary duties, but are missing $\frac{1}{2}$ time on South campus, and 1 full time on North campus. We cannot secure substitutes leaving us short on most days due to frequent sick days, or planned leave.

Security Systems @ North / South Campus

South Campus

9/14/22 – Additional cameras are desired near the bus storage and North playground. Proposals for the same were submitted, but have expired. Will need to request updated proposals and re-submit.

North Campus

9/14/22 – The West parking lot cameras have been restored and are working. We will continue to add or replace cameras as needed in accordance with our service contract with Systems Northwest. We are evaluating door security and requesting a revised proposal to upgrade control software, and add addition intercom door control.



Agriculture Science and FFA

We are really excited to offer Ag Science and FFA in Frenchtown. The following courses are being offered:

Introduction to Agriculture







- Enroll in school even if you are not living with a parent or guardian. Schools cannot require you to have a parent or guardian to sign paperwork if you are not living with them.
- Continue in the school you attended before you became homeless or the school you last attended.
- Receive transportation to and from school if you or a guardian request transportation.
- Participate in the same special programs and services as provided to all other students, including athletics and other extra-curricular activities
- You have the right to file a dispute if you disagree with any decision about your education.

Migration to Clever





Second Grade

We have had a great start to the school year. Thank you for helping to make that happen! We have two new team members who joined second grade this year.

Replacing Mrs. Undem is Mr. Lucas. We are so excited to have him after working with him last year as our 2nd grade title teacher. Welcome Mr. Lucas! Also changing positions to replace Ms. Duke, is Mrs. Lin. She joined our team very unexpectedly before school started but we couldn't be happier to have her! Mrs. Straw, Ms. Olson and Mrs. Croy are all still on the second grade team. We are so excited to have your children with us!

Students have been working hard learning our routines and expectations and we will continue to practice those to help them be successful. So far they are doing a great job! In reading we have been investigating Informational texts and looking at the author's purpose for writing the text. Students have enjoyed sharing about their own experiences as we have read about families and dogs.

Math so far has been a review of math mountains and single digit addition. We are practicing our math facts every day and gaining a great grasp on number sense. Practicing at home can be very helpful in student math proficiency. We're looking forward to a great school year! We think second grade is the absolute best!

Third Grade

It's hard to believe we are well into September! It has been a fun and productive year in 3rd grade so far this year. Mrs. Burklund, Mrs. Hoskinson, Mr. Gyapay and Mr. DiFulgentis are grateful for the opportunity to work with these smart and fun students.

During the 1st Quarter, our students have worked hard to build reading stamina and dive deeper into our texts by comparing and contrasting, identifying sequence of events, exploring character feelings, analyzing text features such as headings and captions, and calling out the author's purpose.

Students are currently writing their Personal Narratives. During this writing project, students are learning more about the writing process in crafting their own stories about an important event in their life. We've also been reviewing manuscript writing in preparation for cursive writing later this year. We are also practicing typing and are currently working on "home row" and not looking at fingers when typing.

In math we started the year by diving right into multiplication and division. The students have been working hard to become proficient with multiplication and division fact families from 0 through 10. They've also used multiplication to find the area of different shapes. We will continue with these skills all the way into the 2nd quarter.

In science, we've been learning about the entire process of pollination, the difference between plants and vegetables, and why flowers produce fruit. We're also exploring how certain traits of plants and vegetables have been recognized, selected, and intentionally cultivated over long periods of time to yield better tasting foods.

Social studies has been an opportunity to understand and explore Glacial Lake Missoula. We are also studying landforms, and will learn about the Salish people that originally inhabited the Frenchtown/Missoula Valley before European settlement.

PK-3 Counseling

The year has started off with great success! Our theme for the school year is: We Are Family! We Are Family embodies all that we are here in Frenchtown. We rally around each other, we support each other, encourage, lift up, and stand up for what is right! We have a great community here, and we are going to be celebrating that and promoting it all year. Our KICK OFF Assembly is on September 21st. The kids will be celebrating all that we are and the ways that we can strengthen our Frenchtown Family. We are gearing up to have some fun and make some memories....the staff is doing a FLASH MOB! Watch for videos and a very special thank you to our Music Department - they ALWAYS make things fun!

Counseling Education Lessons will begin right after our assembly. In the next month, students will be learning about who their counselor is, what a counselor does in school and how to ask for help from a counselor. Counselors are a great resource and we are so fortunate to have the best of the best in our school district. If your student is in need of support there are lots of ways that your student can see the counselor: 1) Parents or guardians can request for a check in 2)Staff can request a student see the counselor 3) A student can advocate for themselves and ask to see a counselor 4) a counselor might see a need and help out. All students have access to their school counselor.

We will also cover big problems and small problems. Students will learn that BIG problems mean they need to get a grown up. SMALL problems mean "I can fix it myself!" This independence and confidence will be encouraged using Kelso's Choices to solve those small problems. Kelso will be making an appearance in the classroom in the next month as well. That friendly frog teaches us so many great conflict resolution skills. Information will be coming home in Tuesday envelopes for parents and guardians to help support all these skills they are learning. And....get ready for breathing strategies. We usually start out with Milkshake Bubbles and you may hear your kids talking about this important self-regulation skill.

On September 6, 2022, it was announced that the Attorneys General of 33 states reached a \$439 Million settlement with JUUL Labs, Inc., based upon JUUL's deceptive marketing practices targeting minors and consumers, which parallels and reinforces the strength of our claims against JUUL. The settlement reached will resolve the cases filed by the Attorneys General of 33 states. Altria is not included in the settlements.

We continue to look forward to the first school district trial in this litigation set for November 7, 2022. This litigation will help provide insight on the matter as to liability and damages.

PERFORMANCE-BASED LEARNING: HOW IT WORKS

Should you give your students another assessment or worksheet from the textbook? Why aren't your students engaged in your classroom? Traditional instruction may not be enough for our 214 century students to be fully engaged, take ownership of their work, and activate their higher-order thinking skills. Active learning, through performance-based learning and assessment, is something that any teacher can implement in their own classroom with just a little planning, preparation, and progress monitoring.

Performance-based learning and performance-based assessment is a system of learning and assessment that allows students to demonstrate their knowledge and skills in a learning environment that embraces their higher-order thinking skills, as well as relating it to real-world situations (Performance-Based Learning and assessment, n.d.). This type of learning is an on-going process that allows student-centered learning and progress monitoring where teachers and students collaborate and adjust their learning where needed. When planning for performance-based learning, keep in mind that the content and instruction does not have to change, but instead of assessing the students' knowledge from the content, the student is allowed to demonstrate what they have learned. With proper preparation and planning, the instructor has full control over what the content is and how it is taught.

Performance-based learning is being implemented at all levels of learning, from primary and elementary to high school and higher education. Performance-based learning can be implemented along with traditional instruction when used in a balanced setting. As Hibbard et al. (1996) mentioned, "Performance-based learning and assessment achieve a balanced approach by extending traditional fact-and-skill instruction" (p. 5). The traditional learning coupled with performance learning allows for instructors to ensure that students master content standards and student learning objectives. Although utilizing traditional instruction along with performance-based learning can be time-consuming, and ensuring that all standards and SLOs are being taught effectively can seem cumbersome, once the material for allowing students to demonstrate what they have learned is created, the results and data collected on student achievement will be much more meaningful. Specific data and actual observations will help an instructor redirect or re-teach a student on the spot and in a timely manner.

So, what does a strategy or activity look like when it includes elements of performance-based learning or assessment? It may include:

 Focusing on the end in mind, then working backwards to understand what specific details the students will need to understand in order to perform a task. Think about what is most important for students to take away from an activity and how they can best demonstrate their learning.

- Using critical thinking, deep thinking, and problem-solving skills. This will
 help students think about how an activity can be approached in different ways,
 taking into account multiple variables in order for the best answer to be shown.
- Allowing students to see your expectations and how they will be graded. If
 using a rubric, give students a copy and give them information and criteria on
 how they will be graded on their performance. When students are given set
 standards with clear expectations upfront, they tend to have more accountability
 and ownership of their assignments.
- Providing a space, an app, or a program for students to use to show their level of understanding about the content learned. This space, app, and/or program could allow for mistakes to be made, and corrected, with an opportunity to explain their process for proceeding in the manner they chose.
- Allowing constant practice. Many students may not have had the opportunity to show or demonstrate their learning, so the opportunity to do so may be foreign. Practice of demonstrating and understanding of a concept may be necessary.

These may be steps you are already using in your course, so now, the key is to allow students to have more accountability and ownership of their work. Let them reflect and figure out why something worked or not. When students are given a chance to take ownership of their learning, they are more motivated and determined to succeed. Student ownership of learning also leads to self-reflection on their performance, which means that they are able to identify their own areas of strength and weakness. Then, of course, teacher feedback and follow- up with students regarding their performance and assessment is vital for students to fully receive the full effect of performance-based learning and assessment.

This type of instruction and assessment allows instructors and students to customize their learning and make it applicable to real-world situations. Once both instructors and students become more familiar with performance-based learning and assessments, and adapt their learning and thinking, the process becomes smooth and engaging. And, student achievement will be easier to observe and reflect upon.





ADULT MEAL PRICES SCHOOL YEAR 2022-2023

Revenue from the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs cannot be used to subsidize adult meals. The purpose of federal assistance is to provide nutritious meals to school children to safeguard their health and well-being.

If the school district subsidizes meals for teachers, administrators, custodians and other adults, the subsidy should be identified as an employee benefit and revenue source in the school foodservice budget.

The cost of meals served to adults directly involved in the operation and administration of the School Nutrition Programs (those preparing and serving food) may be supported by the foodservice operation. Any meal served to an adult (whether supported by the foodservice or not) may not be claimed for reimbursement or counted toward the USDA Foods entitlement.

The adult lunch price is required to be at least the total of the federal reimbursement for free students plus value of USDA Foods, plus state match. The adult breakfast price uses only the federal free reimbursement rate.

These adult prices are minimums required by USDA and are based on the same portion size served to students. Larger portions should be priced to cover cost.
