




THE FRENCHTOWN SCHOOL BOARD CUTS SCHOOL DISTRICT TAXES WHEN SETTING THE 2022-2023 SCHOOL BUDGET


Each August, School Boards across the state set and determine their budgets for the upcoming fiscal year. The fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30. When school boards set their district's budget, it establishes how much local taxpayers will pay to support the school district in which they reside. Five years in a row, the Frenchtown School Board has lowered the mill amount. In 2017-2018 the mill amount was 390.72, now for fiscal year 2022-2023 the are down to 302.09, which is below the mill amounts of 2013-2014 which were set at 305.75. Please see the mill chart history below:



There are factors that lead to the setting of mills; ANB is one of those contributing factors. ANB stands for "Annual Number Belonging" (student enrollment). ANB



The taxable value of the Frenchtown School District plays a role in the number of mills a school district can ask for as well. The taxable value of Frenchtown hit a low in 2016; however, taxable value has trended up the last six years. The higher the taxable value the more taxes can be spread out over a broad spectrum, easing the tax burden. Please see the Frenchtown School District's taxable value history below:

The Frenchtown Board of Trustees voted to run a mill levy 2:30 - 3:30 last spring asking for additional operating funds for the 2022-2023 school year. The levy failed. Increases to state aide, based on ANB (enrollment numbers) and inflationary components are the only increases the general fund has received for the last 16 years. The last time since an operational levy has been not voted in since 2006.

OCTOBER 20-21 - NO SCHOOL

October 20th and 21st are the two days set aside at the state level for teachers to participate in the professional development activities of their professional organizations. These days are commonly referred to as MEA days (Montana Education Association). If by chance you see our teachers COMMITTEE MEETINGS not attending these meetings it is because they have already attended professional development activities and (since August 9th) earlier workshops to further enhance their abilities to reach students.

FREE AND REDUCED LUNCH APPLICATIONS

We have the Free and Reduced Lunch applications available in the district office, on our website, as well as at the individual buildings. If you would like to complete the application process at any time during the school year, please call any of the offices and we will mail the application out to you. If you think your family might qualify, please complete the application and return it to school. 3. Meals that are covered by free or reduced applications are paid at a higher rate by the government than what we charge for lunch and breakfast. This helps to cover the added cost of providing lunch and breakfast to all of our students. We are required by state and federal law to keep confidential the names of all students who meet these qualifications, not even the classroom teacher knows if a child has qualified. Only the administrators in charge of reviewing the applications, the secretary and the lunch supervisor who enters the information into the system have knowledge of who has applied and who has qualified.



The Frenchtown School District is doing well in some areas and not so well in other areas in terms of employment. What we really need are SUBSTITUTES in virtually every area: Teachers, Custodians, Bus Drivers, and Food full force! Service. We also really need a few more paraprofessionals.

a day for those who do not hold a teaching certificate. For those who want to serve as substitute custodians or food service workers, for example, will earn \$13.01 per hour, which is an increase from \$11.88 per hour. Substitute bus drivers will now earn \$16.75 per hour with a guaranteed two hours per morning route and a guaranteed two hours per afternoon route with a total guaranteed four hours if both morning and afternoon shifts are driven.

We are also still in need of paraprofessional assistance. Depending on the educational level of an applicant the paraprofessional wages start anywhere from \$13.40 per hour to \$13.53 per hour depending on experience. Full time employees also have access to benefits such as sick, vacation, and retirement.

If you are interested in working at the school and working the same schedule as your child, then by all means give us a shout in the District Office or speak to one of our administrators about what these jobs entail. Again, we are doing well in many areas; however, we really could use some assistance in others.

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an allhazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol. The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff. teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the fol lowing actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and



SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.

WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN "Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"



A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.

It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the "Muscle Memory" associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.

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

If you or your family lives in any of the following situations:



In a homeless shelter In a hotel or motel

- In a campground, RV, or building that is not a home
- Doubled up with friends or
- relatives because you cannot find or afford housing

Then you and your family may have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act.

Students, you have the right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. You have the right to attend classes even if you don't have immunization records or a birth certificate. You must be given access to the same public education provided to other children.
- Enroll in a school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residency that might prevent or delay school enrollment.
- Enroll in school even if you are not living with a parent or guardian. Schools cannot require you to have a parent or guardian to sign paperwork if you are not living with them.
- Continue in the school you attended before you became homeless or the school you last attended.
- Receive transportation to and from school if you or a guardian request transportation.
- Participate in the same special programs and services as provided to all other students, including athletics and other extra-curricular activities.
- You have the right to file a dispute if you disagree with any decision about your education.



For help with school, do the following:

- Contact the district's liaison (see phone number below) for help enrolling in a new school or continuing at the school you are now attending. The liaison can also make referrals.
- Contact the local homeless shelter and social services office for help with housing, medical care, food, and other support.
- Contact the school and provide any information you think will assist in helping the student to adjust to difficult circumstances. Needs, such as transportation, free school meals, supplies, and counseling services, should be addressed.


