ATIONAL LEVY

The Board of Trustees and administration have had multiple conversa tions regarding the 2022-2023 school year. FTSD received our preliminary budget sheets from the Office of Public Instruction, providing more clarity as planning and staffing conversa tions continue for the 2022-2023 school year. As a result of discussions and the preliminary budget sheets, it was recommended by the Finance Committee during the March 15th Board Meeting that FTSD runs an operational mill levy. MONTANA ADVANCED OPPOR-TUNITIES ACT

The 2019 Legislature created HB 387. This bill was designed to allow schools additional flexibility in providing opportunities for students and families. The FTSD applied and received the Advanced Opportunities Grant. The Board of Public Education awarded FTSD the amount of BUDGETING 2022-2023 & OPER- \$31,764.84. OPI outlines the purpose of the funds:

- expands personalized career & technical education opportunities for middle and high school stu-
- reduces out-of-pocket costs for students and families in support Standardized testing is required by
- empowers students to actively engage in forming post-secondary success that aligns with their individual interests, passions, strengths, needs and culture: and
- to use advanced opportunity aid on how well our students do as com-

to invest in Montana students by supporting individualized pathways for career and postsecondary.

This program is new to us and we will work to navigate this opportunity for students and families. At least 60% of the funding will be spent to address out-of-pocket expenses that would be assumed by a qualifying student or family. The remaining aid that is not expended may be used by any K-12 career and vocational/ technical course that we offer. Included in this newsletter is a Frequently Ask Questions document on page 4,5. SPRING ASSESSMENT - WHAT WILL IT LOOK LIKE THIS YEAR?

The Smarter Balanced Field Test (SBAC) will be given to our 3rd through 8th graders while our 11th graders will take the ACT this spring. The testing window begins on March 7th. We are required to have 95% of our students take the SBAC. Juniors will be taking the ACT on April 12th.

FRENCHTOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT - COM- \Diamond Teachers can utilize the assessment to do an item MITTEE WORK analysis to find areas of weakness and strengths for individuals and for the grade level or class. We are able to collect longitudinal data on student progress with students taking the test yearly. Please keep in mind the dates of testing as they \Diamond come up and be sure your children come to school well rested and well-nourished on those days, so they will be giving us their best academic perfor-

During the month of May K-5 students will be going through MAP testing. The MAP assessment is a computerized program which looks at students in language arts, reading and math. Since the spring is so hectic for middle school students we elected to MAP test students during the month of February. Each test is different for each student because the tests are adjusted to meet the individual student's achievement level and measure improvement from fall to spring and from year to year. We are completing our twelfth year of using the MAP assess ment and have a moving picture of student growth, having tested both fall and spring over those years. Reports are sent home twice a year, fall and spring, to parents allowing you to track your child's progress over the years.

The writing assessment and MAP assessment are used by teachers to address student progress as well as our curriculum.

FRENCHTOWN MILL LEVY



The Frenchtown School District is running an Operational Mill Levy this spring. Frenchtown is known for its amazing community support, its family engagement and its school district. The school district fosters a supportive environment for every child and provides best in class education. The Operational Mill Levy is necessary because the community has grown and the student population has increased.

Facts:

- This is the first Operational Mill Levy requested since 2008.
- Community member taxes contributions to the school district have decreased 25% since 2017-2018.
- Mills per household have decreased from 391 to 306.
- 80% of the current operational budget is funded by the state.
- Frenchtown is operating at 91% of the allowable budget limit as determined by the State of Montana.

What is Frenchtown School District Proposing?

The school district needs to ask for a 5% increase to the current operating budget, \$536,000, bringing the operating budget from 91% of the allowable budget limit to approximately 94%.


What is the financial impact?

- \$4.25/month on a \$100,000 home
- \$8.50/month on a \$200,000 home

Why must we run an Operational Mill Levy?

- Student growth has impacted staffing needs
- Maintain current student programs and offerings
- Maintain current student-teacher ratio
- · Services and utility costs have dramatically risen

The charts below outline the history of operational mills, the increase in enrollment, and the taxable value of the Frenchtown Valley. As the taxable value of Frenchtown increases, the financial impact to each taxpayer decreases. The requested Operational Mill Levy is similar to the 2015-2016 mill level and is less than the mill level of 2020-2021.







 $\bf Q$ - On Page 4, 5v of the bill, it states that spending is at the discretion of the district.... Can funds be used to pay student wages while at work?

A - Reference: Page 1 of the bill and the first paragraph outlines the purpose of the bill and that it is to be used to offset parent costs and then to support Career and Technical Education Programs. Payment of students wages would be outside the scope of the bill and also create workman comp. issues. (No)

 \mathbf{Q} – Using that same page 4 reference, can a district use funds to pay for student fuel to travel to work-based experiences?

 $\bf A$ - Reference: Page 1 of the bill and the first paragraph outlines the purpose of the bill and that it is to be used to offset parent costs and then to support Career and Technical Education Programs. (Yes) This would be considered a parent cost, the district could use funds to pay for student travel.

Q - Can the funds be used to pay for expensive supplies for PLTW courses in Sciences, for example, even though parents are not charged?

 $A-Because\ PLTW\ courses\ are\ structured\ for\ career\ pathways,\ this\ could\ be\ an\ expense\ the\ district\ could\ consider\ with\ funds\ that\ do\ not\ go\ directly\ to\ offset\ parent\ costs.\ (Yes)$

Q - Can the funds be used to support existing CTE programs?

A - Reference: Page 4, 5b of the bill, stat4es that advanced opportunity aid remaining that is not expended or carried forward for the purposes of subsection (5)(a) may be spent by the district to provide any K-12 career and vocational/technical education course offereed by the district. (Yes)

Q - Can the funds be used to pay for middle school CTSOs where the district currently charges parents a fee for the CTSOs?

A - Reference: Page 1 of the bill and the first paragraph outlines the purpose of the bill and that it is to be used to offset parent costs and then to support Career and Technical Education Programs. Because parents are charged a fee for the CTSOs at middle school, the fund could be used for this purpose. (Yes)

Q- Can you provide examples of strategic plans, please?

 ${
m A}$ - We will post a couple different strategic plans that may help you in your planning processes. Those will available by the 12th of November in the Resources section on the OPI Transformational Learning Page.

Q- Can the funds carryover?

 \boldsymbol{A} - Yes, the distibuted funds are deposited in your flex fund and can be carried over for the purposes outlined in HB 387.

Q- Can the funds be used for FTE costs?

 \hat{A} - After the minimum of 60% going for out-of-pocket costs for parents, the other 40% can be used at the discretion of the district for K-12 career and vocational/technical education courses.

Q- What needs to be uploaded for HB 387?

 ${\bf A}$ - The application checklist which is live on the OPI website, should be filled out, downloaded, and signed by your board chair. This is the only document you will upload when you submit your application.

 \mathbf{Q} – Does an elementary and high school district within one system need to submit two different applications?

 \boldsymbol{A} - The application has a place where a system can identify both their elementary and HS districts and submit a single application.

Q-Does the OPI has a student advanced opportunity plan for districts to use?

 $A\cdot(\text{No})$ The OPI does not have approved forms for districts to use. This is at the discretion of the local district as to what a student opportunity plan would look like for their students, parents and other interested partners.

Q- It is possible for students to earn dual credits for a high school course?

 $A\cdot (Yes)$ Because of strong local control and the significant flexibilities offered school districts, it is possible for students to earn credit from a course for more than one subject, especially when you look at a proficiency model versus a seat time model.

Throughout the day on Friday, February 25th, Frenchtown High School teachers had the opportunity to bring classes to the auditorium to view a diverse selection of films, stories, and perspectives and to engage in dialogue over content and the filmmaking process with filmmakers.



Business Class Updates

This semester in Mrs. Goris's Coding & Tech Tools class, students have been learning about the practical applications of coding. The first big project for students was to create an app that solved a problem. Students created school schedules, measurement converters, recipe guides and games. After the apps, students began exploring the many uses of the Micro:bit. We created a usable compass, a room temperature sensor and a fidget cube. The final projects consisted of a working pedometer, a pong game, a space invader game and an English to Russian translator.

In Stock Trading and Economics, students are again participating in the Stock Market Game. This has been a more difficult time for students as their portfolios have been plummeting with recent world events. We have been learning how to short stocks which has led to one team maintaining a top 10 placing out of 480 teams. We are hopeful that the market will improve before the 15 April completion of the game.



THE DANGEROUS TRUTH ABOUT TODAY'S MARIJUANA: JOHNNY'S LIFE AND DEATH STORY

Laura Stack's 19-year-old son, Johnny, died by suicide on November 20, 2019, after becoming delusional from dabbing high-THC marijuana concentrates. Three days before his death, Johnny issued his own warning about marijuana usage. Through this tragic tale, Stack hopes to use her pain to help parents talk to their children about the dangers of today's marijuana. Participants will hear a first-hand account of the death of a teen from marijuana use and be educated on the harms of marijuana on adolescent brain development, mental illness, and suicide. Laura's real-life story is backed by recent scientific-based research on how today's potent THC products lead to mental illnesses such as anxiety, depression, paranoia, psychosis, and sadly, suicidal ideation. This presentation is a clarion call for parents across America to educate themselves about the risks of today's high-THC marijuana products and to better understand the potentially devastating effects on youth mental health.

JUNIORS: The end of the year is approaching quickly and although college planning may be the last thing on your mind... let it enter. The counselors will be speaking with you regarding your future plans and steps you should be taking, but in the meantime... Please start deciding if you plan to retake the ACT plus writing, or if you would like to take the SAT. Do this while math is fresh in your head and give yourself enough time next year to take it again if needed. Practice tests are available online at www.number2.com and <a href="https://www.number2.com and www.number2.com and <a href="https://www.number2.com and www.number2.com and account through onlineprep.act.org.

Make sure to check the admission requirements for the schools you are interested in attending. If they require, or recommend SAT subject tests, you may want to take those at the end of your junior year as well. Please check admission requirements closely so you do not miss an important requirement.

TESTING: Spring is "testing season"!

- The ACT plus writing for juniors is on April 12th.
- The Pre-ACT for sophomores is on April 11th.
- Advanced Placement tests are scheduled to begin in May. Students have already signed up if they were interested in taking an AP test, and the tests have been ordered.

School Counselors

What can the counselors help you with during high school? School counselors help students in three areas: academic, careers, and personal/social

The academic domain includes, but is not limited to, scheduling, study skills, four year planning, tips for improving grades, difficulties in class, and testing.

The career domain includes, but is not limited to, career assessments, career exploration, post-secondary planning, military options, and apprenticeship information.

The personal/social domain includes, but is not limited to relationship concerns, divorce or family concerns, anger management, suicide, drugs/alcohol concerns, and loss or grief.

What is confidentiality? Confidentiality means that when you speak with a school counselor they will keep the conversation private. However, there are a couple of times confidentiality needs to be broken for the student's safety and well-being. If the school counselor feels that you or others are in imminent danger, the school counselor will contact appropriate people, such as your parents, the school principal, and any others that can be of assistance. By law, a school counselor also needs to break confidentiality if abuse in any form is revealed. The school counselor will need to make a report to the department of family services and may need to contact other people including parents and the school principal. If confidentiality needs to be broken the school counselor will let you know. If you have concerns or questions about confidentiality please feel free to ask the counse-

Frenchtown Rural Fire District News

DEBRIS BURNING (BY PERMIT ONLY)

April showers bring May flowers...and hard to light debris burns! And the harder to light, the less efficient burn you will have, which could very well lead to excess smoke lingering around. For those that are planning on burning debris, remember that even if your permit is activated for that day, it is your responsibility to ensure that you are not smoking out your neighbors. If your area is not providing adequate ventilation, think twice about lighting the pile(s) up.

As always, please be aware of the expected weather when planning your burn days. Each spring, FRFD responds to multiple "escaped" burns, where either the wind shifted unexpectedly or the area surrounding your burn was not prepped properly...or both. Be aware of the typical spring winds in your area; you can pretty much count on afternoon winds throughout the spring. Historically the midafternoon time frame is when we get dispatched the most for escaped burns. If you are burning and you feel like your burn is escaping, or may escape, do not hesitate to contact 911 immediately. We will respond to assist as necessary.

Superintended Les Meyer explained that if he is able to bond out, his conditions prohibit him from being present at this position. As such, Superintendent Meyer recommended that the Board terminate his employment for abandonment of position. The Frenchtown Classified Association is aware of this situation. Shiloh Lucier made a motion to terminate Steve Martin due to abandonment of position. Debbie Lester seconded the motion. Public discussion – none. Board discussion – regarding the safety of Frenchtown students. Superintendent Les Meyer indicated that the school is cooperating with the investigation and right now it appears our students were safe in school. Unanimous.
