A New Normal: Instruction Continues Off-Campus

Traditionally, Spring is one of the busiest times of the school year — racing to the finish in academics and in extracurricular activities, while thousands of seniors are looking forward to commencement ceremonies. All of this changed when COVID-19 arrived.

It seems like a lifetime ago, but it was only mid March when the Governor closed public education campuses in New Mexico to help contain the spread of the Coronavirus. Since that day, educators, administrators and families have established their new normal. Some students have laptops or iPads to connect to educational websites or directly to their classroom teacher. Others are getting directions via email and are studying at their kitchen tables. Many children are getting educational packets dropped off to them at the same time when their school meals are delivered to their homes. The new normal.

There is no singular way students are continuing their instruction. Certainly, it depends on the district and their technological capabilities and logistical hurdles. However, Superintendents, instructional leaders and teachers are thinking outside the box on how to continue instruction from their homes.

Under the leadership of Ryan Stewart, the NM Public Education Department has provided an abundance of resources and support with consistent communication statewide. On page 7 of *The Advocate*, you will read some of that PED information. This month's newsletter also offers information from educational partners that have been quick to help our schools.

Estancia Municipal Schools, where the motto is "Every student, every day!", is a small district that feels like home. Students, families, and staff are interconnected throughout the community with involvement in church, FFA, athletics, and school and classroom events. The community packs the gym at volleyball and basketball games, turns out in droves for the annual FFA Pie Auction where thousands of dollars are raised, and is always present with helping hands whenever needed to support the students and their programs across the district. During the Covid-19 crisis, this giving community has banded together to support one another during this time of uncertainty; and the district's new superintendent, Dr. Cindy Sims, has worked tirelessly to support her staff and students as they have moved forward with distance learning.

Since arriving to Estancia a year ago, Dr. Sims focused on getting to know her new community, making connections, and working with staff on a number of school initiatives, including social

Stan's Straight Talk

STAN ROUNDS, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Colleagues:

Welcome to a "new world" of public education in New Mexico! Since our last newsletter, our world of public education has experienced a tremendous shift. Active learning "at

school" is ended for the 2019- 2020 school year and our expectation is to assure active learning "from school" as our new motif. Wow! The COVID-19 reverberation is dramatic, taxing, and transformational to our day-to-day routines and those routines of our students. Added to this is the very tenuous nature of our state budget created by a "perfect storm" of the significant drop in the oil and gas market (about 45% of our state budget) and the chilling of commerce and travel precipitated by COVID-19 (significantly adding to the oil and gas impacts but also the NM Gross Receipts Tax income). And through all this, you, as our educational leaders in New Mexico, are confronted with designing and implementing a delivery system that only "hiccups" in this reality.

Now, more than ever, your leadership and grit is called upon like probably no other time in your career. And I know you are up to it!! We are "New Mexico Strong" and we are resolute and capable in figuring this out, both short- and long-term. As you move through these historic times, the following are points of information and challenge for you to consider:

- By Decree of the Governor to deal with the threat of COVID-19, all NM Public Schools will cease regular school functions for the remainder of the 19-20 school year.
- Schools will increase their efforts to assure that no student goes hungry and the "essential workers" necessary to serve breakfast and lunches on a "grab and go basis" will work and provide those services.
- NM Public Schools are to be considered essential service providers for the remainder of the decree and will practice "social distancing" as they perform essential services.
- NM Public Schools will continue to provide educational opportunities for all New Mexico students and will arrange for a process of "remote learning."
- The Federal CARES Act is now in play in all states and is likely to bring around \$120 million in additional resources to the state educational community. We are awaiting the specifics in the implementation of that Act.
- Each district in New Mexico will continue to design and implement budgets that comply with the provisions of the General Appropriations Act for FY '21. However, there is a likelihood that over the next two years the General Fund income for the State of New Mexico will diminish significantly for FY '21 and FY '22. This will likely create necessary downscaling of the budgets being prepared and submitted for the upcoming school year and will likely be directed, in part, through a Special Session of the State Legislature held sometime this summer.

In this time of uncertainty, with a special session looming on the horizon like a thunderstorm in the distance, it was important all the Superintendents and School Business Officers be provided the information as quickly as possible. NMASBO leadership approached the leadership of the Public Education Department to proceed with a virtual Spring Budget Workshop. We hope you were able to take advantage of the webinars and/or recordings and you received the information you need.

In this time that seems to be ever changing, what is our new normal going to be? Are we only going to continue to have meetings "monitor-to-monitor"? If so, how do you build trust and a relationship with people, employees, vendors, suppliers, etc.? I realize that a teleconference meeting is sometimes a good option but is it the best option of delivering profess-sional development? NMASBO believes that we need that personal "link" among our school business officials. We learn from each other's successes and failures.

GASB pronouncements

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) announced on April 15 that it is postponing the implementation of almost all the accounting statements that were to become effective in fiscal year 19/20 and later. This includes Statement No. 84 on Fiduciary Funds and Statement No. 87 on Leases. The press release did not give an indication on an update implementation schedule. Whenever additional information is provided, we will share that update with you.

In the meantime, be safe, be healthy.



From NMPED to YOU



The state's Public Education Department continues to keep all districts and charter schools up to date and offers numerous resources as we sequester ourselves. Here is a summary of recent communications from NM Secretary of Education Ryan Stewart and members of his PED team:

Program Funding Opportunity Deadlines

Based on requests, a chart of all program funding opportunities have been consolidated into one document. A table from PED provides important information regarding specific program funding opportunities. Included in the table are: the program name, the date in which the program application is/will be available to LEAs and the expected date LEAs receive budget authority. The Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO)

CCSSO runs the High-Quality Instructional Materials and Professional Development (IMPD) Network that currently supports eight states, including New Mexico. Its purpose is to significantly increase the number of districts selecting high-quality, standards aligned instructional materials and to increase the number of pre-service and in-service teachers receiving professional development grounded in the use of those materials. Through the work of these network states to identify and leverage high-quality instructional materials, CCSSO is sharing recommendations for high-quality materials to be used for remote learning due to COVID-19 school closures. emotional learning, school safety, and student-centered instruction. School safety became the most immediate concern following a pipe-bomb scare the third week of school. Dr. Sims activated an Emergency Response Team comprised of county emergency personnel and law enforcement, the City Mayor and police department, and district personnel.

Together, the Team planned and conducted training, then hosted a Joint-Agency Drill and Evacuation last winter. The community has been very supportive of the increased safety measures put in place at the schools, and the addition of a School Security Assistant has added another level of safety to campuses.

The partnership with the city and county has been even more important during the Covid-19 crisis, as she has worked closely with town and county personnel to ensure that safety measures have been in place for all essential employees still working during the

closure of school buildings, serving meals, cleaning, preparing school work, and reaching out to families in their time of need.

The district has a tight administrative team committed to student learning. This focus governs every decision made in the district, from the budget, to schedules, to the alignment of programs, to testing. It is also at the heart of PLC discussions teachers collaborate by grade and department weekly, planning units, creating tests, and examining student

learning data to identify students in need of intervention and support. Despite the intensity of this work, laughter is heard throughout the buildings and team comradery is the norm.

Dr. Sims feels school culture is at the heart of successful programs, and with her team, she strives to maintain a culture of mutual respect, support, and appreciation for the staff. Most recently, her staff came together (both in person and virtually) to compact curriculum for the remainder of the school year, identifying essential standards to be covered during this period of distance learning. Teachers videotaped and posted personal messages to students, encouraging them, as well as providing virtual instruction. Because nearly a third of the community has no internet or poor internet (even with the hot spots provided by three different service providers), work was also printed, and the videos and instruction were provided to students on a flash drive. The staff know the importance of their influence during this stressful time, and have maintained weekly contact (in many

cases, daily contact) with their students by phone and email. Estancia Municipal Schools believes "Good schools make fine communities better." As such, Dr. Sims has her eyes on the future, looking for ways to take the schools from "good" to "great." Working with her Administrative Team and the District Advisory

> Committee, a few areas for growth have been identified. While the staff have participated in several trauma-informed trainings during the school year, continuing to look at ways to create trauma-sensitive classrooms and traumainformed responses is an ongoing goal for the spring and coming year.

> This focus on social emotional learning, as mentioned, has become even more of a priority during the pandemic crisis. Already having oneto-one student laptops for grades 1 - 12, further technology integration training will also be a focus. While the District was poised to

> > move to a Google platform after spring break, this was put on hold so that staff and students could move forward with confidence in their existing platforms. The existing technology has served the staff well with this move to virtual collaboration and virtual learning. The district was able to reconfigure student laptops to work from home, and they were delivered by school bus the first week of the district's continuous learning

instruction. At the same time, the packets and flash drives were delivered, ensuring that ALL students were promptly engaged in the distance learning program. The challenge now will be to continue that high level of engagement in the coming month. It has been a daunting task, but the staff moved outside of their comfort zone, and the videos to students have become a bit of a competition with music, surprise guests, some costumes and accents, with heartfelt messages to students.

The district has been providing meals (breakfast and lunch) to students, beginning with the week of spring break when schools were initially closed. Dr. Sims, the Finance Director Marla Lovato, and her School Board members delivered meals to five remote sites in the community during spring break, where they met with cafeteria staff who lived in the neighborhood. This personal contact was important during those initial days,

and feedback from families gained during this week informed the details of the district's continuous learning plan.

Starting the week of April 13th, with Covid-19 cases having been identified in the community, the district will begin delivering meals via the bus routes to prevent further congregation and trips away from home for the families. Staff members are fully equipped with gloves and masks, and while that may hide the smiles and restrict the hugs, it cannot hide the happiness that staff feel when seeing their students coming to the bus for lunch and/or packets.

While the world and the news are filled with uncertainty right now, Estancia is characterized by grit, hope, and joy that still abounds in this small community. As Dr. Sims says regularly, "Choose happy" - it is still one thing we can all do on a daily basis. She is looking forward to bringing the community together to celebrate the senior class of 2020 with graduation, a picnic in the town park, and a celebration of the 2019/2020 school year, a year like no other!

This perfect storm of events sets up many scenarios to be considered by each educational leader in New Mexico. When added to the court-mandated efforts to meet Yazzie/Martinez in district instructional plans and support at-risk and extended learning strategies, this presents formidable pressure on each of you.

We at NMCEL/NMSSA are full partners with you as you traverse these choppy waters and are working at the state and national level to help resolve public policy issues and to be a thought partner with you and our state leadership as we define our strategies. We hold high value in local flexibility and local budget control as part of our guiding principles.
