#### Internet/Social Media Safety

It only takes one wrong click on social media or the Internet for

a child or teen to become a victim. Jolene Sundlie from the FBI Minneapolis Citizens Academy Alumni Association presented age appropriate programs to students in grades 5-12 on October 1 that included a *NetSmartz* presentation. The presentation included the five main risks that students face while using the internet and social media.

- 1. Inappropriate content
- 2. Online privacy
- 3. Sexting
- 4. Online sexual solicitations
- 5. Cyberbullying

The FBI has seen a significant increase in sextortion activity nationwide that is affecting thousands of U.S. children. Ms. Sundlie also discussed some closed FBI cases so students could hear how other Minnesota youths have become victims through social media and the Internet.

#### Snow Day Procedure Update

Osakis Public School has two snow days built into the District calendar. Additional school days will not be added to the calendar because teachers worked two extra days prior to back to school workshops. In the event that there are more than two weather related school closures, the school district, as approved by the School Board, will be implementing flexible/E learning days in place of traditional make up days. Staff will be communicating directly with students and families if any flexible/E learning days occur. Flexible/E Learning days will help prevent changes to the District calendar and the addition of days at the end of the school year.

## **Nurse Notes** Angie Baker-Milhausen



It has been a very busy year in the health office. I have been working to make sure that everyone is up to date with their vaccinations. As a reminder/update, all children should have 5 DTAP, 4 Polio, 3 Hepatitis B, 2 MMR, and 2 varicella when starting kindergarten. When students enter 7th grade there is a booster TDAP,

Meningitis vaccine, and varicella vaccine. If the second one has not been given previously, the last one is a second Meningitis vaccine that needs to be given after 16 or before a student starts their senior year. Please note, if you are medically against immunizations or conscientiously object to vaccines there is a form that we have to have on file in the health office that needs to be notarized; if you have questions or would like a copy of the form, please notify me.

We are working on getting the hearing and vision screening set up at the school; I am unsure of the exact date as of right now. Minnesota has some requirements that need to be met. Instead of screening every grade, both hearing and vision, we will be following the requirements for the state of Minnesota. This means that your child may or may not be screened this year. If you have ANY concerns at all and would like your child checked, even though it isn't a required grade, please contact me and we will have no problem screening them. The grades that we do cover at this time are:

1st grade: vision, hearing, and color vision

2nd grade: hearing

3rd grade: vision and hearing

4th grade: none

5th grade: vision and hearing

6th grade: none 7th grade: vision 8th grade: hearing 9th grade: none 10th grade: vision 11th grade: hearing 12th grade: none

Again, I want to stress that if, at this time or any time during the year, you have concerns with your student's vision or hearing please feel free to call me and have them screened.

At this time of year with all of the illness, I know many parents have questions on whether or not to send their child to school. The policy for our school is as follows: if a student has a temperature of 99.9 or higher they need to stay home from school until their temperature has been in the normal range for 24 hours without the use of Tylenol or Ibuprofen. If your child has vomited, they will need to stay home for 24 hours from the last time that this happened. I know that sometimes parents chose to send their child knowing that they have a fever and just medicate them. The fear with this is not only are you exposing others to what your child might be carrying, but that means your child's immune system is down and they will be susceptible to other student's germs. Please consider our policy when sending an ill child to school. If someone in your household is waiting on their results from a COVID test, we need your child to stay home from school, as well.

Welcome to the 2021-22 school year. My name is Melissa Bergquist and I am the 7-12 Guidance Counselor for Osakis Public School. I am looking forward to visiting with your students about career interests, college decisions, and how to prepare for the next steps.

Class of 2022 Seniors and Families: I STRONGLY encourage seniors to be checking their Class of 2022 Schoology for all updates on important application deadlines, college visits at Osakis, and scholarship information! Make sure to ask your son or daughter about this!

<u>Very important</u> - Starting October 1, students and families can file their FAFSA. October 1st is when the 2022-2023 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) http://www.fafsa. gov/ is available for seniors and their parents. Completing the FAFSA is the first step in applying for federal and state financial aid. Families will use 2020 tax information to complete their FAFSA. Applicants will use up-to-date information regarding personal and family information, such as number of family members, number in college and parental marital status.

October is College Knowledge Month: Free Application Opportunities at Minnesota Colleges and Universities is coming for 2021-22. As Minnesota high school students think about applying to college, application fees should not be a barrier. Some Minnesota colleges and universities do not charge application fees or they do not charge fees at certain times of the year. For students from low-income families or those with modest incomes, they can apply at no charge using a NACAC fee waiver at the University of Minnesota, Minnesota State colleges and universities, and nonprofit colleges that are members of the Minnesota Private College Council. High school counselors and college admission staff can help a student make these arrangements.

There are many opportunities for students to apply at no charge at some institutions. Some colleges never require an application fee. Some colleges waive the application fee for the month of October and some colleges waive the application fee for one week in late October. well as the Behavioral Counselor/Mental Health Practitioner.





I was born and raised by Miltona, MN on a dairy farm and have seven brothers and four sisters.



It's great to see our students once again! For the First issue of the newsletter, I would like to remind and highlight our core learning management tools for our K-12 classes.

#### Seesaw - Classroom

For our younger grades (K-3), we are now in our second year using Seesaw as a subscription. Teachers can empower students to create, reflect, share, and collaborate. Students "show what they know" with Seesaw by using photos, videos, audio, drawings, text, PDFs, and links. It's simple for teachers to keep student work in one place and share their work with families.

#### **Seesaw - Parent Connection**

Seesaw also has a parent app. With the parent app, you have the ability to acknowledge the current work your student is doing in the classroom. This engagement creates greater motivation for the kids as they see not only the teacher's reaction, but also their family's. Ask your teacher about the parent connection aspect. #### **Google Classroom**

In Grades 4-6, we use Google Classroom to guide and direct digital classroom curriculum. Google Classroom is a stepping stone for our upper elementary to prepare to use Schoology in grades 7-12. Google Classroom integrates well with many programs due to its expansive growth in the technology industry. They are helping classrooms with digital distribution of materials and ideas. Google Classroom also offers the ability for parents and guardians to connect with the class to monitor their son or daughter's progress.

#### When signed in you can see:

- Missing work—Work not turned in when the summary was sent.
- Upcoming work—Work that's due today and tomorrow (for daily emails) or that's due in the upcoming week (for weekly emails).
- Class activity—Announcements, assignments, and questions recently posted by teachers.

#### Schoology's Parent Portal


Parents of students in grades 7-12 have access to the Schoology Parent Portal. Schoology helps students stay organized and connected. As a parent or guardian, you can sign up directly to observe their account. Schoology is our school's LMS (learning management system). You can access your high school student's account by signing up for a parent account at www.schoology. com/sign-up-now. Once you have set up the first steps, you will then be guided to enter a 12-digit code. This code is one that students received when picking up their Chromebook starting in 7th grade. If you did not receive this code and wish to connect your account just contact the tech support team at tsupport@osakis.k12.mn.us and we will send you the specific code for your son or daughter's classes.

Have you seen our new website yet? We are excited to announce that we have changed our school website in order to make things more user-friendly with easier-to-find options to help keep our school family informed.


With our new website change, we have also changed our alert system.

#### Thank a Veteran

As a nation we celebrate Veterans Day in November. Sacha Cohen from the Corporation for National and Community Service (www.serve.gov) has suggested ways to honor and/or help local veterans. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- 1. Visit a wounded veteran at the hospital.
- 2. Offer your home repair skills to a veteran or military family.
- 3. Create an online neighborhood user group that can be used to share information about neighborhood activities, recommend reliable repair companies, and find babysitters. An online group may also help identify the needs of your neighbors.
- 4. Deliver a meal or care packages to veterans.
- 5. Help a veteran tell his or her story through a project such as the Veteran's History Project. You can download a VHP field kit from the Library of Congress website.
- 6. Volunteer with an organization, such as Canine Companions for Independence, that provides therapy dogs to veterans.
- 7. Offer a vet a ride by volunteering with the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) organization, which provides free transportation to men and women unable to travel to VA medical facilities on their own.
- 8. Visit serve.gov and use keyword "veterans" to find more opportunities to serve our nation's veterans.
- 9. Say "Thank You."
