Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan (ARP Act) recommendations are outlined in the MVESD Road Map for Re-Entry Plan. Hand washing or use of hand sanitizer is encouraged upon entry to learning areas and prior to eating. Students will be reminded to practice proper respiratory etiquette. Instructions will be given to wash with either soap and water for at least 20 seconds, use paper towels to dry hands, turn sink handles, and open doors, and then safely discard paper towels; OR use hand sanitizer. Hand sanitizing stations will be available at various locations throughout the campus. Hand sanitizer will be provided in every classroom. Custodial cleaning procedures follow EPA and CDC guidelines regarding approved products and methods. Disinfecting high touch areas (e.g., door handles, light switches, sink handles, elevator buttons, etc.) per CDC guidelines. Disinfection and cleaning of all high-touch, hightraffic and common areas throughout the school day. Cleaning team members clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces, including door handles, faucet knobs, drinking fountains, stair railings, interior lunch tables and seating, exterior tables and seating areas, countertops, handrails, telephones, restrooms, shared gymnasium equipment, and shared toys in preschool environment. Reinforcing the importance of compliance with CDC guidelines through staff education, training, and distribution of cleaning/disinfection products. Purchased electrostatic sprayers and misters per campus/department to apply EPA N-List disinfectants efficiently and safely. How the LEA will Ensure Continuity of Services?

The safety and well-being of MVESD students, staff and families is our number one priority.

Mohave Valley Elementary School District will return to face-to-face learning for all students in the 2021-2022 school year. This decision takes into account students' academic and social-emotional needs, updated guidance from health organizations, and improving pandemic conditions, including lower rates of community spread and the percentage of our school staff who have been vaccinated. We have adopted a Re-Entry plan that outlines health-based scenarios and the related instructional delivery model dictated by cases, transmission levels, and positivity throughout our schools and community.

Regardless of the delivery model, MVESD will employ strategies and program options to ensure students are able to participate in quality learning experiences.

The MVESD Governing Board has adopted Instructional Time Models in the event of a school closure due to an outbreak or a student that needs to remain home for quarantine or isolation or approved sickness. In case of a mandated, long-term school closure, MVESD has 1:1 student devices for use with Google Meet and Classroom to carry on classroom collaboration and communication, on-line curriculum platforms, and maintain instructionally connected should a child/class/school/District need to access instruction remotely.

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs MVESD strives to provide welcoming, responsive, and supportive learning environments for all students. The district plans to build the capacity of teachers and staff in social and emotional learning through professional development as identified by our SEL District Committee. The district has available a counselor to support the social and emotional learning (SEL) needs of individual students/families that have been adversely impacted by the pandemic. No restrictions on after school activities, including athletics following guidance provided by Arizona Interscholastic Association. Other Needs (which may include student health Food Service will continue to offer meals free of charge for all students based in the Federal Seamless Summer Option throughout and food services) the 2021-2022 school year. This meal program will last until May 26, 2022. **Staff Needs:** Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs The MVESD school counselor provides support for staff. Additionally, Human Resources provides a variety of supports for staff through Health/Wellness newsletters as well as through a comprehensive benefits package offering such supports as crisis counseling and health screening. Staff will be directed to service providers in the community that are available through District provided health insurance.
