Softball Caps off Season with State Tourney Berth

The Fillmore Central/Exeter Milligan Panthers wrapped up their season successfully with many amazing experiences that will forever be remembered. The season started out kind of rough, but as more and more games came, the Panthers learned from their mistakes. and bounced back with a Conference Runner-Up Title. The tournament took place here in Geneva, and it gave the girls a great home-field advantage. The girls took on Wilber-Clatonia first round and the final score was 8-4, Panthers. After winning this game, they took on the Centennial Broncos in the second round. The Broncos were up 3-0 in the bottom of the second, but that didn't stop the Panthers from competing. FC/EM kept plucking off run by run, but were still trailing Centennial with 4-3. In the fifth, the Panthers punched in four more runs taking the lead of 7-4. The Broncos just couldn't fight back and the Panthers went 2-0, off to the Championship Game, after winning 7-4 against the Centennial Broncos. In the SNC Championship, the Panthers faced the Fairbury Jeffs, who were seeded number one in the conference. Though the Panthers fought to the end, they fell to the Jeffs 3-7 and received second at the tournament.

After a long week of practice, the Panthers remained ready for the C-5 District Tournament in Genoa. Nebraska. #3 Seed Panthers took on #6 Seed Friend in the first round. The Panthers took the lead on Bulldogs with a whopping 18-1 blowout and easily advanced to the next round. The Panthers were arranged to play against the #2 Seed, Twin River. With an end score of 11-2, the Panthers, again, easily advanced to round three against the #1 Seed, Centennial. Based on previous games, the Panthers had great energy for this game, knowing that they could keep proving that they can keep beating Centennial, and that they did. The final score of the game was 7-1, advancing to the District Championship game. Centennial had one loss under their belt, and went back to compete with Twin River to move to the Championship Game. The game went into OT, and Centennial came back to beat the Titans 10-8, ending their season. So that was that, The Panthers were set up

to play Centennial in the final game of the tournament, it was actually their third time playing the Broncos in one week. The Panthers were down 3-1 in the second, but then fought back sweeping the Broncos, again, 12-3 and punched their way to Smith Complex in Hastings, Nebraska to the NSAA State Tournament.



Knowing the season wasn't over yet, the Panthers celebrated their win, but strictly got back to business, preparing themselves for the hard competition they would see in Hastings. The first game was scheduled for Wednesday morning, at 9:00 a.m. against the Fairbury Jeffs. The attendance for the first round of the State Tournament was outstanding. The number of students from just Fillmore Central was a whopping 101 kids from 9-12, along with the parents, and spectators. Even though the temperature wasn't pleasing for anyone, both teams fought hard to the end. The Fairbury Jeffs won 15-5, leaving the Fillmore Central/Exeter-Milligan Panthers to play Auburn on Thursday. The next day started off with a lot of energy, but it ended in a loss against Auburn with a 4-15 final score. Even though, the Panthers didn't make it far, what really matters is the experience. This team hadn't made it to the State Tournament for five years, and hadn't had a winning record since then either. They ended the season with a 17-11 record, a Conference Runner-Up Title, a District Championship Title, a ticket to the State Tournament and most importantly, memories and relationships that will last for a lifetime. As a senior, I just want to say to the coaches, the student managers, my teammates, thank you for this unprecedented opportunity and I know the fellow seniors and I will forever be grateful.
