Black History Month

Black History Month is celebrated annually to recognize the central role and achievements that African Americans have had throughout U.S. History. In 1926, historian Carter G. Woodson, founder of the Association of the Study of African American Life and History, established a week to promote the accomplishments and achievements of African American people. Woodson chose to celebrate during the week of Abraham Lincoln's and Frederick Douglass' birthdays. The celebration has now expanded to be observed during the entire month of February. In 1976, President Gerald Ford said that Black History Month is a time to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." Every president since 1976 has officially designated February as Black History Month. Join us this month as we honor and highlight accomplishments made by authors and illustrators that have promoted the understanding and appreciation of African American culture.

The Coretta Scott King Awards


Coretta Scott King was the wife of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and was a leading participant in the American Civil Rights Movement.

In 1969, at the American Library Association's Annual Conference, Mabel McKissick and Glyndon Greer founded the Coretta Scott King Book Awards. This prestigious award is designed to commemorate the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his wife, Coretta Scott King. This award is given annually to outstanding African American authors and illustrators of books for children and young adults that demonstrate an appreciation of African American culture and universal human values. The first author to win the award was Lillie Paterson who was recognized for the biography, *Martin Luther King, Jr.: Man of Peace (1969)*.

For more than 50 years, writers and artists have been honored to receive this prestigious award that promotes understanding and appreciation of Black culture. Let's Explore a New Syllable Pattern - Constant - le (-Cle)

Reading is a code-based system and readers are most successful when they are taught the code. A syllable is a part of a word that contains a single vowel sound and is pronounced as a unit. In this series, we will explain why it is important for readers to learn about syllables and the six different syllable types. We will offer examples and strategies to help emerging readers become more familiar with each syllable type.

This month we will focus on the Consonant -le syllable pattern.

A consonant -le syllable is a final syllable with one consonant followed by I and silent e. It always occurs at the end of a word. This syllable type contains the schwa sound, which is common in words with more than one syllable and is pronounced /uh/. Words that end with a consonant -le are always multisyllabic words. Let's practice reading a few words with this syllable type!

- 1. Decoders first need to look for a consonant -le at the end of a word and draw a box around it. Because readers know the sound of the consonant and -le, let's focus on the first syllable!
- 2. Find the vowel in the first syllable.
- 3. Look beside the vowel.
- 4. Determine the syllable type.
- 5. Read the syllable.
- 6. Put the two syllables together and read. Use the steps above to read the following consonant -le words. Then, circle the correct picture!
