The Tigers have qualified for state in the past, but this time is different. It is historic! No South Dakota high school team in B division has ever qualified for State for 18 years consecutively. Over the years, this amounts to 18 different teams, 18 different sets of parents, 18 different cheer teams, but the same coach - Coach Eldon Marshall. This year the Tigers placed 4th. # Alumni Corner

The Alumni Corner is space reserved for any former student of WRHS to submit memories from their high school days. This year's Tiger Tales will feature yours truly - **Katie Jensen** class of 1963. With aid from my scrapbook/diary, I hope to recall some special memories with emphasis on our sneak trip.

The 1962 movie State Fair had recently been released starring Pat Boone, Bobby Darin, and Ann-Margret with great music by Rogers and Hammerstein. The movie was about a family driving through the Texas State Fair and the young folks finding romance and adventure while attending the fair.

At WRHS, it was accepted for the senior class to take a sneak trip toward the end of their senior year. Inspired by the movie State Fair, our class approached the senior sponsor to take our sneak trip during the fall of our senior year to attend the South Dakota State Fair in Huron on Sept 6th and 7th, 1962. It was approved and plans were made. To my knowledge, we are the only class to have skipped out in the fall. I might make mention here that Barry Jensen and I were dating in high school and this sneak trip felt like a two-day date.

Chaperones who made the trip with us were Mr. Christensen-Superintendent, Annette Christensen-business teacher and senior advisor, Mrs. Helen Shouldis-parent, and Mrs. Hiatt-parent. No school buses in those days so the trip was made by car. Barry actually drove his parent's car, and Larry Harrison drove his car. Unheard of today that students would drive their own cars on a school trip! Miss Marilyn Sager, 4th grade teacher at WR Elementary, had made sleeping arrangements in private homes, reserved tickets for the Friday night stock car races, and for a new event at the fair - the Wild Animal show on Saturday afternoon which featured SD dignitaries racing ostriches, riding elephants and camels.

We left after classes on Friday and arrived at Huron where we drove straight to the fairgrounds. For many of my classmates, including myself, going to Huron was something new and exciting let alone taking in the fair. Compared to the small carnivals that came to WR on occasion, the Art B. Thomas show on the midway of Huron, SD, was over the top exciting. From my diary "Upon arriving at the fairgrounds, we stared in amazement at the gigantic midway, the huge stadium, all the lights of the carnival, the smell of food around every corner, the hustle bustle, the thrills of laughter, the noise of the rides and everywhere we looked we saw fun."

That first evening we experienced the stock car races, enjoyed a few more rides on the midway until midnight, and then we were delivered to the various homes for overnight. Sandy McKee, Marilyn Samuelson, Tami Johnson and Mrs. Gin Shouldis were together for the evening. Dee Langass, Mary Zimmeman, Sharon Astleford, Irene Brown, Judy Keever, Mrs. Hiatt and myself were together in a second home. The boys in the class went on with Mr. and Mrs. Christensen to another location. There were 22 students in my graduating class. I am at a loss to remember if all 22 made this trip. I do know the school gave us each \$5.

Saturday morning the class gathered for breakfast at the Plains restaurant. From my diary "We had breakfast together in this big monstrous dining room all to ourselves". I was obviously very impressed. The remainder of Saturday morning was spent back at the fairgrounds taking in the 4H exhibits, cattle and horse barns, farm exhibits, home and garden displays, art and sewing projects. There was something for everyone.

It was at the Saturday afternoon animal show that our senior class received special recognition. The announcer introduced us as the senior class from White River High School taking in the State Fair on their sneak trip. He asked us to stand. It was pretty cool.

We departed Huron and went home via Fort Pierre. The WR Tigers were playing football vs Stanley County that evening in Ft. Pierre. We attended the game as a class. Nine players and three cheerleaders were among the seniors.

The hometown newspaper covered the game, and the caption was "Fort Pierre Looses to White River in Close Game". White River upended favored Fort Pierre Friday night in a real tight battle 21 - 20.

Following the exciting game, it was one more stop at a Pizza joint in Pierre before the ride home. From my diary "It was a pretty quiet trip home as we were exhausted after the two full days and late nights." No doubt our chaperones were glad to see the lights of WR and to know that soon we would all be back home safe and sound.

Looking back, I feel fairly confident that the trip and activities went as planned. I do not recall if anyone got into trouble, but no doubt we all acted up. Being a kid at the time, I have only fond memories and I believe that my own experience at the SD state fair should have been a sequel to the movie.

Being a member and singing with the Telstars was a wonderful memory of high school days. We wore matching outfits and were invited to perform at many events during the year. Quartet members were Betty Stromer '64, Karen Hiatt '66, Darlene Langass '63 and myself. Mrs. Hiatt was our accompanist. Also, my senior year I was secretary for the Principal. I don't know how that worked out being a full-time student myself, but I prepared a lot of math assignments and paper work daily. There were no organized sports for girls so after school was spent on other activities.

A couple other great memories were our junior class play "Pig Tails". Play director was the Principal, Laura Kirsch. Sharon Astleford Bryan had the lead, and Tami Johnson Brown played the part of a black lady. Remember - this was the sixties. The auditorium and stage were located in what is now the school cafeteria.

My class of 1963 was very close-knit. Eight of my classmates had been together for all twelve grades: Marn Bartlett, Loren Hiatt, Barry Jensen, Glenn Harris, Marilyn Samuelson, Wayne Bryan, Sharon Astleford and myself. Since high school days, we have gathered for reunions at 10 yrs., 25yrs., 30 yrs. and were recognized as 50-year graduates at high school graduation in 2013. We had 11 classmates that attended the 50th - which has been a record for returning grads.

Barry and I married in college and finished our degrees at Kansas State University. We both taught classes at WRHS. He in science and I taught social studies and Spanish. I moved into the librarian position in 2000. Barry has been running the Jensen Ranch since he left the classroom. I retired in 2008 and stay involved with the school as Alumni Assoc. president.

What memories - Go, Tigers!

## \$1.5 Million Gift to WR School District

How does this happen? Who can give away that kind of moolah? Hey now, is this some kind of prank?

These are some of the questions Superintendent Louie Krogman was scratching his head about when he read the mysterious email that showed up in his computer inbox this past Sept. Against his better judgement, he replied and received the best news that he still finds almost unbelievable. The information was legitimate, and the donation was real. On Oct. 14, 2022, the WR School District received via wire transfer, with no strings attached, a \$1.5 million donation from a Seattle-based philanthropic agency.

After the news broke, I stopped by Superintendent Krogman's office to inquire about this great news, and he confessed that he still feels as though he is dreaming. At the same time, he is very thankful that White River School was selected, and he is looking forward to using the money effectively for the betterment of WR School and the students. I had some further questions and Mr. Krogman agreed to an interview. His responses are as follows:

**Katie** - *Do you have any insight into how WR School was selected?*

**Louie** - I am not exactly positive, but I do feel comfortable saying it did not involve a blindfold, map, and dart. I think our rural location, student diversity, and district vision statements all played a crucial role.

**Katie** - *What kind of research did you do prior to accepting the large monetary gift?*

**Louie** - I contacted our technology director, Dale Bernthal to confirm this was an actual human being sending the email. He did agree it was suspicious, but everything "checked out." Once I verified that the email message was not spam, I did what everybody does nowadays and asked Google. The information on MacKenzie Scott was public knowledge, but I was still skeptical. I took a shot and called the cell number; the gal answered and immediately knew about our district. The rest is history...

**Katie** - *Was any kind of time frame mentioned?*

**Louie** - There was no time frame on our end to spend the money or decide on how to use it. They did confirm the money would be wired "within a few weeks" if we chose to accept it, which we happily did. Then a few weeks later after light correspondence back and forth, it arrived!

**Katie** - *Will this donation effect the county tax payer with any relief?*

**Louie** - Great question, unfortunately with our district being very property tax poor, the donation will not do much to lower the property tax levy. I can assure taxpayers that our levy is much lower than neighboring districts. For instance, the WRSD capital outlay levy is at \$1.508 per thousand. This is lower than the following capital outlay levies of several surrounding districts; Jones Co. (\$1.655), Todd County (\$2.695), Colome (\$2.132), Kadoka (\$1.655), Winner (\$1.792), and Lyman (\$1.994). This donation will speed up the district's ability to make improvements and provide a quality education for our families.

**Katie** - *Has any of the money been earmarked or spent yet? What are some of the approved plans to use the money?*

**Louie** - The MacKenzie Scott donation has not been earmarked or spent, yet. It is sitting on a CD and growing a little bit at a time while we work to figure out the best way to utilize it. The district is currently exploring building additions and has hired CO-OP Architecture to complete a thorough master-planning process to give us the best idea of what will work with our geographical setup.

**Katie** - *What kind of notoriety or attention has this drawn to the school?*

**Louie** - As superintendent, I have fielded interviews from all over the United States. The public nature of the donation has led to a few inquisitions from local news reporters. The highest profile of the inquisitions was the radio interview I completed which was aired on NPR.

Thanks to Superintendent Krogman for taking the time to answer a few questions. After all a \$1.5 million donation is a pot of gold. A once in a lifetime opportunity to brag.



# WRHS Sports Review

(Spring 2022 to the present) Sporting activities are in full swing at White River High School. Fall and winter activities have wrapped up while spring golf and track and field are just getting started.

In golf, the girls qualified as a team for the State Meet, while the boys had two individual qualifiers in TJ Beardt and Ramsey Tucker. The girls were the Conference champions, and the boys were Runners-up. All-Conference golfers last spring were Kelsey Morrison'21, Karlie Cameron'21, Riley Lunderman, and Steven Becker.

August 2022 cross country, football, and volleyball kicked off the athletics for this school term. Long time coaches Corey Sayler and Carol Rogers led Tiger cross country. Limited numbers saw just a handful of high school boys competing with a couple of middle school runners rounding out the varsity team. There were no high school girls running this year. Sophomore Mackenzie Wike and seventh grader Elijah Haukaas qualified for the State Cross Country Meet.

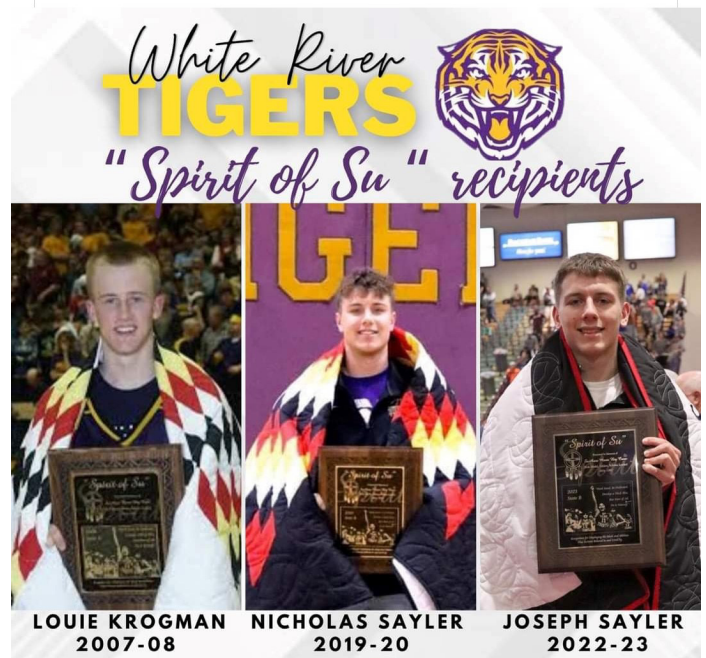
Head football coach Spencer Blom'11 and assistant coaches Nicodemus Waln'13 and Logan Tucker'12 also worked with limited numbers but made the most of their season. They finished the year with a record of 2-6 with wins over Bennett County and New Underwood. Gavin Folkers and Ryatt Wooden Knife were named to the All-Conference Team. Kendrell Cuevas was Honorable Mention.

The volleyball team had first year coaches Elise Brooks and Morgan Taft'17 at the helm. Their team finished with a record of 13-12 and took second place at the Lakota Nation Invitational. Tana Bear Heels was named to the All-Tourney team at LNI and was a member of the WGP 3rd Team All-Conference.

Golf and track & field are just starting now this spring, but looking back at last year's season shows some great accomplishments. Six athletes qualified for the State Track Meet. Maleena Brave and Joe Sayler were both top ten finishers in the high jump.

Basketball season kicked off in December and just concluded in early March. The boys placed 2nd at the Lakota Nation Invitational while the girls were 4th. The Lady Tigers finished 10-12 on the season with sophomore Maleena Brave a 2nd Team All-Conference selection. Seniors Lilly Krogman and Kamaria Krogman were named to the 3rd Team. Coaches this year were first year head coach Logan Tucker'12 and long-time assistant Troy Krogman'95

The Tiger boys continued their winning ways with another successful season under head coach Eldon Marshall and



assistant Justice Morrison'17. They won the Jones County Tournament for the sixth straight year. The season ended with another trip to Aberdeen for the State B Tournament, extending their record streak to eighteen straight trips to the Tournament. The boys placed fourth at State after a thrilling overtime 3rd/4th place game. Senior Joe Sayler, one of the top players in the state, and junior Nicolas Marshall were both named to the All-

Tournament team. Sayler was MVP of the Western Great Plains Conference and was a 1st Team All-Conference honoree along with Nic Marshall. TJ Beardt was a 3rd Team All-Conference selection.

Sayler received a prestigious honor at the State Tournament. He was named winner of the Spirit of Su award, given in

memory of SuAnne Big Crow. One senior winner is selected at each State Basketball Tournament for excellence both on and off the court. Sayler is the third Tiger to win the award, joining Louie Krogman (2008) and Nick Sayler (2020).

New school records set by the Tiger boys this year included 13 three-pointers in one game by Sayler, 16 assists in a game by Marshall, and 3 charges taken by Gavin Folkers ties the school record in that category.

It's been a great year of athletics for the WRHS Tigers with what looks like only more good things on the horizon.

WR School District continues to follow the approved, projected, and funded plans that have allowed the district to implement a significant number of improvements at Norris and White River School. These improvements are not limited to the physical buildings, but include providing the cleanest environment possible for staff and students, and to address the impact of lost instructional time due to Covid 19. The offering of extended learning through an afterschool program called Tiger Support to help students get caught up is but one example. The monies are directed to the social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs of the students.
