As part of a social skills group for fourth grade

boys, the students have been focusing on the unit, Guys with Ties, during the months of February and March. During this group time, students discuss the definition of "leadership," how people can be positive or negative leaders,



how to show leadership skills in the classroom, among peers, and on the field, and how leadership skills can be important with problems such as peer pressure. As part of the lesson, the students interviewed a leader, Mr. Gonzalez, on Friday, March 3rd, 2017. The students developed the questions for the interview which included, "How do you stay organized?" "How do you decide what is a good/bad choice?" and "How do you remember all the students' names?"

Happy Heart Month!


During these winter months, many of our students miss school due to illness. I will do my best to catch students up with the rest of the class, buy this might entail students giving up a rainy recess or using any free time during scheduled art class to make up missed work. I do communicate with the teachers regarding unfinished artwork, but it is the student's responsibility to come to me to finish their art projects.

My art students have been hard at work creating unique, beautiful pieces of artwork with a variety of techniques and materials. Some have are winter themed and some are not. Either way, I hope the students have as much fun as I do making art! Ongoing winter themed projects- I have included questions to ask our young artists as conversations starters:

- Afternoon Pre-K-clay pendants: What is a pendant? How can you make designs in the clay with a wooden stick? How do you make a clay bead?
- Kindergarten fish collage: What colors are in ocean water? What is papier mache? How can you make tissue stick to paper? What is sand and seaweed in art class?

- 1st Grade Van Gogh Sunflowers: What lines do you use to make a vase? How can you make flowers with a tracer? Describe different kinds of petals? What is a craypa and how do you use it in coloring? What is a still life?
- 2nd Grade birdhouses: What part of the birdhouse uses a 'T', (hint support)? How do you make a bird out of paper? What parts of a bird do you need to include so it looks real? What different positions do birds have?
- 3rd Grade reptile glazing: Why is a family of colors important when applying glaze? How can dots make different lines and designs? How many coats of glaze do you need so it becomes a solid color after firing?
- 4th Grade foil embossing: Why is repetition of shapes and lines important when creating a design? Is it easy to glue yarn and cover it with foil? Describe some color harmonies used in this project? Why do artists use certain color combinations? What is a color wheel?

COMMUNICATING WITH YOUR CHILDREN Sabena Escott, MSW School Social Worker

As the school year passes the 100 day mark, I have heard parents remark, "I didn't know my child was feeling that way," or "My child looked sad, but I wasn't sure how to ask him what was bothering him," and "I want to know what's going on with my child, but work and activities leave us hardly any time to catch up." If these sound familiar to you, you are not alone. As parents/guardians we want to be able to capture those moments, when speaking with our child allows for opportunities to communicate and listen to one another, so as not to miss out on connecting with them. Here are some thoughts and ideas that might help to open up the window of communication.

Be available for your children and respond to your child's needs:

- Notice times when your kids are most likely to talk — for example, at bedtime, before dinner, in the car — and be available. Really take the time to listen and focus just on them.
- Start a conversation with your kids. It shows them they are important to you.
- Find time each week for a one-on-one activity with each child, and avoid scheduling other activities during that time. It is important to always follow through.
- Learn about your children's interests —
 for example, favorite music and activities
 and show interest in them. Listen to
 which activities really make your child happy.
- Initiate conversations by sharing what you have been thinking about rather than beginning a conversation with a question.

 Ask your child their opinion.
- When your children are talking about their concerns, stop what you are doing and listen. This may be the one chance they take to open up to you about what's on their mind.

Respond in a way your children will be willing to listen:

- As children get older, let them include their thoughts and ideas. Have a discussion.
- At times, our personal feelings get in the way. Let them express their opinions and listen.
- Kids learn from their own choices. Let them make a mistake if there is no danger.
- Realize your children may test you by telling you a small part of what is bothering them. Listen carefully to what they say, encourage them to talk and they may share the rest of the story.

Parenting is hard work for elementary and middle school parents. As students grow and develop, it is important for parents to maintain a healthy connection with their child, and to seek support from their child's School Social Worker, School Psychologist and/or School Counselor if they have questions, need referrals or would like support with their child and/or family.
