Viking Family—WOW, Here we are rolling into the end of the 1st semester and the Holidays Seasons. To begin with, I want to personally wish all Viking Families a very Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year. Words can not express the gratitude and appreciation that all of you deserve to receive for your continued support of Mission Valley Schools. THANK YOU!

At the November Board of Education meeting the decision was made to move forward exploring facility upgrades and HTK Architects were hired to lead this process. This decision was made with previous financial information provided by Piper-Sandler Financial Services. This financial information included reporting that the final bond payment for our current bond is set to be made in September 2023 and that at current rates a \$10 million facility project could be done without impacting the current bond & interest mill levy which is set at 11.169 mills. Over the last 7 years the total mill levy for the district has decreased every year to its current amount of 58.475. According to Piper-Sandler, one of the main reasons that this opportunity exists is because of the excellent state that the district budget is in and the fact that interest rates continue to remain low.

Over the past month, approximately 100 people have completed a brief facility survey providing their current view of, and their vision for, the facilities at Mission Valley. Here are some results from the survey:

FACILITY RATINGS

72% rate MV facilities above average to excellent in providing a quality education.

54% rate the 7-12 facilities above average to excellent in providing a quality education.

90% rate the K-6 facilities above average to excellent in providing a quality education

48% rate the school grounds facilities above average to excellent in providing a quality education.

63% rate the effectiveness of the facilities as it relates to security and safety as above average to excellent.

54% rate the effectiveness of the 7-12 Career Technical Education facilities average to below average.

67% rate the outside athletic facilities as below average to poor while 61% rate the indoor athletic facilities as above average to excellent.

LEVELS OF IMPORTANCE

75% identified athletic upgrades as very to most important

68% identified Career & Technical Education facilities as very important to most important.

56% identified 7-12 classroom upgrades as very important to most important.

54% identified upgrades to infrastructure as very important to most important.

42% identified upgrades to security and safety as very important to most important.

77% identified moving the district office and bus barn to Mission Valley as little to least important.

85% identified classroom upgrades at the K-6 as little to least important.

As we look down the road, HTK and the stakeholders will move through the process using a plan which has 5 main steps in the process. Step 1 (Planning Principles) will include identifying stakeholders, goal setting, programming and defining the scope of the project. Step 2 (Facility Assessment) will include reviewing existing facility systems, examining both qualitative and quantitative information, and looking at current educational conditions. Step 3 (Vision) will include further stakeholder engagements, tours, concept development and defining the needs. Step 4 (Test & Refine) will include prioritizing projects, reconfirming costs, and identifying milestones that will indicate future actions. Step 5 (Master Plan) This takes the information from Step 1-4 and brings everything together into the final Master Plan that confirms costs and lays out the possible project phases.

Throughout this process It is my goal and the USD 330 Board of Education's goal to make sure that each patron of the district remains fully informed about this project. If you have any questions please do not hesitate to contact me.

Holiday Break

The last day of school for the first semester will be December 17th. We will be on Holiday Break this year from December 18th-January 3rd. Classes will resume on January 4th.

Finals Information

Finals will be held on December 15th-16th this year. For students to be exempt from finals they need to meet the following criteria:

- Have an A in the class that a final is given in.
- Have had NO ISS or OSS.
- No more than 3 tardies.
- No grades of D or F in any classes.
- No unexcused absences for the semester.
- If your child meets these requirements and has all A's they do not have to come to school on December 15th-16th if teachers have exempted them.
- The school will be open as usual but students only have to come for the hours in which they have a final exam to take unless they do not meet the above requirements.
- For example: if a student has more than 3 tardies or a D/F grade they will have to be at school all day.

Attendance

Excused absences are those with a valid reason and that has been communicated to the school by a parent. Student illness or other medical conditions are the most common types of excused absence; other reasons include religious observances, medical appointments, and family emergencies.

Unexcused absences, or truancy, occur when students miss school without a valid reason. Examples include deliberately skipping school as well as missing school for reasons deemed invalid by the school, such as oversleeping, haircuts, vacations, or missing the bus. **Tardies** there is no such thing as an excused tardy without a doctor's note. Life happens, alarms don't go off, and cars break down which is why students get 3 free tardies before consequences happen.

REGULAR BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING – November 8, 2021

Jacob Durkes called the regular meeting of the Board of Education of Mission Valley USD #330 to order at 7:02 p.m. in the Mission Valley Elementary Commons. Board members present were Clinton Lambotte, Jim Rudeen and Tuff Stephenson. Jon Deters, Clipper Goodrich and Mistina Kraus were absent. The superintendent and board clerk also attended.

Tuff Stephenson moved, seconded by Clinton Lambotte, to adopt the agenda with the following change, switch VIII. Receive D. Architect with E. Facility Survey Information. Motion passed 4 to 0.

Mistina Kraus arrived at the meeting at 7:08 p.m.

Students that attended the FFA National Convention gave a presentation.

Tuff Stephenson moved, seconded by Clinton Lambotte, to approve the consent agenda as presented. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Items in the consent agenda that were approved include: approval of the minutes of the October 11, 2021 regular board meeting; approval of clerk's report and treasurer's report as presented; approval of warrants in the amount of \$271,781.11; approval of extra duty pay in the amount of \$5,175.91; approval of transfers from the general fund to the at risk fund in the amount of \$15,000.00, to the pre-k at risk fund in the amount of \$13,000.00 and to the voc ed fund in the amount of \$20,000.00; approval of a \$2,000.00 donation from the United Church of Eskridge to be used for the Mission Valley Carnival; approval of the hiring of Kim Sims as paraprofessional and approval of administrators written reports as presented.

Clipper Goodrich joined the meeting via Zoom at 7:24 p.m.

Bids for the new transportation truck will be reviewed at the December board meeting.

Clipper left the meeting via Zoom at 7:30 p.m. due to technical difficulties.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to approve the state bid for a new 14 passenger bus at the price of \$72,195.00. Motion passed 5 to 0

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to approve the bid from Laird Noller Ford – Lawrence for a 10 passenger transit van at the price of \$34,703.00. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to approve the K-6 teacher job description as presented. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Tuff Stephenson moved, seconded by Clinton Lambotte, to approve the early graduation requests and the part time attendance requests as presented. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Financial information was provided in regards to the food service department.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Mistina Kraus, to approve opening up the use of school facilities to outside groups. Motion passed 4 to 1, with Jim Rudeen voting no.

Jacob Durkes moved, seconded by Mistina Kraus, to approve HTK Architects for upcoming projects. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Clinton Lambotte left the meeting @ 8:42 p.m.

Tuff Stephenson moved, seconded by Mistina Kraus, to approve the out of district student request as presented. Motion passed 4 to 0.

Clinton Lambotte joined the meeting at 8:44 p.m.

Mr. Wild and Mrs. Johnston gave their building and program reports.

The superintendent also attended.

The meeting reconvened in open session at 9:13 p.m.

Jacob Durkes moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to go back into executive session at 9:15 p.m. to discuss an individual employee's performance pursuant to non-elected personnel exception under KOMA, and that they return to open session in

the same room at 9:25 p.m. Motion passed 4 to 0. The superintendent also attended.

The meeting reconvened in open session at 9:25 p.m.

Mistina Kraus joined the meeting at 9:27 p.m.

Jacob Durkes moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to approve the hiring of Jamey Hancock as assistant junior high basketball coach and the resignation of Justin Duncan as head high school football coach. Motion passed 5 to 0.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tuff Stephenson, to adjourn the meeting. Motion passed 5 to 0. Meeting adjourned at 9:28 p.m.

TIDBITS OF KNOWLEDGE TO TAKE IN AND UNDERSTAND IN REGARDS TO THE ACT/SAT NEED:

SENIORS---take the ACT or SAT on one of these dates if:

- you're planning to enroll in college and have not yet taken one of these tests
- taking the test helps with placement AND financial aid scholarships based upon merit

JUNIORS

• You may want to consider testing BY APRIL if you are attempting to complete the **Qualified Admissions** curriculum as you must have a 21 OR higher on the Math portion of the ACT by the end of junior year OR you will need to take another year of math your senior year to be consider for Qualified Admissions.



The Viking HOUR is now 5 days a week. This means that there will no longer be a seminar and an advisory period, just Viking HOUR. Viking HOUR will focus on college/career readiness, academic improvement, employability skills, and socio-emotional growth.

This is just one avenue that the counseling department will be using to address the Socio-Emotional Character & Development standards created by the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE). Socio-Emotional Learning (SEL) (both are known as Socio-Emotional Growth or SEG) has found its way into all aspects of the educational

curriculum to insure that our students are being given many opportunities to develop the necessary relationship-building, communication, and coping skills in order to meet the rigor and relevance of their academic and vocational goals starting this fall 2021 and continuing with future classes.

The lessons and assignments are geared to fit the student at their specific grade/age level. The students will have each month to complete the assignments that are assigned to them monthly, and the core lessons are needed to be completed by the end of each semester.

Students MUST complete these requirements during the 9 weeks/semester or it will affect their eligibility status within KSHSAA and extracurricular activities.



Mission Valley Students Shine on National Stage

FCCLA stands for Family, Career & Community Leaders of America. The organization is focused on instilling family values through leadership development and career preparation. FCCLA is part of the Family & Consumer Sciences curriculum offered at many schools. Mission Valley High School's FCCLA chapter has been active and thriving despite challenges presented in the last year. The chapter recently was awarded the Spotlight High Honor Chapter Award from Kansas FCCLA, placing first in student participation for the entire state of Kansas. Part of the scoring for this prestigious award is based on attendance at conferences.

This past summer, five students from Mission Valley High School qualified to attend the FCCLA National Leadership Conference in Nashville, Tennessee. Of the students attending, Megan Deters earned a silver medal for her STAR Event, Sports Nutrition and placed 15th overall. Kiki Widau and Paige Sims earned a gold medal for their STAR Event, Hospitality, Tourism and Recreation and placed 2nd overall. Clara Johnston also earned a gold for her STAR Event, Chapter in Review Portfolio and placed 1st overall. STAR stands for Students Taking Action with Recognition and are competitive speaking events in which FCCLA members complete an in-depth project and then present it to judges at the district, state and national level.

Additionally, Karlyn Gustin ran for and was elected to the National Executive Council. She is serving as the 2021-2022 Vice President of Parliamentary Law. As part of her duties, she helps lead the national conferences and supports the needs of FCCLA's more than 155,000 members across the country. There are ten national officers elected each year. This honor is one that Karlyn has been working toward for several years. She has served three years as a chapter officer and two years as a state officer for Kansas. Throughout her term, she will have the opportunity to travel and speak to schools and even state delegations about the FCCLA organization.

Last week, three members of Mission Valley FCCLA traveled to Washington, D.C. for the National Fall Conference to hear from keynote speakers, career pathway opportunities and take place in youth networking opportunities. At this conference, Mission Valley also received results from their fall competitions, known as Skill Demonstration Events. Through these projects, members show competence in their knowledge of Family & Consumer Sciences skills and information. Clara Johnston placed 3rd in the nation in the FCCLA Knowledge category. 


