

Grades K-2

Ahmed, Roda - Mae Among the Stars

Inspired by the story of Mae Jemison, the first African-American woman in space"--Dust jacket flap. "Little Mae is a girl with big dreams, a supportive loving family, unbounded passion, and all the right stuff to dance among the stars. Against all odds, she will overcome any obstacle to become an astronaut one day.

Allberg, Allan - Previously

The adventures of various nursery rhyme and fairy tale characters are retold in reverse sequence with each tale interrelated to the other. The book includes the tales of Goldilocks, Jack and the Beanstalk, Jack and Jill, Frog Prince, and Cinderella.

Allen, Debbie - Dancing in the Wings

Sassy worries that her too-big feet, her too-long legs, and even her big mouth will keep her from her dream of becoming a ballerina.

Aronson, Billy - Melia & Jo

Melia is scientific and loves to create things in her backyard laboratory, but something is missing. Her inventions just aren't quite right. Enter Jo, her new friend with an artistic spirit. When you add the arts to sciences, something magical happens!

Barnes, Derrick - The King of Kindergarten

Starting kindergarten is a big milestone—and the hero of this story is ready to make his mark! He's dressed himself, eaten a pile of pancakes, and can't wait to be part of a whole new kingdom of kids. The day will be jam-packed, but he's up to the challenge, taking new experiences in stride with his infectious enthusiasm! And afterward, he can't wait to tell his proud parents all about his achievements—and then wake up to start another day.

Beaty, Andrea - Ada Twist and the Perilous Pants: The Questioneers Book #2

Ada is a curious girl who sets out on fact-finding missions and elaborate scientific experiments. This story is full of wonder and possibilities.

Becker, Helaine - Counting on Katherine

The story of Katherine Johnson, an African-American mathematician who worked for NASA during the space race and was depicted in the film Hidden Figures.

Bender, Mike - The Book About Nothing

This book has nothing to do with rainbows, rocket ships, or wizards. Instead, it's full of zip, zilch, diddly-squat, bupkus. But don't worry, reading this book isn't all for nothing, because sometimes nothing is actually something.

Like if you pick up all the toys in your room, what will be on the floor? NOTHING.

When you take a bath, what are you wearing? NOTHING.

And when you shut the lights off to go to bed, what do you see? NOTHING.

Bernstrom, Daniel - Gator, Gator, Gator!

In Daniel Bernstrom's follow-up to the critically acclaimed One Day in the Eucalyptus, Eucalyptus Tree, a fearless little girl, takes off in search of a giant gator--but she's not going into that swamp alone! No way! She wants YOU, the reader, to come along. Off you go, peering through the lush landscapes, looking for that gator! But each time you think you see it? Oops! Just a fox. Or some ducks! Or a snake. Maybe you'll never find the gator, gator, gator!

Briere-Haquet, Alice- Nina: jazz legend and civil-rights activist Nina Simone

With beautiful black-and-white illustrations and moving prose, readers are introduced to Nina Simone, jazz-music legend and civil-rights activist. Shared as a lullaby to her daughter, a soulful song recounts Simone's career, the trials she faced as an African American woman, and the stand she took during the Civil Rights Movement.

Cherry, Matthew - Hair Love

This endearing story will have you smiling and crying as this young family celebrates a special day. Watch this <u>movie short</u> to learn more about the characters.

Chin-Lee, Cynthia - Amelia to Zora

An ABC book using first names of women from around the globe who have made impressive contributions to the world.

Cornwall, Gaia - Jabari Jumps

Working up the courage to take a big, important leap is hard, but Jabari is *almost* absolutely ready to make a giant splash.

Curtis, Jamie Lee - Today I Feel Silly and Other Moods That Make My Day

This colorful, energetic book uses comedy to promote an understanding of common emotions.

De Paola, Tomie - Now One Foot, Now the Other This story sensitively provides understanding of a grandparent's illness.

Derting, Kimberly - Cece Loves Science

Cece loves science. In this STEM-themed book, Cece asks one of life's most important questions: Do dogs eat vegetables? Cece and her best friend, Isaac, head to the lab to find out.

Diakite, Penda - I Lost My Tooth in Africa

This story recounts a child's visit to Mali, where she loses her tooth. After she hides it under a calabash, she waits for the African Tooth Fairy to replace it with a chicken.

DiCamillo, Kate - Mercy Watson Books

Enter the comical and delightful world of this domesticated pig, Mercy Watson, who seeks adventure in each of these early chapter books.

Ehlert, Lois - Under My Nose

Author and illustrator of books for young people, Lois Ehlert, shares how she interweaves her creative process with her daily routine. Imagine this as a virtual author visit.

Ehrenberg, Pamela - Queen of Hanukkah Dosas

In this sweet and humorous picture book, *Queen of the Hanukkah Dosas*, a multi-cultural family (Mom's Indian; Dad's Jewish) celebrate Hanukkah while incorporating traditional Indian food.

Ellis, Sonica - Kindness Rocks

A touching children's book about the power of kindness and how small things can inspire, motivate and uplift others in tremendous ways.

Fletcher, Jane Cowen - Mama Zooms

A young boy's mama takes him zooming everywhere with her, because her wheelchair is a zooming machine.

Fowler, Allan - How Do You Know? Series of books

This series presents the answers to many questions a young learner might have about our world.

Fox. Mem - Whoever You Are

Despite the differences between people around the world, there are similarities that join us together, such as pain, joy, and love.

Freeman, Don - Dandelion

The inspiring true story of two great friends, a baby hippo named Owen and a 130-yr-old giant tortoise named Mzee (Mm-ZAY).

Henkes, Kevin - A Parade of Elephants
Up and down, over and under, through and around . . . five big and brightly colored elephants are on a mission in this picture book for young children by Caldecott Medalist Kevin Henkes. Where are they going? What will they do when they get there? It's a surprise!

Henkes, Kevin - Wemberly Worried

A mouse named Wemberly, who worries about everything, finds that she has a whole list of things to worry about when she faces the first day of school.

Hobbie, Holly - Toot and Puddle

Friends, Toot and Puddle, spend a year apart. Toot tours the world and sends monthly postcards, keeping Puddle aware of his adventures.

Hoose, Phillip - Hey, Little Ant

An ant tries to convince a boy not to squish him because although they are different, in many ways they are alike.

and Lenore, four dogs that work hard on the farm
doing various jobs. They're good friends now, but it
wasn't always this way. Just as each dog has a
different role on the farm, each has a unique story.
Filled with his captivating photographs, bestselling
author Jon Katz's heartwarming account of his dogs'
lives on Bedlam Farm is unforgettable.

Keats, Ezra Jack - The Snowy Day

A true classic that captures the magic of the first snowfall. Peter takes a quiet walk through his neighborhood and feels all that is possible.

Lamothe, Matt - This is How We Do It: One Day in the Lives of Seven Kids from around the World
An illustrated take on how seven real kids from different countries go about a typical day. Each spread introduces a new topic (family, teachers, chores, dinner, play, etc.) and dedicates a panel to each child, identified by country, with glossary words underlined ("Iran: I live in a second-floor apartment in the city of Gorgan, close to the Caspian Sea.").

Lears, Laurie - *Ian's Walk: A Story About Autism* A sister experiences everyday things in a different way when she takes her autistic brother for a walk.

Lester, Helen - Tacky the Penguin

Tacky the Penguin does not fit in with his sleek and graceful companions, but his odd behavior comes in handy when hunters come with maps and traps.

Lin, Grace - A Big Mooncake for the Little Star
As a Caldecott Honor Book, this picture book is special. Little Star loves the delicious mooncake that she bakes with her mother. Share the importance of the Asian holiday Mid Autumn Moon Festival.

Lobel, Arnold - Frog and Toad books

Frog and Toad are always there for each other --just as best friends should be.

Love, Jessica - Julian is a Mermaid

While riding the subway home from the pool with his abuela one day, Julian notices three women spectacularly dressed up. Their hair billows in brilliant hues, their dresses end in fishtails, and their joy fills the train car. When Julian gets home, daydreaming of the magic he's seen, all he can think about is dressing up just like the ladies in his own fabulous mermaid costume: a butter-yellow curtain for his tail, the fronds of a potted fern for his headdress. But what will Abuela think about the mess he makes—and even more importantly, what will she think about how Julian sees himself?

Maillard, Kevin Noble - Fry Bread: A Native American Family Story

A wonderful story for young children of a modern Native American family that colorfully shares the connection between food and identity.

Martinez-Neal, Juana - Alma and How She Got Her Name

What's in a name? For one little girl, her very long name tells the vibrant story of where she came from — and who she may one day be.

Mayer, Gina and Mercer - Just a Little Different
A new kid has moved in next door to Little Critter and
his family. He's just a little bit different: his mother is a
rabbit and his father is a turtle.

McAnulty, Stacy - Earth! My first 4.54 Billion Years

McCarthy, Meghan - All that trash: the story of the 1987 garbage barge and our problem with stuff

A garbage barge that can't find a place to welcome it sparks a recycling movement in the United States in this smart and smelly picture book from the author of Earmuffs for Everyone.

McCully, Emily Arnold - Caroline's Comets

The true story of Caroline Herschel who was the first woman professional scientist and one of the greatest astronomers who ever lived. She was born the youngest daughter of a poor family in Hanover, Germany. She and her brother, William, left for England and with their shared passion for stars, they built the greatest telescope of their age. Using their telescope, Caroline discovered fourteen nebulae and two galaxies, was the first woman to discover a comet, and became the first woman officially employed as a scientist—by no less than the King of England.

McKee, David - Elmer

All the elephants of the jungle were gray except Elmer, who was a patchwork of brilliant colors until the day he got tired of being different and making the other elephants laugh.

Messner, Kate - Up in the Garden and Down in the Dirt

Up in the garden, the world is full of green—leaves and sprouts, growing vegetables, ripening fruit. But down in the dirt there is a busy world of earthworms digging, snakes hunting, skunks burrowing, and all the other animals that make a garden their home. In this exuberant and lyrical book, discover the wonders that lie hidden between stalks, under the shade of leaves...and down in the dirt.

Mora, Oge - Thank You, Omu!

Everyone in the neighborhood dreams of a taste of Omu's delicious stew! One by one, they follow their noses toward the scrumptious scent. And one by one, Omu offers a portion of her meal. Soon the pot is empty. Has she been so generous that she has nothing left for herself?



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Morris, Richard T. - A Bear Came Along

Once there was a river flowing through a forest. The river didn't know it was capable of adventures until a big bear came along. But adventures aren't any fun by yourself, and so enters Froggy, Turtles, Beaver, Racoons, and Duck. These very different animals take off downstream, but they didn't know they needed one another until thankfully, the river came along. This hilarious picture book and heartfelt message celebrates the joy and fun that's in store when you embark together on a ride of a lifetime.

Muhammad, Ibtihaj - The Proudest Blue: A Story of Hijab and Family

A powerful, vibrantly illustrated story about the first day of school--and two sisters on one's first day of hijab--by Olympic medalist and social justice activist Ibtihaj Muhammad.

Munsinger, Lynn - Hooway for Wodney Wat

All his classmates make fun of Rodney because he can't pronounce his name, but it is Rodney's unique speech that drives away the class bully.

Munson, Derek - Enemy Pie

Hoping that the "special" pie which his father makes will help him get rid of his enemy, a little boy finds that instead it helps him make a new friend.

Musgrove, Margaret - Ashanti to Zulu: African Traditions

Each letter of this exquisitely illustrated alphabet book represents a different African culture.

Newson, Karl - I am a Tiger

This is a story about a mouse with BIG ideas. Mouse believes he is a tiger, and he convinces Fox, Raccoon, Snake, and Bird he's one, too! After all, Mouse can climb a tree like a tiger and hunt for his lunch, too. And not all tigers are big and have stripes. But when a real tiger shows up, can Mouse keep up his act?

Nickle, John - The Ant Bully

Lucas learns a lesson about bullying when he is pulled into the ant hole he has been tormenting.

Osborne, Mary Pope - The Knight at Dawn (and additional Magic Tree House chapter books)
Annie and Jack enter the Middle Ages and learn about knights, castles and foods of the times.

Parr, Todd - It's Okay to Be Different (and additional titles)

Children celebrate differences in a simple and fun way.

Perkins, Useni Eugene - Hey Black Child

This title is an adaptation of the poem previously published in Black Fairy and Other Plays, by Useni Eugene Perkins, in 1993. "A ... poem that celebrates black children and seeks to inspire all young ones to dream big and achieve their goals.

Richards, Dan - Once Upon a Goat

Once upon a time, a very prim and proper king and queen begged their fairy godmother for a child. They'd prefer a boy, with glowing skin, bright eyes, and two roses for lips . . . but any kid will do. When they find themselves gifted with a baby goat (also known as a kid) instead, they can't imagine how he'll fit into their lives. But of course, it isn't long before he's part of the royal family.

Robbins, Dean - The astronaut who painted the moon : the story of Alan Bean

As a boy, Alan wanted to fly planes. As a young navy pilot, Alan wished he could paint the view from the cockpit. So he took an art class to learn patterns and forms. But no class could prepare him for the beauty of the lunar surface some 240,000 miles from Earth. In 1969, Alan became the fourth man and first artist on the moon. He took dozens of pictures, but none compared to what he saw through his artistic eyes. When he returned to Earth, he began to paint what he saw. Alan's paintings allowed humanity to experience what it truly felt like to walk on the moon.
