### **Superintendent Presented Award of Excellence**

# Kindergarten Readiness Academy Focuses on Early Literacy Achievement

Nineteen soon-to-be Spartans participated in the district's first-ever Kindergarten Readiness Academy in June. The Academy gave students a jumpstart on their educational journey, particularly in the area of literacy skills.

The students will be placed in the same class for kindergarten, allowing Richmond Heights to measure their progress throughout the year. This opportunity was funded through a grant from the Ohio Department of Education.



### **Treasurer Update**

It is an uncertain time in the world of school finance. The Richmond Heights Schools Board of Education approved the district's latest 5-year forecast in May. Unfortunately, the forecast shows that Richmond Heights will see a revenue shortfall of more than \$1.1 million in FY 2023, increasing to a projected shortfall of \$2.5 million by FY 2027. However, there are still many unknowns right now that can impact these numbers.

Ohio's next two-year budget bill was signed into law on July 4. It includes funding for the Fair School Funding Plan, which was enacted in House Bill 10, the state's last budget bill. We are currently running simulations to see how Richmond Heights Schools will be affected, and will update our five-year forecast accordingly.

The Board of Education is taking a proactive approach to our current financial challenges by exploring levy options and examining areas for cost containment. Additionally, we are continuing to work with Rockmill Financial Consulting and our community-led Tax Policy Committee on a long-term plan to replace some local property taxes with an earned income tax. This will create a more equitable taxing system, reduce the overall cost to taxpayers, particularly senior citizens and those on fixed incomes, and generate more money from renters.

## **Elementary Students REACHing for New Heights**

It's never too soon to start developing our students for their future. This summer, five of our fifth grade boys attended a 5-week, tuition-free program called REACH, a rigorous summer enrichment program at University School for academically talented African-American boys.

The program accommodates up to 100 students who are chosen at the end of their fifth-grade year. The students remain enrolled for three consecutive summers. The program is designed to teach boys lessons concerning focus, thoughtfulness, creativity, persistence, determination, courage, resilience, and excellence. In addition to the summer curriculum, the boys attend cultural events and workshops throughout the school year. A typical day would include Core Classes, taught by experienced mentor teachers; Elective Classes, selected by the student and designed to deepen the students understanding of the African-American experience; Recreation, an hour-long period where again the student selects the activity and learns about sportsmanship and teamwork; and Field Trips, used to reinforce concepts studied in class. Throughout the school year, students may also participate in follow-up activities such as career panel discussions, service projects for community building, and college guidance and preparation sessions.

## **Recycling Program Coming to Richmond Heights**

Recycling is on its way to the city of Richmond Heights and Richmond Heights Schools thanks to a group of Great Lakes Literacy Scholars. The group of Spartan students made up of Mason Minor, Tasean Gross, Autumn Christian, and Nikolai Iwanyckyj, have been educating, advocating and acting on this issue.

They have learned the environmental and health effects of garbage leaking toxins into our water and homes, and the social, political, and financial aspects of bringing a recycling effort to a community.

## First Ring Leadership Academy Students Make Final Presentation

That can lead to lack of motivation or just giving up. Our research topic is about how to improve our school's Academic Achievement and why people aren't performing to the best of their abilities. This is very important to us because we feel it affects the students mental health, physical health, and future.

In our survey we sent out, of the 57 responses, results show some students to be unmotivated to complete assignments, lack time management, and struggle with mental health.

Recommendations to support all students achieve academically in and out of the classroom have been made and will be the focus for year two.

Two brothers from Richmond Heights Schools were recently named recipients of Humanitarian Awards from the Educational Service Center of Northeast Ohio.
