cluded with a parking lot graduation ceremony, and the seniors were honored in several ways, including banners down Main Street.

We here at Upsala Area Schools appreciate how staff, students, parents and everyone involved stepped up to make the best of a bad situation. We hope to actually SEE our students on a regular basis come next fall!

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A School Year We Will Never Forget

Over the course of my career here in Upsala, each school year has started and ended in similar fashion. Each year has had its unique characteristics, but there has always been a consistency and natural rhythm to the school year... until this year.

The 2019-2020 school year, without a doubt, will be remembered for how it ended.

After beginning the year with the same excitement as every previous year, anticipating the year would progress in a 'normal' fashion, we suddenly were challenged to continue the school year in a 'distance learning model'. The challenges that we faced as we developed our model were new to all of us.

Developing plans to maintain the continuity of learning, deliver resources, provide meals and child care while dealing with the issues related to access and equity were challenges that none of us would have ever considered last September.

Thankfully, our students, staff, and families accepted these challenges with a positive mindset that allowed us to develop solutions to meet the various needs of our school community. I am extremely grateful for everyone involved in developing and implementing our distance learning plan and I am proud of what we accomplished.

I am also proud of how our students have responded during this time of crisis, especially our senior class. The school closure forced the cancellation of many traditional milestones that our students would experience during the final months of school.

For seniors, these included events (Prom, spring sports activities, spring concerts and the musical, etc) that they will most likely never get to experience again. Even the alteration of our traditional commencement ceremony will create a new experience for the Class of 2020 that no other graduating class has experienced.

Through all of this, our students have responded with the attributes that have allowed them to persevere through these disappointments. I appreciate each and every one of them and wish them all the best.

Looking forward, we cannot predict what fall will bring, however, whatever challenges we may still face as a

result of the COVID-19 pandemic, rest assured that we will be prepared to the best of our ability to meet the needs of our students and families.

We will be spending a lot of planning time over the summer developing models for a variety of scenarios. While we continue to hope that we will start the 2020-21 school year in a traditional manner, we will be considerate of alternative models in the event we begin with a non-traditional school start-up.



TEACHING CAREER

Mr. Drill has taught for 34 years and coached for 36 years in Upsala. He arrived in Mid- August of 1986 to begin as the Head Football coach at Upsala.

Upsala is the only school where he has ever taught. He coached Freshman Football at Cathedral High School in St. Cloud the two prior years before coming to Upsala.

When asked about his favorite memories about teaching at Upsala, Mr. Drill said, "My most favorite memories of my teaching career are when I have developed enough trust and respect from my students and athletes to become transparent with me about their personal struggles in their lives. Making and keeping that connection of support is priceless to me. Each life is so tender and moldable. It was such a joy to just be there for them."

His future plans are to continue to do what he currently does, but have a little more time to do it! He will continue to lead worship at Brighter Days Church and preach a little when needed. He might even take some theology classes towards becoming a Pastor. He also wants to do construction work with Darrel Peterson and learn from him how to build things.

Traveling more with his wife is definitely on the list, but that may need to wait until she retires in two years. Two granddaughters also have his attention these days, and both are within an hour's drive. And a little more muskie fishing couldn't be all that bad either.



This is a tough one to write, because distance learning has been a challenge when you have three shop classes and a greenhouse class in one semester, plus other classes. It's been a challenge to teach some manner of woods and welding through the internet, and it certainly isn't anything like having students learning hands on in the shop! We have done the best we could on short notice and there still are some blessings, and students and I have learned lots together.

We have several seniors who have earned Bridges Career Academy Certificates this year again. This means they have completed a series of classes in a concentrated area and have met requirement levels of skills and grades in those areas. The students are:

Nathan Graves (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking), Ray Kokett (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking and Welding), Michael Lange (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking and Welding), Ethan La Rue (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking), Carver McDermond (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking and Welding), and Brandon Rhode (Ag Carpentry/Woodworking). These certificates are awarded from the Central Lakes College Bridges program. Congratulations!

Our greenhouse program still managed to have a plant sale this spring, and response from our community has been outstanding! Thanks are due to many staff who helped to make this possible. It was so enjoyable to work with staff in a context that is far different than our normal staff meetings, and get to know them better. We also had some alumni help with volunteering to staff our sales, so it was a great group effort.

Unfortunately we were not able to compete with our teams at the FFA State Convention and other spring contests which were cancelled. A fortunate thing is that nearly all of the students will still have the chance to compete in FFA events next year if things get back to some degree of normal. FFA members that had qualified for state:

General IIvestock team: Bryce Westrich, Tabitha Oliver, Hannah Luedtke, Paige Gerads and Dillon Krebs as an alternate.

Dairy Evaluation: Alice Hebig, Jacob Roerick, Michael Blonigen

Poultry: Ray Kokett and Myra Arvig qualified as individuals to go to state, placing 9th and 10th respectively at regions.

We had teams compete in a record number of different career development events this year, the most in the past 20 years! Our chapter had also competed in Horse Evaluation, Fish and Wildlife, Small Animal/Veterinary Science, Creed Speaking, Prepared Public Speaking, Farm Bureau Discussion Meet, and we were preparing teams in Ag Mechanics and Nursery Landscaping before things were closed down. This is outstanding, and shows the drive our FFA members have in our chapter. Our chapter leaders worked very hard to put on an incredible FFA Week Ag Olympics day in February, engaging the whole student body in a variety of activities. They conducted Ag Literacy and science lessons with elementary students as well. There are some wonderful emerging leaders in our chapter, good things will keep coming!

Grants our FFA chapter received last spring were used to purchase new chromebook laptops and a storage cart for our classroom. Students are taking good care of these laptops and the FFA logo is on each one in the form of a sticker.

The grant from America's Farmers Grow Leaders fund has been used to purchase the waterjet piece of equipment, alumni members were able to see it in action on the Food Science CDE day. It is beginning to be used by students, primarily by the engineering class, but this is expected to spread out to being used by other students as well.

A federal Perkins fund grant was applied for by Mrs. Schleper in May, of last year, for a new laser engraver machine for the shop, cost of about \$17,000. Grant obtained, laser engraver is here and has used several hours each day, especially by woodshop students.

Central Minnesota builders associated grant was also applied for, obtained for the amount of \$950. New tools for the wood shop just arrived,, as sanders, routers and other hand power tools were badly in need of replacing. Spring semester saw nearly 40 students working in the wood shop every day in multiple classes, so tools get tons of use!

Another Perkins federal reallocation grant was applied for in September, obtained for \$1,000 for tools for the welding shop, new wrench sets, metal working hammers, clamps etc are here and being used. Writing grants is detailed and time consuming, but worth it in the end!

Finally, I am moved to tears immediately as I begin to write about the journals students have turned in for our Advanced woods and Intro to Ag Science classes. We have some very fine young people out there who have shared pictures and journaled hours of work time working very hard to till, rock pick, plant, milk, feed, bed, repair, weld, fabricate and design, shingle, carpet, build, mow, landscape, and care for animals; doing essential work every single day, from 3:30 am to midnight. I can't express the pride and respect I have for these students, learning important skills and earning calloused hands, sending in pictures and descriptions every week, building unique relationships through these assignments. They still took time to let me know they looked up at geese flying, smelled the awakening of the earth in spring, and took time to listen to birdsong while hard at work. The future is bright in these kids' hands.




