2021-2022 School Year Preparations

The 2021-2022 school year is almost upon us and we have been busy preparing for our students and staff to return. As you know, the 2020-2021 school year presented us with unprecedented conditions for operations and programs. To state that we persevered through the last school year is an understatement. Once

again, I have to give a lot of credit to our students and our staff for their resiliency throughout this pandemic. Needless to say, I think we're all ready to leave the 2020-2021 school year and the COVID pandemic behind us as we look toward the 2021-2022 school year. At the time of this writing, we are preparing for a traditional school year without the need for face coverings and other pandemic protocols in place. We will implement specific practices to ensure the health and safety of our students and staff based on guidance from Morrison County Public Health, the MN Dept of Education (MDE) and the MN Dept of Health (MDH) which will include appropriate spacing, reduced class sizes and enhanced cleaning and sanitizing of all areas of our building. In addition, we are planning for a distance/blended learning option for students based on guidance from MDE. More information on the options available will be forthcoming as we finalize the specific details.

In preparing for the upcoming school year, we are also planning to implement a wrap-around school age child care program. The program will be designed to provide before and after school child care for UAS students. More information will be forthcoming as we finalize the details of the program.

Application for Educational Benefits- We Need Your Help

You may or may not be aware, but one of the annual tasks we ask of you is the completion of the Application for Educational Benefits. This form allows families to apply for benefits that include Free and Reduced Lunches. In addition to providing the students with this benefit, the MN Dept of Education uses the completion of this application as a factor in determining the amount of funding our District receives. In short, the more applications we have completed, the more funding we receive. This funding stream has been negatively impacted by the pandemic and in order to restore our funding to pre-pandemic levels, we need you to complete this form. Forms are available on the District website and will be available during our back to school activities and open house. If you have questions or need assistance in completing the application, please contact the District office at 320-573-2174. This process is completely private and confidential.

Maintenance and Capital Improvement Projects.

Every summer, our summer maintenance crew is busy preparing the facilities for the return of students and staff. This summer, in addition to our annual deep cleaning tasks, we have also added some maintenance projects as part of our long-term facilities maintenance plan. This plan, required by State statute, enables the District to use funding specifically dedicated for facilities maintenance to maintain, and prevent erosion of, existing facilities. This revenue stream has enabled the District to complete essential projects without redirecting funding away from other programming. We are very fortunate that our District has quality facilities for our students and community members and one of our major goals is to maintain our facilities in the best possible condition for many years to come. Our projects this summer include cleaning and polishing the commons floor, gym floor finish re-coats, repair of the retaining wall by the loading dock, flooring replacement, roof repair and replacement, and replacement of a significant number of window coverings throughout the building. We have a number of additional capital improvements and major maintenance items to complete and we need your help. We will be asking District voters to approve our capital facilities project plan this November with another bond referendum question. I assure you that we are not asking for extravagance, but to meet the needs that were identified through a facility needs assessment. These projects are too large for us to plan for using long-term facilities maintenance funding alone. The project plans include additions to the building and facilities to enhance security and efficiency of use. The maintenance projects include necessary replacement/upgrades of roofs, HVAC systems, and classroom spaces. One of the main strategic goals of our District is to be fiscally responsible with the funding we receive. I believe that we have met this goal each year and will continue to do so in the future. More information on the specifics of the capital projects will be provided in the near future. Stay tuned.

Each year, as the first day of school approaches, I get excited for the potential of what's to come. This year even more so. I am excited to see our students return, and to meet the new students that will join our school community. I get excited to see our classrooms active and busy again. I get excited to watch our students compete and perform, and to share in their successes throughout the year. One of my favorite quotes is from tennis player Arthur Ashe, who said, "Success is a journey, not a destination. The doing is often more important than the outcome." I am blessed to be able to share this journey with our students and community and look forward to another great school year. As always, please feel free to contact me with any questions or concerns that you may have.

The 2021-2022 school year is right around the corner! At the time I am writing this for the district newsletter, it looks like we could see a normal start to the school year.

Open house will be in person from 4 to 8 on September 1st. That

evening we will also have 7th grade and 7-12 new student orientation at 6pm. You should have received a letter with information regarding orientation. If you have not and are a new student or are a current student going into 7th grade, please contact the main office.

As the school year nears, we will be sending out a letter to all families in the district with more information and a finalized plan for the 21-22 school year.

Your children may qualify for free or reduced-price school meals. To apply, complete the enclosed Application for Educational Benefits following the instructions. A new application must be submitted each year. At public schools, your application also helps the school qualify for education funds and discounts.

State funds help to pay for reduced-price school meals, so all students who are approved for either free or reduced-price school meals will receive school meals at no charge. State funds also help to pay for breakfasts for kindergarten students, so all participating kindergarten students receive breakfasts at no charge.

Who can get free school meals? Children in households participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), and foster, homeless, migrant and runaway children can get free school meals without reporting household income. Alternatively, children can get free school meals if their household income is within the maximum income shown for their household size on the instructions.

To apply for free school meals, please complete the Application for Educational Benefits form.

COMMON QUESTIONS:

I get WIC or Medical Assistance. Can my children get free school meals? Children in households participating in WIC or Medical Assistance do not automatically qualify for free meals. Children may be eligible for free or reduced-price school meals depending on other household financial information. Please fill out an application.

Who should I include as household members? Include yourself and all other people living in the household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends).

May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your children do not have to be U.S. citizens for your children to qualify for free or reduced-price school meals.

What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally get. If you normally get overtime, include it, but not if you get overtime only sometimes. For seasonal work, write in the total annual income.

Will the income information or case number I give be checked? It may be. We may also ask you to send written proof.

How will the information be kept? Information you provide on the form, and your child's approval for meal benefits, will be protected as private data. For more information see the back page of the Application for Educational Benefits.

If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. Please complete an application at any time if your income goes down, your household size goes up, or you start getting SNAP, MFIP or FDPIR benefits.

Please provide the information requested about children's racial identity and ethnicity, which helps to make sure we are fully serving our community. This information is not required for approval of school meal benefits.

How to Complete the Application for Educational Benefits

Complete the Application for Educational Benefits form for school year 2021-22 if any of the following applies to your household:

- Any household member currently participates in the Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP), or the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) or
- The household includes one or more foster children (a welfare agency or court has legal responsibility for the child) or
- The total income of household members is within the guidelines shown below (gross earnings before deductions, not takehome pay). Do not include as income: foster care payments, federal education benefits, MFIP payments, or value of assistance received from SNAP, WIC, or FDPIR. Military: Do not include combat pay or assistance from the Military Privatized Housing Initiative. The income guidelines are effective from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022.

Step 1: Children

List all infants and children in the household, their school and grade if applicable, and birthdate. Attach an additional page if needed to list all children. Check the box if a child is in foster care (a welfare agency or court has legal responsibility for the child).

Step 2: Case Number

If any household member currently participates in SNAP, MFIP or FDPIR, write in the case number and then go to Step 4. If you do not participate in any of these programs, leave Step 2 blank and continue on to Step 3.

Step 3: Adult and Child Incomes / Last 4 Digits of Social Security Number

- Social Security Number/Total Household Members. An adult household member must provide the last four digits of their Social Security number or check the box if they do not have a Social Security number. Report the total number of household members and ensure all household members are listed individually on the application in the child or adult section as applicable.
- **Child Income**. If any children in the household have regular income, such as SSI or part-time jobs, list the total amount of regular incomes received by all children, and check the box for the frequency: weekly, bi-weekly, twice a month, or monthly. Do not include occasional earnings like babysitting or lawn mowing.
- Adult income. Report the names of adult household members and income earned in this section.
 - o List all adults living in the household not listed in Step 1, whether related or not, such as grandparents, relatives, or friends.
 - o **Gross Earnings from Work**. This is usually the money received from working at jobs where a paycheck is received. For each income, check the box to show how often the income is received: weekly, bi-weekly, twice per month, or monthly.
 - List gross incomes before deductions, not take-home pay. Do not list an hourly wage rate. For adults with no income to report, enter a '0' or leave the section blank. For seasonal work, write in the total annual income.
 - Are you Self-Employed or a Farmer? List the net income per month or year after business expenses. Do not list the same income twice on the application. A loss from farm or self-employment must be listed as 0 income and does not reduce other income.
 - Any Other Gross Income. List gross incomes before deductions from all other sources, such as SSI, unemployment, child support, public assistance, social security, rental income or annuities.

Step 4: Signature and Contact Information An adult household member must sign the form. If you do not want your information to be shared with Minnesota Health Care Programs, check the "Don't share" box in Step 4.

Optional: Please provide the information on ethnicity and race that is requested on the second page of the form. This information is not required and does not affect approval for school meal benefits. The information helps to ensure we are meeting civil rights requirements and fully serving our community.




