Students are able to maintain 3 ft separation. Elementary students eat in the cafeteria sitting in alternate chairs. Middle school and high school students eat in a combination of outside and inside providing ample space for physical distancing. All three school have separate lunch times.
Handwashing and respiratory etiquette	Y	Sanitizing stations are set up at entry points of the school. Elementary students follow a routine every day and after each changing period of hand cleaning and sanitizing. At this time mask are mandatory regardless of vaccination status. Mask are to be worn in accordance to NMDOH and NMPED toolkit guidance.
Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation	Y	Filters have been upgraded to the required filters by a contractor (Engie). Air purifiers have been put in each classroom. Desks are wiped down between each class change. Busses are fogged every other day. During enhanced practices classrooms are fogged immediately and then daily.
Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments	Y	Contact tracing is completed by Principal and isolation when needed until parents can pick up students. Contact tracing is guided using the latest NMPED Toolkit. As per the most recent NMPED Toolkit, Carrizozo Schools will be implementing T2S (Test to Stay) for those students who have been considered to be a close contact while at school.
Diagnostic and screening testing	Y	We have trained staff to be able to provide rapid testing for students and staff who are symptomatic or have been in close contact. We are participating in Test 2 Stay program. Unvaccinated staff are required to surveillance test weekly.
Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities	У	We continue to work with local health center in disseminating information on vaccinations.

Coordination with State and local health officials	Y	When rapid response is needed due to a positive case CMS works with NMDOH on making sure protocol and reporting is followed. We continue to work with local health clinic to disseminate information about vaccines as provided.

How the LEA will Ensure Continuity of Services?

Carrizozo Municipal Schools is of the belief that it will do everything possible to keep the school open and in person. However, if Carrizozo schools has to be shut down for an extended period of time due to issues outside of school control, the school will go to remote, online learning. Students will follow their normal class schedule times and will log into google classroom with their instructor. The goal is to keep classes interactive. However, if during this closure, materials are needed that cannot be uploaded to google classroom or internet is not operational, they can either be delivered to the home or picked up in the office by parents at an agreed upon time and location. Attendance will be taken by every teacher in every class period every school day. Students on IEP's will be given a scheduled for resource and ancillary support from their special education teacher. If allowed to meet in person a schedule will be set for at school assistance and accommodation. If in-person is not allowed, arrangements to meet in google meets or Zoom will be set up to assist, offer tutoring, accommodations and ancillary services. If an IEP meeting is needed to look at change of placement or other needs due to extended closure, a zoom/google IEP will be set up to discuss and adjust the IEP to

meet student needs. Food services, if allowed by state mandates, will continue to provide breakfast and lunch to students. Meals will be delivered along the bus route at specific times to be determined or can be picked up as a drive through option at scheduled times.

How will the LEA address Students':	
Academic Needs?	Carrizozo will make every effort to stay in-person learning as is it is proven to be the most effective. If the school must move to remote the school will use a combination of Zoom, Google Classroom and Board works to deliver academic services.
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs?	Carrizozo works with Region IX to have counseling available to our students in person one day a week and through tele- health as needed the rest of the week. Staff will be trained in QPR January 2022 to assist in recognizing signs of mental stress for both staff and students.
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)?	During remote learning, Carrizozo schools provided breakfast and lunch delivery. If this is allowed to continue Carrizozo

	schools will make every effort to continue this process in the event of school closure.

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs?	Carrizozo works with Region IX to have mental health professionals on site once a week and available through telehealth if needed. Staff will be trained in QPR January 2022 to assist in recognizing signs of mental stress for both staff and students.

- 3. During the period of the ARP ESSER award established in section 2001(a) of the ARP Act, an LEA must
