The Union Pacific Portland Rose and a freight train collided on the very day of the Academy Christmas vacation dismissal, and 21 people were injured, some 15 requiring hospitalization.

On board at that time were a handful of Cadets en route home for the holidays. In a letter written to Maj. Richard Humphrey, the Senior Army Instructor of the Academy, their story was described and Cadets were praised by Capt. Michael Dening, of Ent Air Force Base, Colorado, for their assistance.

"During the first few minutes following the accident, the Portland Rose was in confusion. Of course, there were the critical minutes for administering first aid to the injured. During those minutes, the Cadets though surely frightened remained calm, and showed initiative in assisting those administering first aid. They continued their assistance

Brungardt Leaves St. Joe's For Hayden Coaching Post

Head football coach and mathematics teacher, LeRoy Brungardt, has announced that he will not return to St. Joseph's next September. He has confirmed that he has taken the position as head football coach at Hayden High School in Topeka, Kansas.

He had spent two years at Hayden High School as assistant football coach before coming to St. Joseph's in 1962. Previous to that appointment, Brungardt spent one year at St. Benedict's College as an assistant after being graduated from St. Benedict's. Brungardt spent two semesters at Fort Hays State College in 1957 where he played football before returning to St. Benedict's. While attending school at St. Joseph's Military Academy, Brungardt held the position of Battalion Commander.

Coach Brungardt's teams at the Academy compiled 26 vic-

tories, 14 defeats and two ties during the last five years. His team was ranked eighth in the state two seasons ago and last year it was ranked fourth. In both of those seasons, a Cadet was an all-stater.

Hayden High School is a Catholic diocesan high school with an enrollment of approximately 950 students. Hayden High School competes in the Centennial League which consists of 5 Topeka teams and 2 outsiders.

Coach Brungardt expressed regret about leaving the Academy and the city of Hays but stated that this opportunity was too good to pass up. LeRoy, his wife, Linda, and three girls will make their home in Topeka after the end of the school year.

until all the injured persons were removed from the train.

"Later, at the temporary first aid station in the Wamego Methodist Church, the Cadets volunteered to set up cots so those with minor injuries could rest. They were also of valuable assistance in transferring luggage from trucks to the church.

"The actions of the St. Joseph's Military Academy Cadets during the six hours that followed the mishap exemplified the highest ideals of Military Training. The young men that were involved are a credit to men in uniform everywhere and particularly to the institution they represent."

One of the Cadets involved, Tom O'Brien '69, gave this personal account.

"After we hit, everything was quiet for a few minutes. We (Richard Parker and Jim Newton) couldn't figure out what had happened. Then a conductor came over to us and asked us

if we'd like to help. So we did. We picked up little pieces of paper so we could start some fires because the heating had gone out. One car was flooded because the plumbing had broken. When they got everything under control, Rick, Jim, and I went home."

A few other comments were: **Richard Parker '69**, "I wouldn't like to go through that again, I don't think." **John Blumthal '69**: "I was scared, but I don't think it is as bad as a car wreck." **Orlando Barahona '71**: "I was really afraid the first few seconds, but then it was alright after that." **Sig Beaulieu '70**: "I was nervous, until I found out what had happened, then I got over it."

The rest of the Cadets on the train who were not questioned were Fred Vogelsang and Pat Logue, both seniors; Charles Rogers, Allan Batton, Juan Colegio, and Virgil Weigel, all sophomores; and the freshmen William Peith, Jerry Lasker, and Richard Bertels.

Colonel Wiesner Speaks On Air Defense Command's Roll

St. Joseph's Military Academy was honored by a guest speaker of the Air Force, Colonel Paul F. Wiesner, on February 7, 1968. Col. Wiesner gave a lecture on the Aerospace Defense Command (ADC).

The lecture showed the various branches of the defense system of Canada and the United States. It told how ADC would help to insure national security.

Col. Wiesner used audio-visual aids to explain the different warning systems of our country. Systems, such as Distant Early Warning Radar Systems (DEW LINE) and Ballistic Missile Early Warning System (BMEWS), were enlarged upon.

A simulated ground-to-air missile and fighter battle highlighted the presentation.

A forecast of future Aerospace Defense needs with a question-answer session concluded his talk.

Colonel Wiesner is a 1932 graduate of St. Joseph's. He has served 25 years in the Air Force, active both as a pilot and in the Defense Command.

The annual P.T.G. bazaar and dinner was held on February 11, 1968, at the Academy. The event included a chicken dinner, raffle, various games and a teenage dance.



The Way It Strikes Us Compensation?

A rising problem today is in the effectiveness of "Social Security." Many people worry about retirement and many claim that they cannot live off its so called benefits.

Economists argue that Social Security greatly aids the poor and gives them a source of much needed income after 65. A person, however, cannot live on the meager sum given to him and he must take a supplementary job. But a working man is ineligible for Social Security as long as he retains his job. When the Social Security Act was passed in 1935, professional men were given the opportunity to vote on accepting or rejecting Social Security. Lawyers did not accept this insurance. Having studied law, they were familiar with investments and realized that the amount of money paid into social security if invested for ten years would be three times the amount received from Social Security. Physicians also vetoed workman's compensation and to this day neither profession pays Social Security.

Social Security does help, but certain improvements could certainly be made. Perhaps a solution would be to turn the operation of the F.I.C.A. to a guidance committee composed of several congressmen.

Educational Trends



Verbalizations of every dimension have been uttered in recent months of the rebellious adolescent. The larger universities and colleges in the nation have focused on various rebellious acts promulgated by the younger jet set. For examples, Berkeley has frequently made the news, giving the impression that it is the national hotbed of adolescent rebellion. The facts do not support that impression. In a recent six-year study of students at California's Stanford and Berkeley campuses, according to the Stanford University survey, here are some eye-opening revelations: No more than 105 of students were involved in such activities as the civil rights movement. Sexual promiscuity is not widespread. Students tend to follow parental advice on careers. College life, contrary to popular view, is often a lonely time. Students fail to develop strong academic and intellectual interests during their college years; they focus their interests merely on getting good grades because this assures their staying in college, lends to scholarships and gains parental approval. Amazing, huh?



Cadets 51, Salina 40


