



News From The Nurse





Hello Families,

As everyone is aware, we are seeing a spike in Covid cases in students, family members and staff. Unfortunately, we are all subject to this virus. It has no friends. We are trying our best to keep the schools open and without your help we will not be able to. I know everyone is tired of the masks but we have to continue wearing them. We are seeing numerous students who come to school without them or are continually losing them or wearing them improperly. Please visit with your student about these issues because, when we have to shut student's classrooms down it affects the student learning and becomes a hardship on others and possibly yourselves.

Wearing a face masks slows the spread of COVID-19 by reducing the distribution of respiratory droplets by the wearer. The most important function of masks is source control. When there is universal mask-wearing, people protect each other from getting the virus. Mask-wearing, coupled with social distancing, hygiene practices, and other transmission-reducing practices, are critical for reducing the contagion rate of COVID-19.

Everyone is required to wear a mask the correct way, while in a school building, on school transportation, or at a school-sponsored event. If your kiddos are sick or if you think it might be a cold or allergies, please have them checked, because a lot of the Covid symptoms are the same. A lot of times when I send a student home, they do not have a temperature but do have other symptoms, so just because they don't have a fever at first, it is not an indicator that they don't have Covid.

Covid Symptoms include:

Chills, Cough, Shortness of Breath, Fatigue, Loss of Smell, Headache, Sore throat, Muscle/ Body aches, Diarrhea, Congestion/Runny nose, Nausea, Vomiting, Fever.

If your kiddo has any symptoms, please keep them home. Thank you for helping to keep kids in school.
