 - Be ambassadors for the MiSTER program

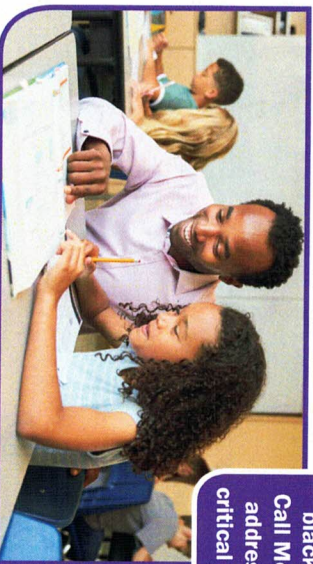
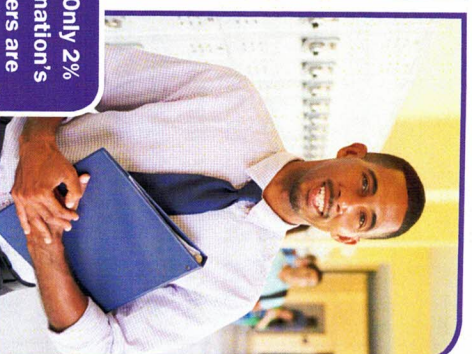
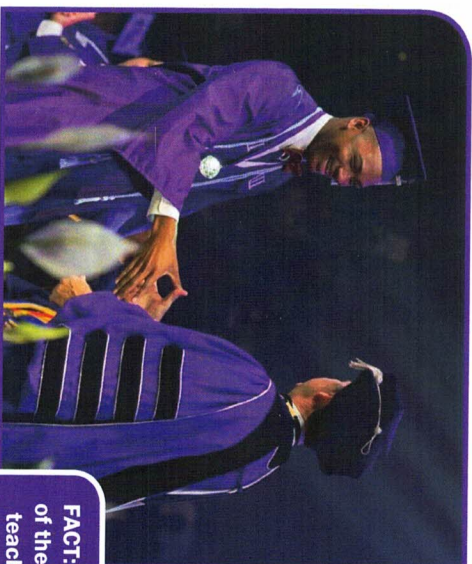
Misters will benefit from:

Student participants are largely selected from underserved, socioeconomically disadvantaged, and educationally at-risk communities.
