REPLACEMENT EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AND OPER-ATIONS LEVY AND REPLACEMENT TECHNOLOGY AND CAPITAL LEVY - February 8, 2022

On February 8, 2022, Marysville School District will ask voters to renew their commitment to students and schools through two *replacement* levies. The two levies continue support for the educational programs and services students currently receive and provide for the improvement and maintenance of the facilities where they learn and grow. The replacement levies have a combined lower tax rate reducing the burden of cost to taxpayers by .30 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Don't Let Head Lice Interfere with Your Child's Opportunity to Learn and Achieve in School

Missing school puts a child behind in learning.

It is very important you check your child's head weekly for signs of head lice, and that when you are notified that your child's head needs to be treated you begin to work immediately. Once you have started the treatment process, and combed out all nits (small eggs), your child is able to return to school. You will need to continue to comb out the nits and check your child's hair until it is all clear for 4-6 weeks.

Head lice are a small insect living on the human scalp and feed on blood. Lice do not jump, hop or fly; they are spread only by direct contact. Lice hatch from small eggs (nits) about every ten (10) days. A live louse matures and lays eggs every two (2) weeks. When nits are present, the lice have been on your child's hair for some time.

Remember, just about everyone can get lice at some point. Please be watchful and help your child as well as others with the above-referenced suggestion.

Some experts believe having recess before lunch has health and behavior benefits. Marshall made this transition last year and is continuing this practice this year. We have reviewed the latest parent survey responses and have learned that 76% of our parents who completed the survey believe that the switch has been a good change for their child. Twenty percent believe that there are some positive aspects to the change, and less than three percent believe that it has not been a good change for their child. This year's data shows an increase of nearly 10% of parents feeling this is a good change.

Some of the comments are as follows:

- "My son has been eating more since he works up an appetite before lunch."
- •"I really like this approach and was so glad to see it continuing this year."
- •"They still feel rushed with time allowed, usually does not finish lunch."

When recess is before lunch, research shows that students:

- Eat more fruits and vegetables
- Drink more milk
- Waste less food
- •Are better behaved at recess, lunch and in the classroom
- •Have decreased visits to the nurse
- •Are calmer when returning to class
- •Have an increase in time on task in the classroom
- •Have decreased discipline referrals
