Valuable Info for Seniors and Senior Parents

- Check the senior calendar in this bulletin often
- Watch ACT and SAT registration dates. Take one of these tests by October.
- Familiarize yourself with college application and scholarship deadlines
- Students, sign up in the counseling office to see college reps when they visit
- Athletes receiving athletic scholarships from NCAA Division 1 or 2 schools or NAIA schools must register with the NCAA or NAIA clearinghouse. Cost is approx \$60
- FAFSA- Free Application for Federal Student Aid. All students should complete the
 FAFSA. Order your pin number EARLY. It is like a password. It will be needed to file
 the FAFSA electronically. It will take about three to six weeks to receive your number.
 Memorize your pin number or keep it in a safe place. Both parent and student should
 apply for a pin number. Complete the FAFSA in January or February after completing
 your income tax return.
- Continue a rigorous course load during your senior year to be best prepared for college and scholarships!
- If applying for early admissions to a competitive university, be aware of early deadlines.
- Check college websites! Compare entrance requirements, scholarship opportunities, degree offerings, costs, etc.
- · Begin research early if interested in out-of-state colleges.
- College visits-Seniors get 1 college day. Call in advance to make an appointment. Pick up
 college day visit form from the counselor before you go to your college visit. Make sure a
 college rep signs the form and turn back into the office when you return.
- Use the OKCIS to explore college/career/degree options and receive ACT/SAT prep information
- Eastern Oklahoma County Technology Center has available the thirteenth year scholarship to Jones Seniors who want to attend the technology center after graduation. (College credit offered for some programs)
- Concurrent enrollment—Free tuition for Seniors. Students pay for books and fees. To enroll seniors must have 19 on ACT. You can pick up application from counselor.
- Residual Testing—ACT offered on most college campuses. May only use at that college
 for admission. It is better to take the ACT on a national Test Day. Jones High School is a
 Test Center for ACT
- Stay informed. Pay attention to announcements, check this website, and Jones High School on Facebook regularly.
- Students needing college application and counselor recommendation letters need to request this information from Mr. Moses
 - Allow 5 school days after your request to allow counselor to complete
 - o Bring resume if requesting recommendation letter.
 - o Follow up after 5 school days
- OK Promise/OHLAP scholarship students—meet with counselor by December.

APPLICATION FOR FINANCIAL AID

- Order your pin number on-line for the FAFSA by November 1.
- Apply for FAFSA as quickly as possible after January 1. This requires specific
 tax information so you may wait until your income tax return has been completed,
 but do not wait long. Colleges require the FAFSA.
- Approximately three weeks after completing the FAFSA you will receive a
 response with a reprint of information you submitted. Review this very carefully
 for errors and to insure it has been sent to the appropriate schools and agencies.
 You may need to supply additional information. Follow all instructions carefully
 and promptly.
- You will also receive at about the same time a SAR(student aid report)
- The SAR will be sent directly to the school of your choice.
- The college will send you a letter or email detailing the amount and kinds of aid for which you are eligible.

SENIOR YEAR CALENDAR

GET IT DONE, CHECK IT OFF
SEPTEMBER: ☐ Talk with your counselor to be sure you have the necessary coursework and credits for graduation
☐ Complete a resume that will be needed for recommendation letters. Please give teachers, counselor and administrators at least 5 school days to complete a letter for you.
 □ Make plans to take or retake the ACT or SAT. Check dates and registration deadlines. Register for ACT: www.actstudent.org Register for SAT: www.collegeboard.com HIGH SCHOOL CODE: 371-920 for either test
☐ If you have not clarified your educational goals, needs, and preferences, and developed a preliminary list of colleges, do so now. Visit with your parents about this.
$\hfill \Box$ Attend college fairs. There are normally two or three fairs available to JHS students.
☐ Reduce your preliminary college list to approximately 5 to 10 colleges. Contact each college's admission's office to request its catalog, application form and financial aid form
☐ When you receive this information, analyze the application instructions to see what information is required and to learn all due dates. You may have to submit admission test scores, an essay, application form, recommendations, and a financial aid application form.
☐ Create a complete checklist of tests you'll take and deadlines for registering, fees, test dates, college applications and deadlines, and other materials you will need.
☐ If you apply for early decision, find out if your college offers an early estimate of your financial aid eligibility, and, if so, what forms you will need to file.
☐ Students often decide to the SAT or ACT more than once. If you take the SAT or

☐ Find out from the colleges where you are seeking admission exactly what forms

OCTOBER: ☐ Students planning to participate in concurrent enrollment should apply for admission and get enrolled for second semester at the college. Remember to pick up a transcript and approval form from the counselor.
□ ORDER YOUR FAFSA PIN NUMBER: www.pin.ed.gov
☐ Chances are you will have to submit at least one essay with each application. This month, start to develop outlines
☐ Decide whom to ask for recommendations and ask them now if you have not already done so. Provide a addressed, stamped envelope plus the appropriate college forms and personal resume. Give teachers and counselor 5 business days to write your recommendation.
☐ Seek sources for financial aid and scholarships.
☐ Take campus tours.
☐ Apply for Admission, Housing, and Scholarships. WATCH ALL DEADLINES
\Box Applications that have a section for counselor, should be turned in at least 5 days before the postmark deadline.
☐ Turn in your Mid-Year report(from Common App) to the Counseling office.
NOVEMBER: Complete the first draft of your application essays and start to revise them
□ November 1 st to 15 th : Most colleges using "early decision" admission require test scores and applications between these dates. Students must apply by November 15 and are notified by mid-December.
☐ Although many colleges have mid-November deadlines, fill out applications for early decision, early action, or rolling admissions as soon as possible.
□ November is a busy month for processing college applications. The Counseling office needs plenty of time to copy transcripts, gather data and complete recommendation information.

DECEMBER
☐ Complete all of your essays. Type them and be sure they are clean, neat, and attractive, grammatically correct, interesting, and legible. Keep Copies.
□ Check deadlines for state-government sponsored student aid programs with counselor and obtain forms you need to apply. □ Begin completing FAFSA and institutional Financial Aid Forms. The FAFSA cannot be filed prior to January 1. Check with the colleges Financial Aid office about when to file other forms. To avoid delay, try to fill out application forms completely, accurately, and legibly. Even though you and your parents will not yet have filed your federal tax returns, try to collect wage statements or W-2's from employers early to help you get started. If it is possible to complete your tax returns prior to completing your financial aid applications, even on an estimated basis, try to do so to increase accuracy of information you report on the application forms.
\Box Give the counselor plenty of time to complete the Secondary School report section of your college applications. Two weeks is appreciated.
☐ Check your applications for any that may have deadlines the first week after winter break. If these require a recommendation or processing by the counselor, please turn them in at the beginning of December so they may be completed before winter break.
☐ If you have not had time to apply for college, spend time over winter break completing application forms and writing essays, if necessary. If you have received acceptance letters, you should now begin deciding which college you want to attend.
JANUARY: ☐ January 1: This is the usual deadline date for application to some of the selective colleges. Others have deadlines later in January or in February.
□ Send in your FAFSA as soon as possible after January 1. Make sure you meet all deadlines. Men 18 years old or older must be registered for the selective service in order to receive federal financial aid. If you have not registered, you may do so by completing a check-off box on your FAFSA, or register online(link on school website), or you may register at any post office.
FEBRUARY: □ Deadline for many institutional scholarships.
☐ If you are enrolled in AP Courses, you will begin getting information about ordering your AP tests.

MARCH: ☐ If you are applying to more than one college, carefully rank your preferences by location, academic program, and other important characteristics. Does their final ranking match your gut feeling?
APRIL: ☐ Most selective colleges start to announce their decisions this month. If more than one college accepts you, decide which one is best for you. You can give a deposit to only one college. Talk it over with counselor, family, and friends and think it through by yourself. Weigh offers against the factors that are important to you.
☐ Carefully review financial aid award notices from colleges. Call or write to the financial aid office if you have questions. Don't just look at how much aid you are offered; look at how much of your need is covered. If you don't get any (or enough) financial aid, ask if other financing plans are available.
$\hfill \square$ You will be given Senior Survey form that must be turned into Counselor.
□ Update counselor of all scholarships you have been offered!
MAY: As soon as possible after May 1, notify colleges that have accepted you of your decision to attend, in keeping with the Candidates Reply Date Agreement (some colleges do not subscribe to the Agreement and may have earlier deadlines.) If you have been offered financial aid from the college you have decided to attend, make sure you accept the offer as instructed in your award letter. If you have received financial aid from the other schools, make sure you let them know that you will not be attending. (You must reapply for financial aid every year.)
$\hfill\Box$ The first two weeks of May, Advanced Placement Examinations are given in high schools nationwide.
☐ IF you are "waitlisted" by a college and intend to enroll if accepted, call, visit, or write the admission director to state your intention and ask how to strengthen you application. Recent evidence of notable academic or other achievements could help. If you need financial aid to attend a school that has placed you on its "wait-list", find out if funds will be available if you are accepted.
$\hfill \square$ If you are not admitted to any of the colleges you selected, see your counselor immediately.
☐ CONTINUE TO UPDATE COUNSELOR OF ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIP OFFERS YOU HAVE RECEIVED.

☐ Write thank you notes to teachers for recommendation letters and to the organizations with whom you have received scholarships.
☐ Provide counselor information on where to send final transcript. All colleges require final transcript. NCAA and NAIA require final transcript.
JUNE:
☐ Make sure that you accept the financial aid award from the college you decide to
attend. Find out from the college that you choose what else you need to do, if
anything, to establish and maintain your eligibility for financial aid. For example,
you may need to send a copy of your own or your parents' most recent tax return.







SUMMER AFTER GRADUATION

Non-Academic Advice from Counselor and Parents of Former Seniors

If you have not done these things yet, now is the time.

- · Learn how to do your own laundry and ironing
- Open a bank account and prepare a budget
- Make a list of all items needed for living on your own, if applicable.
- If you are leaving Jones for college or a job, make copies of your health insurance information, car insurance and any other important documents.

SCHOLARSHIP GUIDE

Students should apply for every scholarship for which they meet the minimum requirements. If you have doubts, apply anyway. Persistence pays off when it comes to scholarships. Scholarship criteria are different with almost every application. Some scholarships are based on grade point averages, while others are based on ACT or SAT scores, leadership, activities and specific intended majors, special skills areas, financial need, or combinations of any of the above. We encourage you to become involved in the scholarship application process early in the school year.

HOW DO YOU FIND OUT ABOUT THEM?

First, pay attention to announcements and stay up to date with Jones Scholarships on Facebook. Second, check school website. Scholarships received by the high school the previous year may be found on school website in order by month. Deadlines may vary from year to year, so if you see any scholarships that interest you, please go online to double check deadline dates. If no online address is given, most can be found using the Google search engine or you can see the counselor. Third, sign up with an entity like www.fastweb.com

Students should apply for every scholarship for which they meet the minimum requirements. IFyou have doubts, apply anyway. Persistence is necessary when it comes to scholarships. Scholarship criteria are different with almost every application.

- ➤ Write the colleges for scholarship information and application if they are not included in the student application for admission packet.
- Particular colleges offer scholarships to their students. Each student should check with his/her chosen college for information. Be sure you have applied for admission to college before you apply for a scholarship from that college.
- ➤ Watch for weekly updates regarding scholarships from the Counseling office. These will be posted on Facebook and in the school announcements.
- Watch the newspapers for scholarship announcements.
- Watch for church-sponsored scholarships and for those sponsored by other groups in the community.
- Have your parents ask their employers if any company-sponsored scholarships are available for employee's children.

WATCH THE DEADLINES!!

In most cases scholarship decisions are based on a variety of and combination of criteria. These are a few of the most often used:

- Grade Point Average
- Class Rank
- > ACT or SAT score
- Activities
- > Leadership
- > Letters of recommendation

- * Interviews
- * Personal statement or essay
- * Financial need
- * Specific intended major
- * Special Skill area

Letters of recommendation from counselor and teachers require at least 5 days notice.

SCHOLARSHIPS
