Kwanzaa is a common African-American holiday that is celebrated from the 26th of December to the 1st of January. Kwanzaa is a celebration of community, family, and culture, and was established as a means to help African Americans reconnect with their African roots and heritage.

The original Hanukkah menorah dates to 164 B.C.E., when Judah the Maccabee defeated the Syrian oppressors in a hard-fought battle. As the Jewish people reclaimed their temple and lit its golden candelabrum, their only supply of oil, which should have run out after one day, miraculously lasted for eight.

Back in 2013, Lillard started his career off strong by winning Rookie of the Year. Since then he has been an All-NBA player six times and has been named to the All-Star game six times. He hasn't won an MVP, a defensive player of the year, and he hasn't even had post-season success. The furthest he's been is the conference finals, and that was only one time.






