Roxy centers around siblings
Isaac and Ivy. Isaac is
prescribed Roxicodone after a
sports related injury and finds
himself dependent on the drug.
Ivy manages her ADD with
Adderall. Both siblings turn to
"Roxy" and "Addi" down a path
of destruction that leads to a
tragic end.

Both Shustermans shared that Roxy was inspired by the current opioid crisis. They believed the idea of having drugs personified by gods was a

unique addition to the conversation.

"This virtual book tour was an enlightening experience that took students on a literary journey, opening their minds to the opioid crisis. This father and son pair taught students the importance of working together, communicating, and ultimately how overcoming obstacles will always be a part of life. Together they have created a masterpiece that highlights a significant social issue, from a unique and engaging perspective, and chose to share their journey with our students, giving them the opportunity to ask questions, and dig deeper into the content," said Ms.

Elmendorf.

Geometry and Algebra I

This was an exciting month for Ms. Elmendorf and Mr. Reilly's Geometry class. We conquered the "PROOFS." Students learned about mathematical theorems and postulates that can be used to write a thoughtful mathematical argument known as a proof. Additionally, we worked with triangle congruence theorems to determine how to prove that two triangles are in fact congruent to one another. This taps into student's ability to think critically and analyze mathematical diagrams and pictures. In Algebra, we are working with the concept of "SLOPE." We are learning how to calculate slope graphically and algebraically and taking that concept further to write the equation of linear functions. We have also learned that linear equations are a characteristic property when it comes to slope. Linear functions are the only functions that have a constant rate of change. Looking forward to seeing what next month holds. We wish everyone a healthy and happy holiday season:)

History of the Winter Solstice

The winter solstice is the shortest day of the year. In the Northern Hemisphere, it is in December. In the Southern Hemisphere, it is in June. Cultures around the world have celebrated the winter solstice since the Neolithic Age starting around 10,200 BCE. Some examples are Neolithic monuments such as Newgrange

in Ireland, Maeshowe in Scotland, and Stonehenge in England which are oriented toward the winter solstice sunset.

The ancient Romans had Saturnalia, a holiday in honor of Saturn, the god of agriculture. There was a weeklong celebration that culminated in the winter solstice. Paired with Saturnalia, Juvenalia was a feast honoring children. On December 25, the Romans celebrated the birthday of Mithra, the ancient Persian god of light, who was later blended with Sol Invictus, god of the "unconquered sun." The ancient Norseman of Scandinavia celebrated Yule from the winter solstice through January. This was a celebration indicating that the days would get longer after the solstice and the sun would slowly return. To recognize the

return of the sun, fathers and sons would bring home large logs called Yule logs. The Yule logs would be set on fire at one end and the people would feast until the Yule log burned out, which was usually 12 days. The sparks of the fire were signs of the springtime birth of calves or piglets.



The Incas celebrated the sun god Inti at a winter solstice celebration called Inti Raymi (Quecha for "sun festival"). The Incas fasted for three days before the solstice. On the winter solstice, they waited for the sun to rise and sacrificed animals, used the sun's rays to start a fire with a mirror, and

offered golden cups of chicha, a beer made from fermented corn.

History of Christmas

December 6. Hanukkah, which
means "dedication" in Hebrew,
begins on the 25th of Kislev on

usually falls in November or
December. Often called the
Festival of Lights, the holiday is
celebrated with the lighting of
the menorah, traditional foods,
games and gifts.
