#### Strategic and Long Term Facilities Planning Re-Boot

Two years ago this month, Cove School was entering into long-range planning and a review of the strategic plan. Then came the governmental responses to a new virus which put all planning and even public meetings on hold. Cove school will once again attempt to restart the process this winter.

It has become obvious that since the start of the pandemic, the projections for growth for Cove School have accelerated. Despite significant reductions of out-of-district Charter students over the time period, enrollment has risen by 40 students and new addresses are being reported monthly. Seems many are discovering what we already know—Cove is a wonderful place to live with a great school. Despite plans to admit no additional Charter students for at least the next two years, local growth combined with robust opportunities for students and a near 100-year-old elementary school are driving facilities challenges.

Beginning with a review and possible revision of the Strategic Plan developed in 2018, the desired outcome is to set a series of measurable objectives for the next two years. Simultaneously, the district and community will also be considering a long-range capital plan driven by such factors as a facilities assessment, growth and need projections, the strategic plan, and community input.

This process will involve the school board, school administration, staff, and at least 10 other community members. A series of evening meeting will occur over a three-month time-frame from late January through March with the first meeting scheduled for January 25th. #### Board Votes to Take Back Transportation

Beginning in the fall of 2022, Cove School will own busses and operate its own transportation Department. For decades, the District has contracted with Mid Columbia Bus to provide transportation services. However, the financial and operational benifts of contracting the service have eveolved over the years and the School Board voted in November to transition to an in-house model of transportation services. Over the next several months, Cove School District will purchase and receive five new busses ranging from a "microbus" to the full size rear-engine "pusher." The district will also hire bus drivers as well as train some current employees in order to maintain the necessary depth of resources for a smooth transition and operation.

#### Tech Spot:

#### Cove Takes Technology into its Own Hands

This year Cove School District has hired Theo Asberry as a full-time Director of Technology. This position was created due to the increased use of technology within the district to improve the enduser experience. This position will oversee all things technology related, from training teachers to better use the tools available to them, to advising the district on solutions and implementation of services. A month in and the impact of this position is greatly noticeable to students and faculty.





#### SuperView: "Post-Pandemic" Activities

For two years we have all felt the impact of the declared pandemic and many would argue that the pandemic is not over yet. Perhaps there is such argument to be made but perhaps the concept and term of "pandemic" has somehow gotten lost during the process. Prior to the start of this pandemic, the definition would have resulted in its ending by early 2021 but definitions were revised to allow for the "pandemic" to still be called as such indefinitely. So, for this purpose, I am simply writing about the revival of student activities following their effective ban two years ago.



Nearly every sport has seen dramatic drop-off in the participation rates among students. What was problematic for schools in keeping enough activities for kids is now a challenge in keeping enough kids for activities. For example, Cove's speech team has failed to attend meets for the year due to lack of participation, the basketball teams see dramatic drop in player numbers, and even the band has fewer members. Despite record enrollment in Cove and all the great success we have experienced, students are too-often turning away from activities.

It seems an appropriate time to remind everyone why we have activities and tremendous developmental impact they have upon our students. A return t activities may also signal the return to "normalcy" so many have advocated for. Crimson Education recently published an evidence based list of eight benefits of extra-curricular activities and the following is a summary of that research.

- 1. Improved Academic Performance. Participating in activities the student is passionate about can increase their brain function, help them concentrate and manage time better, all of which contribute to higher grades. High endurance sports, for example, will train them to focus and build stamina in the face of intense difficulty.
- 2. Explore Interests and Create Broader Perspectives. When a student participates in multiple different activities, they get the opportunity to explore a range of interests and unlock passions they never knew they had!
- 3. **Higher Self-esteem**. The more a student achieves success through activities they're passionate about, the more their self confidence will improve.
- 4. Social Opportunities. Let's be honest, making friends can be hard but one of the easiest ways to make friends is through extracurricular activities! Plus, if you make friends in your extracurricular activities, you'll be more likely to get more deeply involved in the activity and in school.
- 5. **Productive Breaks**. Extracurricular activities give a student something fun to do aside from school. It also gives them the chance to explore their passions to discover things they may be interested beyond academics while taking some time off hitting the books.
- 6. Essential Life Skills. On top of all of the benefits of extracurricular activities already listed, one of the greatest advantages extracurricular activities give the student are "real world" skills including (but not limited to): goal setting, teamwork, time management, prioritization, problem solving, analytical thinking, leadership, and public speaking.
- 7. Resumes. Without much previous work experience, one of the only ways hiring managers can assess a graduates ability and work ethic is through their extracurricular activities.
- 8. University Applications. It's pretty much impossible to get into many universities in the US without extracurricular activities. Universities want to see that you've gone above and beyond in your intended area of study and have made a difference and/or excelled your field.

Encourage your child to participate in activities - the benefits are clear and it will also be one of the best ways to recover from many of the impacts of the past two years' pandemic. ~ Earl Pettit

Shiri: Do your elves like to play with the toys they make? Silas: Do you like peanut butter and jelly sandwiches?



On each article they read, they are asked to evaluate the opening and closing sentences and/or paragraphs. Next, they journal on each article answering at least three of these questions:

1. Make a list of what new things you have learned by reading this.

What is the main idea of your article? List three details that support the main idea.

3. What is the author's purpose? Explain how you know.

4. Explain what you feel while reading this article. Why do you feel this?

5. What part of the article was the most interesting? Why did this stick out to you?

6. Find an interesting vocabulary word or use of figurative language. Does the text help define it? Explain. What is the proper definition?

By the end of the quarter they will be fast at reading and adept at responding with a genuine opinion that is founded by details in the article they read. This journaling leads them to understand not only what authors are intending their readers to take away from the article, but also give them an idea how published authors prove their point. ~ Mr. Gustavson

The Cove FFA Chapter placed first in the Eastern Oregon District FFA Soils Contest! We swept the top three individual spots with Cadence Case, Caleb Wiggins, & Kade McLean taking 1st, 2nd, and 3rd respectively. When students "judge" soil they evaluate the soil profile, textures within the soil, fragments within the soil, and more. Based on their initial judgements, they can accurately determine available water holding capacity, effective root depth, slope, and many other important factors that determine the suitability of the land.

We are using a college level platform for Algebra 2 and PreCalculus this year & it is giving us much more time to look deeper into the concepts. As a new hire this year, I have been thrilled to get to know the students at Cove High School. I'm impressed daily by their diligence, hard work, and willingness to work through difficult problems in the Math, Health and Physical Education classes I teach. My Geometry students have worked their way through the theoretical part of that class and we've begun to work on analytical geometry. In Algebra, we just finished the dreaded functions that they actually did really well on. My students in Health constantly surprise me with their depth of thinking and understanding, and my PE students are always up to try a new game. Social Studies: As our high school students begin to feel the mounting pressure and power of adulthood, they are learning how our country went through a growth period similar to their own. Most of our high school students have been learning about 20th-century U.S.history this year. We have been studying labor unrest, foreign policy, war, civil rights, and other impactful movements in the years when America was experiencing rapid growth in population, becoming a leader in industry, and undergoing rapid urbanization. Most everything was changing. The United States was emerging as a world power and challenging the notions of older, more storied countries who saw the burgeoning new nation as either a potential ally or rival in global affairs. Younger generations challenged the traditions of those who preceded them. These changes and challenges created some uncertainty concerning the future of our relatively young nation. HS English: As usual, first semester has flown by, and we find ourselves preparing for the holidays. It has been a very busy semester with a lot of new students to bring new perspectives to our class discussions! As we approach the last few days before break, we will be carrying on the tradition of the Progressive Christmas Activity. This is a project that the students and I look forward to every year, as it involves all of my classes working together in teams to build something that the teachers will judge. It's a great way for students to come together and celebrate community across the grade levels. English classes continued to work on basic vocabulary and grammar skills, reading, writing, speaking, and listening. We studied some of the classics (e.g., Utopia, The Crucible, The Scarlet Letter) while also diving into some more contemporary works. The seniors also had the opportunity to explore Shakespeare's Macbeth. On Dec. 22, we bid farewell to Miss Tinnin, our student teacher. She will be missed! ~ Dr. Farrell

**Spanish:** In Spanish 1-3 we are wrapping up the quarter doing teaching assignments on subject areas that we have already learned. Each student has to produce a slide show presentation, a practice review and a review game for their lesson. Spanish 3 is presenting their cooking presentations. They are required to cook an authentic dish from a Spanish speaking country and present it all in Spanish. #### Bows and Arrow + Racecars and Roll Bars: The Shop

Wow! We are halfway through the School year. We've built several PVC bows and are surprised at how good they came out. The first one took about 4 periods to build plus a lot of my time getting things ready. The last several we almost made in 1 period (each). I'm a little embarrassed to admit that all of the guys including me were outshot by a cute little blond girl that made her own bow.

I saw a clean way to cut out a windshield on YouTube but the tool cost between \$600 and \$1000. I made a tool that used the same principle and it worked great so I spent \$80 bucks on a good suction cup and made a better tool. The tool basically winches 500# test fishing line through the urethane that sticks the windshield to the car and you just push the old glass out and glue in the new one.

That brings us to the race car. You should look up Lemons Racing on YouTube. You start with a car that costs \$500 or less and then spend a ton of money and time on it to make it safe to race. The car was parked for several years so we emptied the gas tank, put in a new fuel pump, filter, and fuel lines. This turned out to be a very fortunate decision because the previous owner had already replaced the fuel pump, but not in a good way. He replaced just the pump and not the assembly, which I don't fault him for, but the way he did it was creative. He cut the 2 wires on the pump, he then spliced the positive wires together and held them together with a household wire nut, and what was worse he twisted the ground wires together and left them uncovered (inside the gas tank), that ground wire was then mashed between the tank and the flange that holds the fuel pump assembly in. I find it interesting what some people will bet their lives on. The students have removed most of the interior that is flammable and we are now building a 6 point roll bar. The car will also be equipped with two safety systems, a master electrical kill switch that will shut down the engine and all electrical systems, and a fire suppression system that will flood both cab and engine compartments with a fire retardant. We have had several fatalities on the racecar, the latest of which is the windshield, the minor rock chip now has about 3 feet of cracks coming out of it. Compromised windshields cant handle the car being banged on. Hay! Now I get to try out my new windshield removal tool! I hope you all have a Very Merry Christmas! ~Mr. Olmsted AKA Teach.
