# Enrollment at Record High

Despite what may be said in grumblings to the contrary, Cove School is booming in enrollment due to the high number of new residents and NOT due to the admittance of Charter students. Charter enrollment is at record low with almost no new enrollments while local enrollment is at record high. For students living outside the district, it has become nearly impossible to enroll due to the growth of student numbers living within the district and the current year's admittance rate is less than 10%. Sitting at 322 students, the District is now operating at 12 students over its self-imposed "capacity" of 310. A decade ago, the District was expressing concern about low enrollment. For the past 3 years, however, local enrollment growth has been on pace to double the students enrolled during the next 2 decades. Over the next several months, the Board will be leading a discussion and ultimately setting a roadmap for the district through its long range plan. While developing this new plan and simultaneously operating at capacity or greater, students applying under the charter system are likely to be met with a "No Vacancy" sign for the next couple years. ~ Earl Pettit

# Striving to Provide a Safe Environment

Cove School remains committed to providing a safe, positive, and productive learning environment for all students. Over the past four years, the school has taken multiple actions to improve the safety of students. Some of these changes were met with some resistance but all were carefully considered and discussed prior to implementation.

- ⇒ Implemented and trained staff concerning the Standard Response Protocol. The standard response protocol is the predominant nationally-recognized procedures and steps for a school to take in the event of a threat to student safety. The full range of threats addressed in this protocol include intruders, violence in the neighborhood, weather emergencies, earthquakes, and other emergencies.
- $\Rightarrow$  Installed a district-wide public address system to allow communication of instructions in the event of an emergency.
- ⇒ Restricted public access to the school buildings to a single entry locking back and side entrances.
- ⇒ Required all visitors to check in/sign in during school hours.
- ⇒ Adopted and implemented the Safe Oregon Tip Line.
- ⇒ Adopted and implemented a formal system of threat assessment involving multiple agencies working cooperatively to evaluate levels of threat and responses to threat.
- ⇒ Revised and expanded the requirements for background checks of volunteers.
- ⇒ Closed the high school campus except during the lunch break.
- ⇒ Hired a school resource officer—shared with Union and North Powder.
- ⇒ Reviewed, revised and strengthened district policies regarding bullying, harassment, and other misconduct.
- ⇒ Implemented reasonable and effective measures to mitigate the spread of germs—including COVID- resulting in no closures of the school during the 2000-2021 school year.

At Cove School, we strive to maintain a warm and welcoming atmosphere in balance with providing a safe environment for all. The past year has been especially challenging as state restrictions limit parental access to the school. Community input on how to achieve this warm and welcoming climate balanced with safety is always welcome. ~ Earl Pettit

#### Board Experiences Augmented Reality

Over the past year and a half, many have wondered if "this is for real" when making radical adjustments to lives due to the response to the COVID pandemic. School Board recently experienced what is known as "Augmented Reality" during a brief demonstration of the new Z-Space system during the August Regular Meeting. Nearly two years of planning by the Charter Council and administration has resulted in a system which will significantly enhance visual and special learning for students throughout the District. Cove School now has a mobile lab of specialized laptops which puts learning manipulatives into three dimensions and is available for all teachers and their classes. Animal dissection without animals? Chemistry experiments gone bad with no explosions? And Welding taught with no steel? These are but a few examples of the application of this system. Seventh-grade teacher and robotics coach Eric Dressen along with science standout Collin Rovey are working all year to help teachers properly employ the new system into their teaching and learning. While often seen in Universities and community colleges, Cove School is the first public school in the region to adopt this technology.

#### SuperView

"Seemed like a good idea at the time." These are word often spoken well after a hasty decision lacking foresight and examination of long-lasting potential impacts. History is filled with examples of these such as the internment of Americans during WWII simply because of their race or ethnicity or the deployment of troops to countries without any clear attainable military objective—twice. History should teach us to examine potential consequences of our actions and decisions despite how "popular" those decisions may be in the moment.

In response to recent firings of superintendents over state COVID mandates (mostly masks) the state legislature is poised to adopt new laws "protecting" school superintendents across the state when those superintendents are implementing laws which are contrary to the local Board's desire. Seemingly the oddball once again in my career, in a recent meeting of many superintendents I spoke out questioning such a move. I, for one, believe that schools belong to a community and superintendent's are accountable to that community. To say that a higher government power may dictate lower governmental authority to this extent simply does not wash.

This is akin to the state of Oregon refusing to follow certain Federal laws within the state. While I may or may not agree with the state's position(s) in their stance against the federal government, I respect that the leadership of the state recognizes that they are accountable to their state first and will act in the capacity that the people of the state wish.

Same holds true for school districts within the state. To take away the power of local boards to fire a superintendent essentially at will, results in the power being reversed locally and the state being the true holder of authority over local school decisions. In such a scenario, the Board would end up answering to the now untouchable superintendent implementing whatever one-size rules the state sees fit for the local district. And so it goes. The locally elected officials would be answering to the burocratts —the superintendent and ODE official. Clearly, such legislation would personally give me a type a tenure which would allow me to no longer be accountable to you but rather non-elected employees of the Oregon Department of Education—nearly untouchable status. Such legislation would also result in removal of the final thread of local democratic control schools in Oregon may have.

All of this is a result of the Mask mandates and other state mandates regarding school operations related to COVID mitigation. However, when understood in a broader context, perhaps it is not such a good idea. But, perhaps it is. This is exactly the point. In any form of democracy, it is necessary keep the ultimate control with the people—otherwise it is no longer a democracy. I simply would like all to recognize that legislation which actually removes local democratic control of schools as a result of local responses to mask mandates may have much further-reaching consequences moving forward than masks. ~ Earl Pettit



#### Elementary After-School Program Underway

Beginning last week, Cove School now hosts an after-school program for students in grades K-5 until 6PM every school day. Parents are encouraged to register their students for as many two-week units as they choose. The link for registration may be found on the school website. Each day, students will be provided an after-school snack, participate in organized physical activities, engage in free reading or artistic activities of their choosing, and complete a Science, Technology, Engineering, Artistic, and/or Math (STEAM) oriented task aligned with the mission and goals of Cove Charter School. The base STEAM curriculum for the program may be reviewed by on the school website. The capacity for each group (grades K-2 and 3-5) is strictly limited to 20 students. In the event you sign up but later realize a conflict keeping your child from participating, please contact Kelsey Stitzel at 541-568-4424 so we may allow admittance to the next student in line. The instructors are Lacey Baird (grades K-2) and Carolyn Stewart (grades 3-5) and will be conducted in the elementary building.

In conjunction with this, an abbreviated late bus route is also available to support this program as well as older students participating in sports or other after-school activities. The late bus will depart at 6PM, conduct limited drop offs in the Cove community and end its route at approximately 6:35 at Island City.

Because this program aligns with the mission and goals of the school and supporting grant funding was received, there is no charge for participation.

Available spaces remain in all sessions! Interested parents are encouraged to register their child any or all 2-week sessions.

### COVID: Fall Requirements for Schools

Simply stated, there are but four mandates for schools which accompany much additional information in the form of recommendations. The four mandates are:



1: Have a plan: School districts must have a communicable disease management plan that describes the measures they've taken to limit the spread of COVID-19 in their schools.



2: Stay home if exposed: School officials are required to exclude any staff or student whom they suspect has been exposed to COVID-19, and will work closely with local public health



3: Isolate if sick: If a student gets sick during the day, schools must have a space for that student to rest and be monitored by staff until they are able to ao home.
