## SOME COLLEGE HISTORY

### More Than Four Hundred Students Have Attended H. C. C.

Since the opening of the Hays Catholic College in the fall of 1908 over 400 students have entered its doors. Of this number thirty-three percent have received diplomas.

On another page of this issue will be found a list of the graduates, together with such information regarding them as could be gathered from records and inquiries. Only a very few could be interviewed personally.

On yet another page is a list of all who ever attended Hays Catholic College for at least a term. Among these will be found some who, as the years show, were at the College four years or more and it might be asked why these did not graduate. The reason is because in those days the classical course comprised six years and these did not continue long enough to finish the course.

### DEATH CLAIMS ALUMNUS

Anthony F. Rupp, '20, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia on March 22, 1926. He was born in Ellis County and lived here until shortly before his death. He graduated from Hays Catholic College with the class of 1920.

After graduation he taught school for one year and then went to farming. He was married in August of 1922 to Mary Hertlein. Thinking to better himself he moved to Brighton, Colorado, in August of 1925, where he was employed by the Northern Colorado Creamery Co. Here is where he took sick and died after receiving the last rites of the Church. His body was sent to Hays for burial. The funeral took place at St. Joseph's Church, Hays, on Friday, March 26.

The faculty and students extend to the bereaved parents and family their heartfelt sympathy.

Requiem High Mass was sung in the College Chapel for the repose of his soul at the request of the H. C. C. Alumni Association. The executive committee of the Alumni Association in meeting assembled drew up the following resolution:

To Mrs. Anton F. Rupp:  
WHEREAS, Almighty God in His Providence, has deigned to call the soul of Anton F. Rupp, a brother Alumnus, out of this world, be it RESOLVED, That we, the H. C. C. Alumni, express our heartfelt sympathy; and be it further,

RESOLVED, that the Association have a Requiem High Mass celebrated for the repose of his soul on Friday, March 26, at seven o'clock in the College Chapel.

### FIRST COLLEGE PAPER PUBLISHED IN 1912.

When H. C. C. was only in its fourth year the students ventured into the field of journalism. In the Spring of 1912 the College paper known as the Hays College Progress made its first appearance. Its make-up was faultless and very attractive. The first staff was made up of the following personnel: Editor-in-chief: Francis A. J. Dreiling; Associate Editors: Albert A. Burtcher and Joseph P. Piel; Sporting Editor: Andrew A. Herman; Class Editor: John M. Kinderknecht; Music Editor: Adrian J. Pouliot; Business Manager: Gerard C. Unrein.

It appeared for two years and all issues are on file at the College.

Hays College Progress was succeeded by The Hays College Bulletin. The Bulletin appeared at irregular intervals, about every four weeks. It was printed on the typewriter and the sheets were posted on the Bulletin Board. The Bulletin was published for several years.

The latest venture of the students of H. C. C. in the field of journalism is the present H. C. C. Journal. The first number appeared in October, 1924, and the first volume contained eight issues. It is now in its second year. May this last venture continue to be successful and it will be so if all students and alumni support it by their subscription and by patronizing its advertisers.

### REV. AUGUST P. KOERPERICH

First Priest Alumnus of Hays Catholic College



Father August P. Koerperich graduated from the classical department of Hays Catholic College in 1916. Thereupon he went to Kenrick Seminary at St. Louis to study philosophy and theology. He was raised to the holy priesthood on August 14, 1921, in the Cathedral at Concordia, Kansas, by the Rt. Rev. Francis J. Tief, D. D., Bishop of Concordia.

He celebrated his first Solemn mass in his parish church at Selden, Kansas. The Rev. Fathers Henry and Julius, O. M. Cap., were the speakers at this celebration. Father Koerperich's first appointment was to the chaplaincy at Nazareth Academy, Concordia. He remained there but a short time when he was put in charge of four missions with headquarters at Minneapolis, Kansas. From this place he was changed to Greenleaf, Kansas, having been made pastor of the Sacred Heart Church, which position he still holds. He has been a member of the Diocesan School Board for several years.

Father Koerperich is a staunch friend of his Alma Mater. "A friend in need is a friend indeed," she has found verified in him. When he learned of the College Chapel and its needs, he immediately sent many necessary articles. The latest gifts from him are an ostensorium and a ciborium.

And as to the Journal, he is the one who, by his generous subscription makes it possible that the Journal is sent to others who on account of their present position cannot subscribe.

He is also greatly interested in the Alumni Association, of which he has been vice-president for many years. May many more follow his lead.

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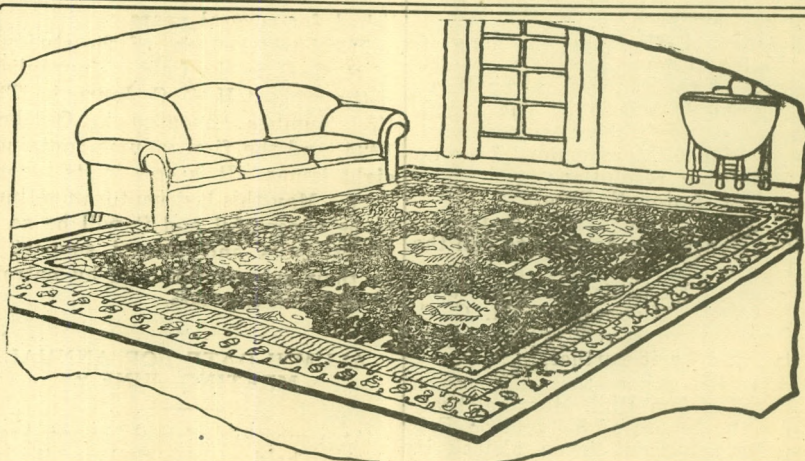

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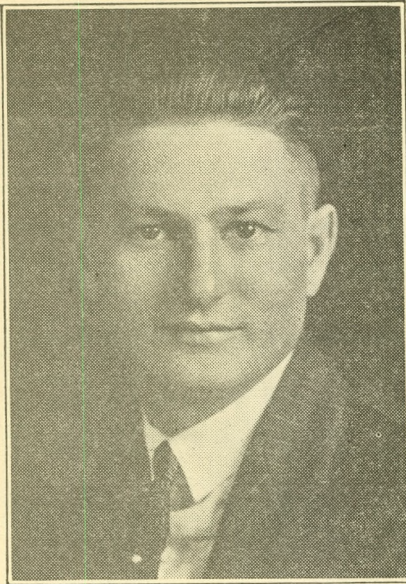
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**MR. B. M. KUHN, '15**

He remained at the Brooklyn Naval Hospital until August, 1919, when he was transferred to the New Orleans Naval Hospital. He remained there thirty days and was then discharged at St. Louis Sept. 22, 1919.

Upon returning to Hays, Mr. Kuhn was employed at Tholen's jewelry store for four years. In August of 1923 he went to Salt Lake City, Utah, where he took a course in watch and jewelry repairing and engraving. Coming back to Hays in May of 1924 he was re-employed at Tholen's. On January 1, 1926, he became a member of the firm, The Tholen Jewelry Co.

The first class to graduate from the Classical Department which until 1923, comprised six years of study four of High School and two of College work, was the Class of 1916 made up of the following: Messrs. This class has established an enviable record as the following history of the members of the class reveals. The first priest alumnus, the Rev. August Koerperich, was a member of this class. His likeness and short history appears on the first page of this issue.

Two Medical Doctors have come forth from this class: Mr. G. C. Unrein, M. D. and Mr. Leo Schaefer, M. D.

Mr. Gerard C. Unrein upon leaving H. C. C. entered the Medical School of St. Louis University where he received his degree as doctor of medicine in 1918. He then served his internship at the City Hospital at St. Louis. He was a member of the Medical Reserve Corps of the Regular Army from 1917-19, and when discharged began the practice of medicine at Herndon, Kansas in September 1919. He remained in Herndon until July 1920 when he moved to Hays, Kansas. Here he has established a good practice which is expanding from year to year.

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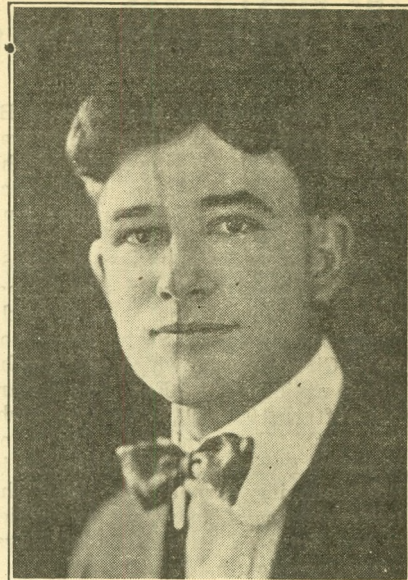
Romuald A. Leiker, '15

He is a loyal son of H. C. C., and keeps informed of the doings of the College by subscribing to the Journal. The Journal wishes him success in all his further undertakings.

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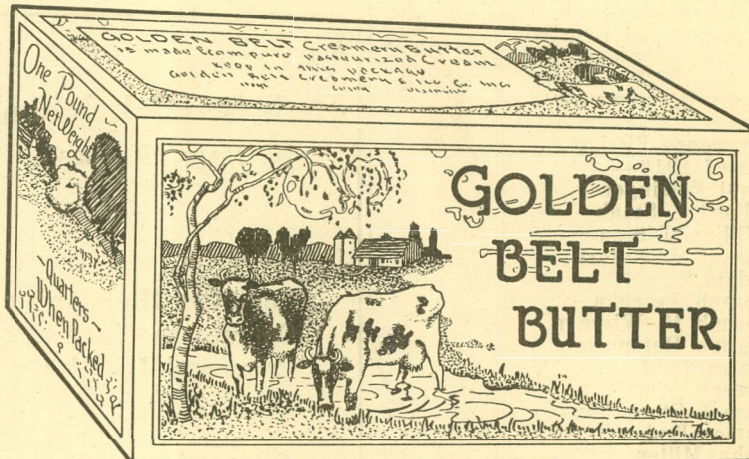
