Tickets were awarded for each reading and/or math activity participated in; for each picture of summer reading and math that was sent in or shared on social media; and for completing the district survey. Students' social, emotional, and mental health needs are equally as important as their physical well-being. Students worked in a safe and welcoming environment participating in a variety of activities that encouraged them to be more proactive in developing their communication, cooperation, and self-reflection skills that included speaking assertively, while also being a strong listener. Students thrived in putting to use their ability to work cooperatively with others by building up not only themselves but others as well.

After such a long period of time where physical activity was limited due to our current world situation, we learned to recondition ourselves through a series of games. Within each game we had a component of physical fitness such as cardiovascular endurance. Students were required to engage in three tasks during these games: run, flee, and chase. This activity served to engage students in exercise while making it fun and enjoyable. Just as you might hide vegetables and other healthful foods in your child's meals, I try to hide heart, bone, and muscle strengthening exercises in games and activities!

Reading Program Improvements

During the 2019-2020 school year, a committee of teachers and administration met regularly to review and research available phonics programs. The previously utilized program had been in place for many years. Periodically, it is important to review curriculum and programs to determine their effectiveness. We researched 3 different programs Units of Study in Phonics by Teachers College, Reach by National Geographic and Fundations by Wilson.

As part of the research, we were able to do a site visit at Goshen Center School. We also met virtually with representatives for the Reach

program. We reached out to other teachers and schools using the various programs to determine their effectiveness and impact on students' reading and writing achievement.

All teachers in Grades Kindergarten through Second Grade received a full day of training in implementing the program. The professional development included a Wilson trainer to walk us through the program and answer our questions. It also gave us access to the Wilson Academy website. In the Academy, there are videos, print resources and activities to use with students.

Learning to read incorporates an understanding of print, identification of letters and sounds, phonemic awareness (letters make sounds), vocabulary, fluency and comprehension. Students need explicit instruction in all areas to be able read fluently and comprehend text.

Our students are enjoying the program. They are learning the daily routines. Teachers and their helpers, Mama and Baby Echo, owl puppets, teach them the letters and sounds. The students "echo" the teacher to practice. Students in Kindergarten and Grade 1 are also practicing writing the letters. We have already seen improvement in student handwriting and letter formation. Students in Grade 2 are working on learning spelling rules and application in reading and writing.

We will continue to monitor students progress and evaluate the program's effectiveness through the school year.

Grade 3 visits with the Litchfield **Historical Society**

Believe it or not, grade three students at Center School have been going on several field trips....virtual field trips, that is! Through the collaboration of the Litchfield Historical Society, grade three teachers (Mrs. Jennifer Johnson, Mrs. Marni Smith and Mrs. Darlene Torrant), and the Center School Library Media Specialist (Mrs. Joanne Moore), students have been able to "tour" the museum and the library archives.

In preparation for their field trips, during Library Technology and Social Studies classes, students were introduced to the early history of Litchfield, and they developed essential questions about the settling of the town, daily life, and how the local citizens of long ago have contributed to our country.

Through a scheduled Google Meeting during Library Technology sessions, each class was able to meet twice with Miss Kate Zullo, the Head of Education at the Litchfield Historical Society. The students were attentive and curious about so many things! They learned about the value and purpose of museums, the difference between primary and secondary sources, and they even got a tour of the Helga J. Ingraham Library and the Ching Reading Room Library archives, where valuable primary source materials, such as ledgers and journals from the 18th century, are cataloged and stored.



Litchfield Middle School **Community Activity Thursdays Under Way**

Litchfield Middle School staff and students are once again organizing "Advisory Community Activities" every Thursday, as part of their daily Advisory Program. As explained by LMS Team Leaders Melissa Swanson (grade 8) and Kyle Harris (grade 7), "the purpose of these activities is to provide opportunities for all students to engage in our community."

An LMS Advisory class is comprised of one staff member and 11 randomly selected students. A common program in many Connecticut schools, Advisory classes are intended to pair students with adults other than their own classroom teachers and peers other than those they commonly interact with in academic classes. Specific agendas are set for each day of Advisory during the week, and Thursdays are reserved for student-generated activities that challenge students with a grade level to work on collaboration and communication skills in a "low-stakes environment."

Advisories sign up in advance for a designated week to present their activity to the other 7th and 8th grade advisories. So far this year, the LMS students have worked on a virtual escape room (Mr. Harris's 8th grade Advisory group); a spooky story time (Mrs. Swanson's 7th grade Advisory group); and a food drive to support our Thanksgiving Basket program for families in the community.

As students transition from the "one teacher, one classroom" elementary model to a more compartmentalized, secondary model, it is important to provide students with opportunities to see the relationship among the skills and content they are learning with a different teacher for each subject. Advisory Community Activities are a way for students to apply the skills they are learning discreetly in English class, and math class, and social studies class. It also provides the opportunity for students to further hone interpersonal and collaborative decision-making skills.
