





LHS Outdoor Adventure and Recreation Class Supports Life-Long Fitness

In 2017, a curriculum review of the exercise science courses at Litchfield High School provided an opportunity to develop our course offerings to reflect more than the traditional team-sport model. As a department, we designed new courses that aligned more directly with our stated mission, which was to develop in our students a passion for life-long fitness. We added several new course electives, including what is now known as our Outdoor Adventure & Recreation course.

The Outdoor Adventure and Recreation course curriculum is not a traditional physical education course. The course is designed to expose students to the many great opportunities the outdoors has to offer. This program allows students to explore and learn about the outdoors through a variety of non-competitive activities, which include but are not limited to orienteering, hiking/backpacking, survival techniques, camping, fishing, snow-shoeing, and biking. This course focuses on the outdoors as not only a

vehicle for fitness, but a way to develop your sense of place, manage stress, and learn life-time outdoor activities which are available year-round in one's community.

The goal of the course Outdoor Adventure & Recreation is for students to make physical activity a part of their lives beyond high school. As students acquire and perfect the knowledge

and outdoor skills, they establish more self-confidence and self-reliance, a foundation for enjoyment, continued social development through physical activity, and access to a physically active lifestyle. This course provides students with the knowledge and ability to construct and implement a lifelong plan for physical activity. The course is available to all students in grades 9-12 as an elective credit.

Students Support Area Residents Through Afghan Project

The Class of 2024 hosted Sewing Bee, one of those good, old-fashioned, time-with-your-friends after school activities, to stitch together afghan squares for three blankets while enjoying some music, snacks, and socially-distanced fun and conversation. One blanket will go to classmate Kaylee McCombs, who was diagnosed with cancer earlier this year; the other two will be given to area shelters for those in need.

Since the project began during the spring 2020 semester, the LHS community has assembled more than 100 afghans, which have been delivered to the St. Vincent DePaul Society and Safe Haven of Greater Waterbury, both

in Waterbury, as well as to Friends in Service to Humanity in Torrington.

The afghan project began last year when Sam Brown of Cheshire offered the project to the district. Originally, squares were stitched and sent to Mexico to be assembled and then distributed to young people who participated in Project Amigo's program, which supports children of west-central Mexico by providing access to health care, education, and other resources. When COVID-related travel restrictions made it impossible to get the afghan kits to Mexico, Mr. Brown decided to redirect the resources to meet the needs of the local community.

LHS Alumni Spotlight

COREY CREEDON

Corey is a Litchfield High School (LHS) graduate (2008) and is grateful for his education and experiences at LHS. Coursework in Environmental Science and participation in the Forman School Rainforest Project and trip to Costa Rica were foundational to inspiring and cultivating his interests at the intersection of environment and society. His academic and professional pursuits post-LHS have centered on integrating social and ecological solutions for conservation and sustainable development, with an emphasis on environmental and social justice.

After LHS, Corey received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Environmental Studies from Bates College. He spent a semester studying abroad in Ecuador through a program focused on conservation and ecology, featuring field visits to the Amazon Rainforest, Andes Mountains, and Galápagos Islands. This inspired his undergraduate thesis which explored an Andean community's resistance to a controversial mining project.

Following his undergraduate degree, Corey returned to Costa Rica to work with Rustic Pathways, leading environmentally themed service-learning trips abroad for high school students and partnering local counterparts on sea turtle conservation. He then went on to serve three

years as an Environmental Conservation Specialist in Paraguay with the United States Peace Corps, where he worked in environmental youth education and leadership. He extended his service for a third year to work with World Wildlife Fund/Paraguay, helping to support a project related to climate change, forest conservation, and sustainable livelihoods.

Returning to the United States, Corey received his master's degree in Environmental Management from the Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies and worked with the Urban Resources Initiative in New Haven, supporting community groups to restore and maintain urban greenspaces.

Corey recently completed a post-master's fellowship with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in Washington, D.C., where he conducted research on the drivers of coastal wetland loss in the Southeast United States and co-coordinated an interagency workgroup on coastal wetlands conservation. He also engaged in efforts to integrate environmental justice more significantly into water quality and climate change work at the EPA.

Currently, Corey is working with the United Nations Development Programme to co-lead a project that seeks to analyze and craft solutions to issues of water resources, climate change, and peace in Latin America's Tropical Andean region (Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, and Perú). Corey also holds a position as an Adjunct Faculty Instructor in Environmental Policy with the University of Maryland Global Campus where he teaches online courses in Environmental Policy.
